## P.L.2011, CHAPTER 223, approved January 17, 2012 Assembly, No. 3688 (Third Reprint)

1 **AN ACT** concerning the provision of fresh produce to urban communities, and supplementing Title 4 of the Revised Statutes.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. This act shall be known, and may be cited <sup>2</sup>, <sup>2</sup> as <sup>2</sup>[,] <sup>2</sup> the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles <sup>3</sup>Pilot Program" Act."

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2. a. The Legislature finds and declares that there are certain urban areas of the State, known as "food desert" communities, in which residents are unable to obtain reasonable and adequate access to nutritious foods and, in particular, to fresh fruits and vegetables; that the inaccessibility of nutritious food in urban food desert communities has been attributed, in large part, to the absence therein of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets and the prevalence therein of businesses like liquor stores and convenience marts, which provide convenient and affordable access only to pre-processed foods, generally high in empty calories, sugar, unhealthy preservatives, and harmful fats, and low in nutritional value; that low-income families are more likely than others to live in urban food desert communities and to lack the transportation or financial resources necessary to reach distant wholesome markets; that, as is evidenced by the work of various non-profit and private entities across the United States, the accessibility to, desire for, and use of, fresh produce by residents of urban food desert communities can be improved through the provision of mobile farmers' markets, which regularly travel to and from these communities, and which provide fresh produce <sup>1</sup>[at discounted prices 1 to [low-income] residents situated therein; and that the institution of a <sup>3</sup>[Statewide and State-regulated]<sup>3</sup> mobile farmers' market '[and fresh produce voucher]' initiative is a reasonable means by which to ensure that <sup>3</sup>[all similarly situated]<sup>3</sup> residents <sup>1</sup>[, and particularly all similarly situated lowincome residents] of urban food desert communities in the State

<sup>1</sup>[,] are provided with reasonable access to nutritious, fresh, <sup>1</sup>and <sup>1</sup> delicious <sup>1</sup>[, and reasonably priced] produce, and are afforded the opportunity thereby to make healthier eating choices for themselves and for their families.

The Legislature therefore determines that it is both reasonable and necessary to authorize the Department of Agriculture to <sup>3</sup>[establish and regulate a Statewide] develop and assist in the implementation of a pilot program to establish a<sup>3</sup> mobile farmers' market '[and fresh produce voucher]' initiative that will <sup>3</sup>[enable the State to] <sup>3</sup> provide a consistent, and easily accessible, source of fresh '[and affordable]' produce to '[low-income] 1 residents in urban food desert communities 3 [throughout the State in municipalities selected to participate in the pilot program<sup>3</sup>. 

### 3. For the purposes of this act:

"Department" means the Department of Agriculture.

"Federal food stamp assistance program" means the federal food stamp program authorized by Title XIII of the "Food and Agriculture Act of 1977," Pub.L.95-113 (7 U.S.C. s.2011 et seq.).

"Federal WIC program" means the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children, established pursuant to the federal "Child Nutrition Act of 1966," Pub.L.89-642 (42 U.S.C. s.1771 et seq.).

"Fresh mobile vendor" or "vendor" means a person who has been qualified  ${}^{3}$ [by the department] ${}^{3}$ , pursuant to paragraph  ${}^{1}$ [(2)] (1) ${}^{1}$  of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, to provide fresh produce to residents of urban food desert communities.

"Fresh Mobiles Initiative" or "Initiative" means the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative "Pilot Program"," established and Iregulated by the department developed pursuant to this act.

<sup>1</sup>["Low-income resident" means a person who resides in an urban food desert community, as delineated by the department pursuant to section 5 of this act, and who satisfies the requirements of section 8 of this act, pertaining to the establishment of financial need.]

"Low-income food voucher" means any type of food voucher, coupon, stamp, certificate, written authorization, or benefits card, which has been issued to a person by a government entity in accordance with the provisions of the federal food stamp assistance program, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, the federal WIC program, the New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program, the Work First New Jersey program, or any other federal or State level nutrition or income assistance program now or hereafter established by law.

"Mobile venue" means a food truck or other vehicle <sup>3</sup>[, approved by the department for use in the initiative pursuant to paragraph <sup>1</sup>[(4)] (3)<sup>1</sup> of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, which vehicle shall serve] serving as a base of operations from which a fresh mobile vendor may offer fresh produce for sale to consumers in urban food desert communities <sup>3</sup>through participation in the Fresh Mobiles Initiative Pilot Program.

"New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program" means the State level food stamp program, established pursuant to P.L.1998, c.32 <sup>2</sup>[(C.44:10-80 et seq.)] (C.44:10-79 et seq.)<sup>2</sup>, which applies to non-citizens who were rendered ineligible for federal food stamp program assistance by section 402 of the federal "Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996," Pub.L.104-193 (8 U.S.C. s.1612 <sup>2</sup>[et seq.]<sup>2</sup>).

<sup>3</sup>"Participating municipality" means a municipality, or physically contiguous urban area in the State, which qualifies as an urban food desert selected by the Secretary of Agriculture to participate in the Fresh Mobiles Initiative Pilot Program established pursuant to this act.<sup>3</sup>

"Secretary" means the Secretary of Agriculture.

 "Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program" means the supplemental nutrition assistance program, established pursuant to the federal "Food and Nutrition Act of 2008," Pub.L.88-525 (7 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.).

<sup>1</sup>["Social Security Income" means income or benefits received pursuant to Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act, as amended, Pub.L.92-603 (42 U.S.C. s.1381 et seq.), or pursuant to P.L.1973, c.256 (C.44:7-85 et seq.).]<sup>1</sup>

"Urban food desert," "urban food desert community," or "community" means a <sup>3</sup>[¹city,]<sup>3</sup> municipality, or¹ physically contiguous urban area in the State, ¹[the boundaries of]¹ ³[which ¹[have been delineated] is selected and designated as such¹ by the ¹[department in accordance with the provisions of] Secretary of Agriculture pursuant to¹ section 5 of this act] in which residents have limited access to nutritious foods, such as fresh fruits and vegetables, through supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets<sup>3</sup>.

"Vendor supply area" means a specific street location in a <sup>3</sup> [food desert community] <u>participating municipality</u> where qualified fresh mobile vendors may offer their fresh produce for sale to consumers <sup>3</sup> <u>as part of the pilot program authorized</u> pursuant to <sup>1</sup> [paragraph (1) of subsection a. of section 6] <sup>3</sup> [section 5] this act.

