AN ACT concerning the health of student-athletes and supplementing ³P.L.1984, c.203 (C.45:9-37.35 et seq.) and chapter 40 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. A concussion is caused by a blow or motion to the head or body that disrupts the normal functioning of the brain, and can cause significant and sustained neuropsychological impairments including, but not limited to, problem solving, planning, memory, and behavioral problems;
- b. The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that 300,000 concussions are sustained during sport-related activity in the United States, and more than 62,000 concussions are sustained each year in high-school contact sports;
- c. Although concussions