"Work First New Jersey" means the Work First New Jersey temporary public assistance program, established pursuant to P.L.1997, c.38 (C.44:10-55 et seq.) in accordance with

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- 4. a. In order to promote and facilitate improved access to 6 7 fresh produce by low-income residents of urban food deserts <sup>3</sup>[in the State]<sup>3</sup>, the Department of Agriculture shall <sup>3</sup>[establish a 8 Statewide] develop and assist in the implementation of a<sup>3</sup> mobile 9 farmers' market <sup>1</sup>[and fresh produce voucher] <sup>1</sup> <sup>3</sup>pilot <sup>3</sup> program, to 10 be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." <sup>3</sup>The pilot 11 12 program shall operate in one or more municipalities, selected by the Secretary of Agriculture, in which residents have limited access to 13 14 nutritious foods through supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' 15 markets, which agree to participate in the program. The department 16 shall identify, on its Internet website, the municipalities selected for 17 participation, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors will be accessible for 18 19 community residents. The pilot program shall operate for a period 20 of at least one year. No later than one year after the pilot program 21 is established and becomes effective, the department shall submit to 22 the Governor and, pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 23 (C.52:14-19.1), to the Legislature, a written report containing 24 information on the implementation of the pilot program, including a 25 recommendation on the feasibility and desirability of implementing the initiative on a Statewide basis.<sup>3</sup> 26
  - b. As a part of the Fresh Mobiles Initiative <sup>3</sup>Pilot Program<sup>3</sup>, the department shall <sup>3</sup>be authorized to<sup>3</sup>:
  - (1) <sup>1</sup> [develop, in accordance with the provisions of section 5 of this act, a complete map identifying all urban food desert communities in the State;
  - (2)] establish [standards,] qualifications [, and conditions] for fresh mobile vendors [, as may be necessary to ensure both the freshness of produce sold and the quality of customer service provided to consumers under the initiative, and issue licenses or permits, as is appropriate and necessary, to persons who are qualified under those standards and in accordance with the provisions of this act] and assist the participating municipalities in identifying and recruiting appropriate qualified persons to act as fresh mobile vendors in the pilot program to be operated in the participating municipality, provided that the vendors agree to accept any low-income food vouchers as payment at the mobile venues established under the pilot program as a condition of participation in the program []

- <sup>1</sup>[(5)] (4)<sup>1</sup> establish,] (3)<sup>3</sup> coordinate <sup>3</sup>[,]<sup>3</sup> and encourage partnerships between <sup>3</sup>the participating municipalities and such<sup>3</sup> fresh mobile vendors as <sup>3</sup>[is]<sup>3</sup> deemed necessary to better enable and ensure the prompt or efficient delivery of fresh produce to urban food desert communities and the provision of a year-round supply of <sup>1</sup>[low-cost,]<sup>1</sup> fresh produce <sup>3</sup>[to all urban food desert communities in the State] through the pilot program<sup>3</sup>;
- <sup>1</sup>[(6) establish and regulate a fresh produce voucher program, in accordance with the provisions of section 8 of this act, to enable low-income residents of urban food desert communities to obtain discounted prices on produce offered for sale through fresh mobile vendors;
- (7)  $\mathbf{I}^{3}$  [(5)<sup>1</sup> establish seasonal and other purchasing incentive programs to be implemented as part of the initiative, which incentive programs shall be designed]
- (4) take appropriate actions<sup>3</sup> to encourage consumer participation in the initiative and increase consumer familiarity with regard to the various types of produce offered by fresh mobile vendors;
- <sup>3</sup>[¹(6) direct the fresh mobile vendors to accept any low-income food vouchers as payment at the established mobile venues and vendor supply areas, and]
- (5) take appropriate actions to<sup>3</sup> encourage, at the discretion of the individual fresh mobile vendor, the acceptance of any method of payment, including, but not limited to, cash, credit, or check;<sup>1</sup>
- <sup>1</sup>[(8)] <sup>3</sup>[(7)] (6)<sup>3</sup> develop educational and informational materials for distribution to consumers, which materials may incorporate information pertaining to the nutritional value of fruits and vegetables, the importance of incorporating fresh produce into the diet, or any other topic that is relevant to the work of the initiative; and

  1 not limited to adopting rules and regulations [, within 180 days

  1 seq.), [as may be necessary] that the secretary deems necessary or
  2 appropriate to implement the provisions of this act.

<sup>1</sup>[5. a. Within 120 days after the effective date of this act, the department shall develop a map that delineates the location of every urban food desert community in the State.

- b. The department shall delineate the boundaries of an urban food desert community based on its evaluation of various combined factors, which shall include, but need not be limited to:
- (1) the physical proximity of the area to the nearest grocery store, supermarket, or farmers' market;
- (2) the availability and expense of public transportation to and from the nearest grocery store, supermarket, or farmers' market, and the number of automobile owners in the area;
  - (3) the average financial status of persons residing in the area;
- (4) the number and density of liquor stores and convenience marts in the area; and
- (5) any other demographic, economic, or sociological factors that may be relevant to the determination required by this section.
- c. The department may consult with, and obtain assistance or request data from, any other State agency, instrumentality, or entity, or from any appropriate private or non-profit organization, in fulfilling its duties under this section.
- d. (1) The completed urban food desert map, which has been developed by the department in accordance with subsection a. of this section, shall be made available for review by the public through posting on the department's Internet website.
- (2) The department shall review, on an annual basis, the accuracy of the urban food desert map developed pursuant to subsection a. of this section, and shall make any necessary revisions thereto. Any revised versions of the urban food desert map shall be made available for review by the public through posting on the department's Internet website.
- (3) Hard copies of the department's urban food desert map, and any revised version thereof, shall be made available to a governmental entity, instrumentality, or agency, or to a member of the public, upon request.]<sup>1</sup>

<sup>1</sup>[6. a. The department shall utilize the urban food desert map developed pursuant to section 5 of this act, and any revised versions thereof:

- (1) to designate, and reevaluate as necessary, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, appropriate street locations to be utilized as vendor supply areas in each urban food desert community;
  - (2) to evaluate the efficacy of the initiative as a whole; and
  - (3) for any other purpose relevant to the initiative.
- b. The department shall identify, on its Internet website, and for each urban food desert community that is identified on the department's urban food desert map, the vendor supply areas at which,

and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors will be accessible by community residents.]

- Secretary of Agriculture shall select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, in which to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative, and shall designate, at the discretion of the secretary, the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community and the vendor supply areas within the urban food desert community. The secretary may select additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion.
- b. Per the selection and direction of the secretary pursuant to subsection a. of this section, the department shall implement the initiative. The department shall identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors will be accessible for community residents.
- c. Annually, the secretary shall evaluate the efficacy of the <sup>2</sup>[program] initiative<sup>2</sup> and shall modify the <sup>2</sup>[program] initiative<sup>2</sup> as deemed necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined by the secretary to be urban food desert communities. <sup>1</sup>]<sup>3</sup>

  - e. The department shall establish procedures to enable and facilitate the redemption of fresh produce vouchers by vendors who have accepted the vouchers from qualified persons as full or partial payment for fresh produce sold in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Fresh produce vouchers issued by the department in accordance with this section shall be valid only for the purchase of produce from an authorized fresh mobile vendor] the acceptance of low-income food vouchers by fresh mobile vendors in accordance with subsection b. of this section and paragraph <sup>3</sup>[(6)] (1)<sup>3</sup> of subsection b. of section 4 of this act<sup>1</sup>.

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1 **AN ACT** concerning the provision of fresh produce to urban communities, and supplementing Title 4 of the Revised Statutes.

**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. This act shall be known, and may be cited as, the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Act."

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2. a. The Legislature finds and declares that there are certain urban areas of the State, known as "food desert" communities, in which residents are unable to obtain reasonable and adequate access to nutritious foods and, in particular, to fresh fruits and vegetables; that the inaccessibility of nutritious food in urban food desert communities has been attributed, in large part, to the absence therein of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets and the prevalence therein of businesses like liquor stores and convenience marts, which provide convenient and affordable access only to pre-processed foods, generally high in empty calories, sugar, unhealthy preservatives, and harmful fats, and low in nutritional value; that low-income families are more likely than others to live in urban food desert communities and to lack the transportation or financial resources necessary to reach distant wholesome markets; that, as is evidenced by the work of various non-profit and private entities across the United States, the accessibility to, desire for, and use of, fresh produce by residents of urban food desert communities can be improved through the provision of mobile farmers' markets, which regularly travel to and from these communities, and which provide fresh produce at discounted prices to low-income residents situated therein; and that the institution of a Statewide and State-regulated mobile farmers' market and fresh produce voucher initiative is a reasonable means by which to ensure that all similarly situated residents, and particularly all similarly situated low-income residents of urban food desert communities in the State, are provided with reasonable access to nutritious, fresh, delicious, and reasonably priced produce, and are afforded the opportunity thereby to make healthier eating choices for themselves and for their families.

40 41 42 b. The Legislature therefore determines that it is both reasonable and necessary to authorize the Department of Agriculture to establish and regulate a Statewide mobile farmers' market and fresh produce voucher initiative that will enable the State to provide a consistent, and easily accessible, source of fresh and affordable produce to low-income residents in urban food desert communities throughout the State.

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- 3. For the purposes of this act:
- "Department" means the Department of Agriculture.

"Federal food stamp assistance program" means the federal food stamp program authorized by Title XIII of the "Food and Agriculture Act of 1977," Pub.L.95-113 (7 U.S.C. s.2011 et seq.).

"Federal WIC program" means the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children, established pursuant to the federal "Child Nutrition Act of 1966," Pub.L.89-642 (42 U.S.C. s.1771 et seq.).

"Fresh mobile vendor" or "vendor" means a person who has been qualified by the department, pursuant to paragraph (2) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, to provide fresh produce to residents of urban food desert communities.

"Fresh Mobiles Initiative" or "Initiative" means the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative," established and regulated by the department pursuant to this act.

"Low-income resident" means a person who resides in an urban food desert community, as delineated by the department pursuant to section 5 of this act, and who satisfies the requirements of section 8 of this act, pertaining to the establishment of financial need.

"Mobile venue" means a food truck or other vehicle, approved by the department for use in the initiative pursuant to paragraph (4) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, which vehicle shall serve as a base of operations from which a fresh mobile vendor may offer fresh produce for sale to consumers in urban food desert communities.

"New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program" means the State level food stamp program, established pursuant to P.L.1998, c.32 (C.44:10-80 et seq.), which applies to non-citizens who were rendered ineligible for federal food stamp program assistance by section 402 of the federal "Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996," Pub.L.104-193 (8 U.S.C. s.1612 et seq.).

"Secretary" means the Secretary of Agriculture.

"Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program" means the supplemental nutrition assistance program, established pursuant to the federal "Food and Nutrition Act of 2008," Pub.L.88-525 (7 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.).

"Social Security Income" means income or benefits received pursuant to Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act, as amended, Pub.L.92-603 (42 U.S.C. s.1381 et seq.), or pursuant to P.L.1973, c.256 (C.44:7-85 et seq.).

"Urban food desert," "urban food desert community," or "community" means a physically contiguous urban area in the State, the boundaries of which have been delineated by the department in accordance with the provisions of section 5 of this act.

"Vendor supply area" means a specific street location in a food desert community where qualified fresh mobile vendors may offer their fresh produce for sale to consumers pursuant to paragraph (1) of subsection a. of section 6 of this act.

"Work First New Jersey" means the Work First New Jersey temporary public assistance program, established pursuant to

- P.L.1997, c.38 (C.44:10-55 et seq.) in accordance with authorization received under the federal "Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996," Pub.L.104-193 (8 U.S.C.
- 4 s.1612 et seq.).

- 4. a. In order to promote and facilitate improved access to fresh produce by low-income residents of urban food deserts in the State, the Department of Agriculture shall establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market and fresh produce voucher program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative."
  - b. As a part of the Fresh Mobiles Initiative, the department shall:
- (1) develop, in accordance with the provisions of section 5 of this act, a complete map identifying all urban food desert communities in the State;
- (2) establish standards, qualifications, and conditions for fresh mobile vendors, as may be necessary to ensure both the freshness of produce sold and the quality of customer service provided to consumers under the initiative, and issue licenses or permits, as is appropriate and necessary, to persons who are qualified under those standards and in accordance with the provisions of this act to act as fresh mobile vendors;
- (3) designate one or more vendor supply areas to be utilized for vendor sales in each urban food desert community, which designations shall ensure a high level of accessibility to vendors by community residents;
- (4) authorize fresh mobile vendors to purchase or otherwise obtain, and to utilize, mobile venues for purposes of the initiative, and establish inspection and approval or permitting procedures through which the department may ensure the sanitation and safety of mobile venues utilized by vendors;
- (5) establish, coordinate, and encourage partnerships between fresh mobile vendors as is deemed necessary to better enable and ensure the prompt or efficient delivery of fresh produce to urban food desert communities and the provision of a year-round supply of low-cost, fresh produce to all urban food desert communities in the State;
- (6) establish and regulate a fresh produce voucher program, in accordance with the provisions of section 8 of this act, to enable low-income residents of urban food desert communities to obtain discounted prices on produce offered for sale through fresh mobile vendors;
- (7) establish seasonal and other purchasing incentive programs to be implemented as part of the initiative, which incentive programs shall be designed to encourage consumer participation in the initiative and increase consumer familiarity with regard to the various types of produce offered by fresh mobile vendors;
- (8) develop educational and informational materials for distribution to consumers, which materials may incorporate information pertaining to the nutritional value of fruits and vegetables,

the importance of incorporating fresh produce into the diet, or any other topic that is relevant to the work of the initiative; and

(9) adopt rules and regulations, within 180 days following the effective date of this act, and pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), as may be necessary to implement the provisions of this act.

- 5. a. Within 120 days after the effective date of this act, the department shall develop a map that delineates the location of every urban food desert community in the State.
- b. The department shall delineate the boundaries of an urban food desert community based on its evaluation of various combined factors, which shall include, but need not be limited to:
- (1) the physical proximity of the area to the nearest grocery store, supermarket, or farmers' market;
- (2) the availability and expense of public transportation to and from the nearest grocery store, supermarket, or farmers' market, and the number of automobile owners in the area;
  - (3) the average financial status of persons residing in the area;
- (4) the number and density of liquor stores and convenience marts in the area; and
- (5) any other demographic, economic, or sociological factors that may be relevant to the determination required by this section.
- c. The department may consult with, and obtain assistance or request data from, any other State agency, instrumentality, or entity, or from any appropriate private or non-profit organization, in fulfilling its duties under this section.
- d. (1) The completed urban food desert map, which has been developed by the department in accordance with subsection a. of this section, shall be made available for review by the public through posting on the department's Internet website.
- (2) The department shall review, on an annual basis, the accuracy of the urban food desert map developed pursuant to subsection a. of this section, and shall make any necessary revisions thereto. Any revised versions of the urban food desert map shall be made available for review by the public through posting on the department's Internet website.
- (3) Hard copies of the department's urban food desert map, and any revised version thereof, shall be made available to a governmental entity, instrumentality, or agency, or to a member of the public, upon request.

- 6. a. The department shall utilize the urban food desert map developed pursuant to section 5 of this act, and any revised versions thereof:
- (1) to designate, and reevaluate as necessary, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act,

appropriate street locations to be utilized as vendor supply areas in each urban food desert community;

- (2) to evaluate the efficacy of the initiative as a whole; and
- (3) for any other purpose relevant to the initiative.
- b. The department shall identify, on its Internet website, and for each urban food desert community that is identified on the department's urban food desert map, the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors will be accessible by community residents.

- 7. a. Using the standards and conditions, and the licensing or permitting procedures developed by the department in accordance with paragraph (2) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, the department shall establish a network of fresh mobile vendors to provide fresh produce for sale to residents in urban food desert communities throughout the State.
- b. In establishing a network of fresh mobile vendors, the department may solicit or approve participation by in-State or out-of-State produce farmers, collaborative farmers' organizations, or private, non-profit, or governmental entities that are engaged in fresh produce rescue efforts, such as the rescue efforts employed by the New Jersey Agricultural Society in its "Farmers Against Hunger" program. The department shall encourage the State's produce farmers to participate in the initiative as fresh mobile vendors.

The department shall make every reasonable effort to ensure, through the adoption of appropriate regulatory requirements or otherwise, that a consistent, year-round supply of reasonably priced fresh produce, sufficient to satisfy the fresh produce needs of residents in all urban food desert communities in the State, will be made available by the network of fresh mobile vendors.

- 8. a. Any person may participate as a consumer in the Fresh Mobiles Initiative.
- b. A person shall be entitled to obtain fresh produce vouchers as a part of the Fresh Mobiles Initiative only if the person:
- (1) is a resident of an urban food desert community, as delineated by the department in accordance with section 5 of this act; and
- (2) has financial need, as determined by the department in accordance with the provisions of subsection c. of this section.
- c. A person shall be determined to have financial need for the purposes of subsection b. of this section if the person establishes, in accordance with procedures established by the department, that the person:
- (1) has a household income of not more than 185 percent of the federal poverty income guidelines, which are published annually by the United States Department of Health and Human Services;
- (2) is currently receiving Social Security Income; or
- (3) is currently enrolled as a participant in:

- 1 (a) the federal food stamp assistance program;
- 2 (b) the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;
- 3 (c) the federal WIC program;
- 4 (d) the New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program;
- 5 (e) Work First New Jersey; or
  - (f) any other federal or State level nutrition or income assistance program now or hereafter established by law.
  - d. The department shall establish procedures to facilitate timely departmental determinations of voucher entitlement under this section, and to enable the efficient distribution of vouchers to persons who have been qualified under this section for receipt thereof. The department shall determine, on a case-by-case basis, and in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the department, the appropriate number and value of vouchers to be issued to a person who has satisfied the conditions of this section.
  - e. The department shall establish procedures to enable and facilitate the redemption of fresh produce vouchers by vendors who have accepted the vouchers from qualified persons as full or partial payment for fresh produce sold in accordance with the provisions of this act.
  - f. Fresh produce vouchers issued by the department in accordance with this section shall be valid only for the purchase of produce from an authorized fresh mobile vendor.

- 9. a. For the purposes of advertising, promoting, and facilitating the Fresh Mobiles Initiative, the Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to receive and utilize, for the purposes specified in subsection b. of this section, any moneys that are obtained thereby through:
- (1) appropriations or allocations of funds to the department for purposes consistent with this act;
- (2) grant or loan awards made available to the department for purposes consistent with this act;
- (3) direct contributions, gifts, legacies, bequests, or endowments for purposes consistent with this act; and
  - (4) any other source for purposes consistent with this act.
- b. The secretary shall deposit all moneys received pursuant to subsection a. of this section in a special account to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund." The Secretary may expend the moneys deposited in the fund, in addition to any interest accrued thereon, and any dividends and returns resulting from investment of the moneys in the fund, for any of the following purposes:
- 43 (1) providing financing for the fresh produce voucher program 44 authorized pursuant to section 8 of this act;
- 45 (2) advertising and publicizing the initiative;
- 46 (3) developing and distributing educational materials as part of the initiative;

- (4) providing financing for any studies that are reasonably necessary to ensure the continued accuracy of the department's urban food desert map;
  - (5) offsetting any costs incurred by the department in complying with the provisions of this act; and
  - (6) providing financing for any other activity or endeavor that is consistent with the purposes of this act, and that will support, or facilitate the efficient and effective operation of, the Fresh Mobiles Initiative.

10. This act shall take effect immediately.

#### **STATEMENT**

This bill would authorize the Department of Agriculture to establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market and fresh produce voucher program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The program would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents, and particularly, low-income residents, of so-called urban "food desert" communities in the State.

A "food desert" is understood, in common agricultural parlance, to refer to a community wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence in the community of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets, and a prevalence therein of liquor stores and convenience marts that specialize in the sale of pre-processed foods, generally high in empty calories, sugar, unhealthy preservatives, and harmful fats, and low in nutritional value. Because supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets in New Jersey are predominantly situated in suburban or rural areas of the State, and liquor stores and convenience marts are densely centralized in low-income urban areas, where residents often lack the finances or necessary transportation to reach distant wholesome markets, the existence and effect of urban "food deserts" in the State is of legitimate and serious concern, particularly for the State's low-income residents.

The bill would require the Department of Agriculture to take certain specific actions pertaining to the establishment and regulation of the State's Fresh Mobiles Initiative. However, the department would have discretion to determine, and to adopt rules and regulations pertaining to, the appropriate intricacies of and procedures to be utilized in implementing the program.

In accordance with the bill's provisions, the department would be required to:

(1) develop, annually review for accuracy, and make available for public review, a map that identifies the location and boundaries of every urban food desert community in the State;

- (2) establish standards, qualifications, and conditions for fresh mobile vendors, as may be necessary to ensure both the freshness of produce sold and the quality of customer service provided to consumers under the initiative, and issue licenses or permits, as is appropriate and necessary, to persons who are qualified under those standards and in accordance with the provisions of this bill to act as fresh mobile vendors;
- (3) designate one or more vendor supply areas to be utilized for vendor sales in each urban food desert community, which designations must ensure a high level of accessibility to vendors by community residents;
- (4) authorize fresh mobile vendors to purchase or otherwise obtain, and to utilize, food trucks or other mobile venues for purposes of the initiative, and establish inspection and approval or permitting procedures through which the department may ensure the sanitation and safety of mobile venues utilized by vendors;
- (5) develop educational and informational materials on nutrition for distribution to consumers, and establish seasonal and other purchasing incentives to encourage consumer participation in the incentive and increase consumer familiarity with regard to the various types of produce offered for sale by fresh mobile vendors; and
- (6) establish and regulate a fresh produce voucher program through which discounted price vouchers may be issued to low-income residents of urban food desert communities for the purchase thereby of fresh fruits and vegetables from authorized fresh mobile vendors.

The bill would entitle a resident of an urban food desert community to the receipt of fresh produce vouchers under the department's fresh produce voucher program, but only if the resident establishes his or her financial need in accordance with the bill's provisions. A person would be understood to be suffering from financial need sufficient for the issuance of fresh produce vouchers if the person establishes, to the department's satisfaction, that the person:

- (1) has a household income of not more than 185 percent of the federal poverty income guidelines;
  - (2) is currently receiving Social Security income; or
- (3) is currently enrolled as a participant in the federal food stamp assistance program; the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program; the federal WIC program; the New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program; Work First New Jersey; or any other federal or State level nutrition or income assistance program now or hereafter established by law.

The Secretary of Agriculture would additionally be authorized under the bill to establish and maintain a fund, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," and to receive and deposit into the fund any moneys received by the department for purposes consistent with the bill's provisions. The secretary would be authorized to expend the moneys contained in the fund, including any accrued interest or investment dividends or returns, for the purposes of

The Assembly Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee reports favorably, with committee amendments, Assembly Bill No. 3688.

This bill, as amended, would authorize the Department of Agriculture to establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State – i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

The bill, as amended, would require the Department of Agriculture to: 1) establish qualification standards for, and issue licenses or permits to, fresh mobile vendors and fresh mobile venues (i.e., food trucks); 2) designate vendor supply areas in the State's urban food desert communities; and 3) develop nutrition-related educational materials and purchasing incentives for use in the initiative.

The bill, as amended, directs the Secretary of Agriculture to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the Secretary of Agriculture is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill, as amended, requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The bill, as amended, requires the secretary to evaluate annually the efficacy of the program and make modifications as necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined to be urban food desert communities.

As amended, the bill requires the Department of Agriculture to direct fresh mobile vendors to accept government-issued food vouchers from any State or federal nutrition or income assistance program as payment for fruits and vegetables that are purchased from the vendors.

The Secretary of Agriculture would be authorized under the bill, as amended, to establish and maintain a fund, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," and to receive and deposit into the fund any moneys received by the department for the bill's purposes. Under the bill as amended, the secretary would be authorized to expend the moneys contained in the fund in order to: 1) advertise the initiative, 2) develop and distribute educational materials associated with the initiative, 3) offset the department's costs in administering the initiative, and 4) finance any necessary studies or other activity that is consistent with the purposes of the initiative.

## **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS**

The committee amendments:

- 1) delete the provisions establishing a fresh produce voucher program;
- 2) delete the provisions requiring the creation of an urban food desert communities map;
- 3) direct the Secretary of Agriculture to select at least one city each in northern, central, and southern New Jersey and implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities;
- 4) add the definition of "low-income food voucher"; and
- 5) provide for low-income food vouchers to be accepted by fresh mobile vendors as payment for produce sold thereby.

The Senate Economic Growth Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill, No. 3688 (1R) with committee amendments.

This bill, as amended, would authorize the Department of Agriculture ("department") to establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State – i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

The amended bill would require the department to: 1) establish qualification standards for, and issue licenses or permits to, fresh mobile vendors and fresh mobile venues (i.e., food trucks); 2) designate vendor supply areas in the State's urban food desert communities; and 3) develop nutrition-related educational materials and purchasing incentives for use in the initiative.

The amended bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture ("secretary") to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and directs the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the secretary is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The bill requires the secretary to evaluate annually the efficacy of the initiative and make modifications as necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined to be urban food desert communities.

The amended bill provides that government-issued food vouchers from any State or federal nutrition or income assistance program may be used as payment for fruits and vegetables that are purchased from the vendors.

The secretary would be authorized under the amended bill to establish and maintain a fund, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," and to receive and deposit into the fund any moneys received by the department for the bill's purposes. Under the bill, the secretary would be authorized to expend the moneys contained in the fund in order to: 1) advertise the initiative; 2) develop and distribute educational materials associated with the initiative; 3) offset the department's costs in administering the initiative; and 4) finance any necessary studies or other activity that is consistent with the purposes of the initiative.

The committee amendments:

- 1) make corrections to citations and to the designation of the initiative;
- 2) require the department, in establishing a network of food mobile venders, to use, to the maximum extent practicable, in-State produce farmers, collaborative farmers' organizations, or private, nonprofit, or governmental entities engaged in fresh produce rescue efforts;
- 3) add the New Jersey Federation of Food Banks as another example of a governmental entity engaged in fresh produce rescue efforts; and
- 4) exclude funds allocated for the State Food Purchase Program from those that may be used to implement the bill.

As amended and reported by the committee, Assembly Bill No. 3688 (1R) is identical to Senate Bill No. 2728, which was also amended and reported by the committee on this date.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 3688 (2R).

This bill would authorize the Department of Agriculture to establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State--i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

Specifically, the bill would require the department to: 1) establish qualification standards for, and issue licenses or permits to, fresh mobile vendors and fresh mobile venues (or food trucks); 2) designate vendor supply areas in the State's urban food desert communities; and 3) develop nutrition-related educational materials and purchasing incentives for use in the initiative.

The bill also directs the Secretary of Agriculture to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and directs the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the secretary is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The bill requires the secretary to evaluate annually the efficacy of the initiative and make modifications as necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined to be urban food desert communities.

The bill further provides that government-issued food vouchers from any State or federal nutrition or income assistance program may be used as payment for fruits and vegetables that are purchased from the vendors. The secretary would be authorized under the bill to establish and maintain a fund, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," and to receive and deposit into the fund any moneys received by the department for the bill's purposes. Under the bill, the secretary would be authorized to expend the moneys contained in the fund in order to: 1) advertise the initiative; 2) develop and distribute educational materials associated with the initiative; 3) offset the department's costs in administering the initiative; and 4) finance any necessary studies or other activity that is consistent with the purposes of the initiative.

As considered by the committee, Assembly Bill No. 3688 (2R) is identical to Senate Bill No. 2728 (1R), as also considered by the committee.

### **FISCAL IMPACT**:

The Department of Agriculture would incur certain expenses to operate the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." Based upon information provided informally by the department, these costs might be about \$380,000 per year, with two-thirds of the funds going for staff and the remainder for advertising and publications costs. The department would expect a very small offsetting increase in fees associated with the program. To the extent that the department implemented the provisions of the bill that permit financial incentives for the program, the annual costs would be greater. One incentive scenario would entail an annual cost of \$1,000,000.

The bill does not identify a specific funding source for the program.

### **BILL DESCRIPTION**

Assembly Bill No. 3688 (2R) of 2011 authorizes the Department of Agriculture to establish and regulate a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State – i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

The bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the secretary is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The bill requires the secretary to evaluate annually the efficacy of the program and make modifications as necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined to be urban food desert communities. The secretary is authorized to establish and maintain a special account, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," to receive and expend any moneys that are obtained through appropriations, grants, loan awards, direct contributions, gifts, legacies, bequests, endowments, or any other source for purposes consistent with this bill.

### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### EXECUTIVE BRANCH

According to informal information provided by the Department of Agriculture, the total estimated cost to implement and administer the mobile fresh produce markets is \$1.38 million. This amount includes \$1 million that the department proposes as a monetary incentive to those participating vendors that meet the standards of the program, as well as \$367,000 in costs which include \$260,000 for staff, \$75,000 for advertising, \$40,000 for the production and printing of educational materials, and \$5,000 for data processing. Revenue of approximately \$13,000 generated from fees from the issuance of licenses to approximately 50 vendors at \$250 each to offset part of the cost to the program. The monetary incentive is based on mileage reimbursement for 50 vendors at an estimated cost of \$375,000, and a reimbursement of up to 50 percent of the product cost for 50 vendors estimated at \$625,000.

### OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS cannot estimate the fiscal impact of this bill due to a lack of sufficient data. However, the OLS estimates the Department of Agriculture would incur some additional labor and material costs on an on-going basis to establish, implement, administer, and regulate the Statewide mobile farmers' market program as required by the bill.

# ASSEMBLY BILL No. 3688 (Second Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3688 (Second Reprint) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

The bill requires the Department of Agriculture to establish and regulate a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." This program would be designed to provide access to fresh produce for residents of "urban food desert" communities in the State, where residents have limited access to fresh produce and nutritious food because of an absence of supermarkets and grocery stores. Individuals living in these areas often lack the financial resources or transportation means by which to reach marketplaces selling fresh produce.

The bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture to designate a minimum of one city in each of the regions of the State (north, central, and south) as an urban food desert community, and establish a network of fresh mobile vendors, who will accept various methods of payment, including low-income vouchers, and will distribute nutritious and fresh produce to these areas so as to promote healthy diets to residents. While the sponsors' efforts to ameliorate the paucity of healthy food within certain urban areas in the State are laudable, the cost of implementing the program outlined in the bill would be approximately \$1.38 million and the bill does not identify a viable means by which to finance its objectives. As I have advised the Legislature time and again, funding for programs must be negotiated as part

of the budget process and not added on throughout the year in an unplanned and unfocused manner.

I am supportive of providing greater access to fresh produce and nutritious food, especially in urban areas, but believe the more prudent approach would be to evaluate the potential success of this type of program in volunteering Such an approach acknowledges the urgency municipalities. associated with providing fresh produce and healthy food choices in food desert communities, while allowing the marketplace to determine the viability of such a program. Accordingly, I recommend the bill be amended to allow the Department of Agriculture to establish a New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Pilot Program, allowing for selected municipalities to voluntarily participate in the Program to assess its potential efficacy. The Pilot Program will serve to inform the decision as to whether the Program should be extended Statewide, and the costs associated with such an expansion. My recommendations would require the Department of Agriculture to report its findings and recommendations on the Pilot Program to the Governor and the Legislature no later than one year after the Program is fully implemented.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3688 (Second Reprint) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

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1 **AN ACT** concerning the provision of fresh produce to urban communities, and supplementing Title 4 of the Revised Statutes.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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1. This act shall be known, and may be cited as, the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Act."

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2. a. The Legislature finds and declares that there are certain urban areas of the State, known as "food desert" communities, in which residents are unable to obtain reasonable and adequate access to nutritious foods and, in particular, to fresh fruits and vegetables; that the inaccessibility of nutritious food in urban food desert communities has been attributed, in large part, to the absence therein of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets and the prevalence therein of businesses like liquor stores and convenience marts, which provide convenient and affordable access only to pre-processed foods, generally high in empty calories, sugar, unhealthy preservatives, and harmful fats, and low in nutritional value; that low-income families are more likely than others to live in urban food desert communities and to lack the transportation or financial resources necessary to reach distant wholesome markets; that, as is evidenced by the work of various non-profit and private entities across the United States, the accessibility to, desire for, and use of, fresh produce by residents of urban food desert communities can be improved through the provision of mobile farmers' markets, which regularly travel to and from these communities, and which provide fresh produce to residents situated therein; and that the institution of a Statewide and State-regulated mobile farmers' market initiative is a reasonable means by which to ensure that all similarly situated residents of urban food desert communities in the State are provided with reasonable access to nutritious, fresh, and delicious produce, and are afforded the opportunity thereby to make healthier eating choices for themselves and for their families.

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b. The Legislature therefore determines that it is both reasonable and necessary to authorize the Department of Agriculture to establish and regulate a Statewide mobile farmers' market initiative that will enable the State to provide a consistent, and easily accessible, source of fresh produce to residents in urban food desert communities throughout the State.

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- 3. For the purposes of this act:
- "Department" means the Department of Agriculture.

"Federal food stamp assistance program" means the federal food stamp program authorized by Title XIII of the "Food and Agriculture Act of 1977," Pub.L.95-113 (7 U.S.C. s.2011 et seq.). 1 "Federal WIC program" means the Special Supplemental 2 Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children, established 3 pursuant to the federal "Child Nutrition Act of 1966," Pub.L.89-642 4 (42 U.S.C. s.1771 et seq.).

"Fresh mobile vendor" or "vendor" means a person who has been qualified by the department, pursuant to paragraph (1) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, to provide fresh produce to residents of urban food desert communities.

"Fresh Mobiles Initiative" or "Initiative" means the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative," established and regulated by the department pursuant to this act.

"Low-income food voucher" means any type of food voucher, coupon, stamp, certificate, written authorization, or benefits card, which has been issued to a person by a government entity in accordance with the provisions of the federal food stamp assistance program, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, the federal WIC program, the New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program, the Work First New Jersey program, or any other federal or State level nutrition or income assistance program now or hereafter established by law.

"Mobile venue" means a food truck or other vehicle, approved by the department for use in the initiative pursuant to paragraph (3) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, which vehicle shall serve as a base of operations from which a fresh mobile vendor may offer fresh produce for sale to consumers in urban food desert communities.

"New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program" means the State level food stamp program, established pursuant to P.L.1998, c.32 (C.44:10-79 et seq.), which applies to non-citizens who were rendered ineligible for federal food stamp program assistance by section 402 of the federal "Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996," Pub.L.104-193 (8 U.S.C. s.1612).

"Secretary" means the Secretary of Agriculture.

"Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program" means the supplemental nutrition assistance program, established pursuant to the federal "Food and Nutrition Act of 2008," Pub.L.88-525 (7 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.).

"Urban food desert," "urban food desert community," or "community" means a city, municipality, or physically contiguous urban area in the State, which is selected and designated as such by the Secretary of Agriculture pursuant to section 5 of this act.

"Vendor supply area" means a specific street location in a food desert community where qualified fresh mobile vendors may offer their fresh produce for sale to consumers pursuant to section 5 of this act.

"Work First New Jersey" means the Work First New Jersey temporary public assistance program, established pursuant to

- P.L.1997, c.38 (C.44:10-55 et seq.) in accordance with authorization received under Title IV of the federal "Personal
- 3 Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996,"
- 4 Pub.L.104-193 (8 U.S.C. s.1601 et seq.).

- 4. a. In order to promote and facilitate improved access to fresh produce by low-income residents of urban food deserts in the State, the Department of Agriculture shall establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative."
- b. As a part of the Fresh Mobiles Initiative, the department shall:
- (1) establish standards, qualifications, and conditions for fresh mobile vendors, as may be necessary to ensure both the freshness of produce sold and the quality of customer service provided to consumers under the initiative, and issue licenses or permits, as is appropriate and necessary, to persons who are qualified under those standards and in accordance with the provisions of this act to act as fresh mobile vendors;
- (2) designate one or more vendor supply areas to be used for vendor sales in each urban food desert community, which designations shall ensure a high level of accessibility to vendors by community residents;
- (3) authorize fresh mobile vendors to purchase or otherwise obtain, and to use, mobile venues for purposes of the initiative, and establish inspection and approval or permitting procedures through which the department may ensure the sanitation and safety of mobile venues used by vendors;
- (4) establish, coordinate, and encourage partnerships between fresh mobile vendors as is deemed necessary to better enable and ensure the prompt or efficient delivery of fresh produce to urban food desert communities and the provision of a year-round supply of fresh produce to all urban food desert communities in the State;
- (5) establish seasonal and other purchasing incentive programs to be implemented as part of the initiative, which incentive programs shall be designed to encourage consumer participation in the initiative and increase consumer familiarity with regard to the various types of produce offered by fresh mobile vendors;
- (6) direct the fresh mobile vendors to accept any low-income food vouchers as payment at the established mobile venues and vendor supply areas, and encourage, at the discretion of the individual fresh mobile vendor, the acceptance of any method of payment, including, but not limited to, cash, credit, or check;
- (7) develop educational and informational materials for distribution to consumers, which materials may incorporate information pertaining to the nutritional value of fruits and vegetables, the importance of incorporating fresh produce into the

diet, or any other topic that is relevant to the work of the initiative; and

(8) adopt rules and regulations, within 180 days following the effective date of this act, and pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), as may be necessary to implement the provisions of this act.

- 5. a. Within 120 days after the effective date of this act, the Secretary of Agriculture shall select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, in which to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative, and shall designate, at the discretion of the secretary, the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community and the vendor supply areas within the urban food desert community. The secretary may select additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion.
- b. Per the selection and direction of the secretary pursuant to subsection a. of this section, the department shall implement the initiative. The department shall identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors will be accessible for community residents.
- c. Annually, the secretary shall evaluate the efficacy of the initiative and shall modify the initiative as deemed necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined by the secretary to be urban food desert communities.

- 6. a. Using the standards and conditions, and the licensing or permitting procedures developed by the department in accordance with paragraph (1) of subsection b. of section 4 of this act, the department shall establish a network of fresh mobile vendors to provide fresh produce for sale to residents in urban food desert communities throughout the State.
- b. In establishing a network of fresh mobile vendors, the department may solicit or approve participation by in-State or out-of-State produce farmers, collaborative farmers' organizations, or private, non-profit, or governmental entities that are engaged in fresh produce rescue efforts, such as the rescue efforts employed by the New Jersey Agricultural Society in its "Farmers Against Hunger" program. The department shall encourage the State's produce farmers to participate in the initiative as fresh mobile vendors.

The department shall make every reasonable effort to ensure, through the adoption of appropriate regulatory requirements or otherwise, that a consistent, year-round supply of reasonably priced fresh produce, sufficient to satisfy the fresh produce needs of residents in all urban food desert communities in the State, will be made available by the network of fresh mobile vendors.

- 7. a. Any person may participate as a consumer in the Fresh Mobiles Initiative.
  - b. A person who is currently enrolled as a participant in:
  - (1) the federal food stamp assistance program;
  - (2) the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;
- (3) the federal WIC program;
  - (4) the New Jersey Supplementary Food Stamp Program;

- 8. a. The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to receive and expend, for the purposes specified in subsection b. of this section, any moneys that are obtained thereby through:
- (1) appropriations or allocations of funds to the department for purposes consistent with this act;
- (2) grant or loan awards made available to the department for purposes consistent with this act;
- (3) direct contributions, gifts, legacies, bequests, or endowments for purposes consistent with this act; and

9. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Senate Economic Growth Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 2728 with committee amendments.

This bill, as amended, would authorize the Department of Agriculture ("department") to establish a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State – i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

The amended bill would require the department to: 1) establish qualification standards for, and issue licenses or permits to, fresh mobile vendors and fresh mobile venues (i.e., food trucks); 2) designate vendor supply areas in the State's urban food desert communities; and 3) develop nutrition-related educational materials and purchasing incentives for use in the initiative.

The amended bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture ("secretary") to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and directs the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the secretary is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The bill requires the secretary to evaluate annually the efficacy of the initiative and make modifications as necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined to be urban food desert communities.

The amended bill provides that government-issued food vouchers from any State or federal nutrition or income assistance program may be used as payment for fruits and vegetables that are purchased from the vendors. The secretary would be authorized under the amended bill to establish and maintain a fund, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," and to receive and deposit into the fund any moneys received by the department for the bill's purposes. Under the bill, the secretary would be authorized to expend the moneys contained in the fund in order to: 1) advertise the initiative; 2) develop and distribute educational materials associated with the initiative; 3) offset the department's costs in administering the initiative; and 4) finance any necessary studies or other activity that is consistent with the purposes of the initiative.

The committee amendments:

- 1) require the department, in establishing a network of food mobile venders, to use, to the maximum extent practicable, in-State produce farmers, collaborative farmers' organizations, or private, non-profit, or governmental entities engaged in fresh produce rescue efforts;
- 2) add the New Jersey Federation of Food Banks as another example of a governmental entity engaged in fresh produce rescue efforts; and
- 3) exclude funds allocated for the State Food Purchase Program from those that may be used to implement the bill.

As amended and reported by the committee, Senate Bill No. 2728 is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3688 (1R), which was also amended and reported by the committee on this date.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 2728 (1R).

The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State--i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

Specifically, the bill would require the department to: 1) establish qualification standards for, and issue licenses or permits to, fresh mobile vendors and fresh mobile venues (or food trucks); 2) designate vendor supply areas in the State's urban food desert communities; and 3) develop nutrition-related educational materials and purchasing incentives for use in the initiative.

The bill also directs the Secretary of Agriculture to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and directs the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the secretary is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The bill requires the secretary to evaluate annually the efficacy of the initiative and make modifications as necessary to maximize its positive impact on the residents of areas of the State that are determined to be urban food desert communities.

The bill further provides that government-issued food vouchers from any State or federal nutrition or income assistance program may be used as payment for fruits and vegetables that are purchased from the vendors. The secretary would be authorized under the bill to establish and maintain a fund, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," and to receive and deposit into the fund any moneys received by the department for the bill's purposes. Under the bill, the secretary would be authorized to expend the moneys contained in the fund in order to: 1) advertise the initiative; 2) develop and distribute educational materials associated with the initiative; 3) offset the department's costs in administering the initiative; and 4) finance any necessary studies or other activity that is consistent with the purposes of the initiative.

As considered by the committee, Senate Bill No. 2728 (1R) is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3688 (2R), as also considered by the committee.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**:

The Department of Agriculture would incur certain expenses to operate the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." Based upon information provided informally by the department, these costs might be about \$380,000 per year, with two-thirds of the funds going for staff and the remainder for advertising and publications costs. The department would expect a very small offsetting increase in fees associated with the program. To the extent that the department implemented the provisions of the bill that permit financial incentives for the program, the annual costs would be greater. One incentive scenario would entail an annual cost of \$1,000,000.

The bill does not identify a specific funding source for the program.

- The bill requires the Department of Agriculture to design, develop, and implement a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, and adopt rules and regulations necessary to administer and regulate the program.
- The Department of Agriculture is required to establish standards, qualifications, and conditions for fresh mobile vendors, and issue licenses or permits to persons qualified under those standards.
- The bill requires the Department of Agriculture to develop educational and informational materials for distribution to consumers, and evaluate the efficacy of the program on an annual basis.
- The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) cannot estimate the fiscal impact of this bill due to a lack of sufficient data. However, the OLS estimates the Department of Agriculture would incur some additional labor and material costs to establish, implement, administer, and regulate the program as required by the bill.



#### **BILL DESCRIPTION**

Senate Bill No. 2728 (1R) of 2011 authorizes the Department of Agriculture to establish and regulate a Statewide mobile farmers' market program, to be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Initiative." The initiative would be designed to provide improved access to fresh produce by residents of urban "food desert" communities in the State – i.e., communities wherein residents have little or no access to fresh produce or other nutritious foods, due to an absence of supermarkets, grocery stores, and farmers' markets.

The bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture to select a minimum of one city in each of the three regions of the State, northern, central, and southern New Jersey, and the department to implement the Fresh Mobiles Initiative in those cities. Furthermore, the secretary is directed to designate the entire city or certain areas within the city as an urban food desert community, and additional cities or municipalities for inclusion in the initiative, at the secretary's discretion. The bill requires the department to identify, on its Internet website, the selected cities, and the vendor supply areas at which, and the times during which, fresh mobile vendors would be accessible to community residents. The secretary is authorized to establish and maintain a special account, which would be known as the "New Jersey Fresh Mobiles Operation Fund," to receive and expend any moneys that are obtained through appropriations, grants, loan awards, direct contributions, gifts, legacies, bequests, endowments, or any other source for purposes consistent with this bill.

#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### EXECUTIVE BRANCH

According to informal information provided by the Department of Agriculture, the total estimated cost to implement and administer the mobile fresh produce markets is \$1.38 million. This amount includes \$1 million that the department proposes as a monetary incentive to those participating vendors that meet the standards of the program, as well as \$367,000 in costs which include \$260,000 for staff, \$75,000 for advertising, \$40,000 for the production and printing of educational materials, and \$5,000 for data processing. Revenue of approximately \$13,000 generated from fees from the issuance of licenses to approximately 50 vendors at \$250 each to offset part of the cost to the program. The monetary incentive is based on mileage reimbursement for 50 vendors at an estimated cost of \$375,000, and a reimbursement of up to 50 percent of the product cost for 50 vendors estimated at \$625,000.

#### OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS cannot estimate the fiscal impact of this bill due to a lack of sufficient data. However, the OLS estimates the Department of Agriculture would incur some additional labor and material costs on an on-going basis to establish, implement, administer, and regulate the Statewide mobile farmers' market program as required by the bill.
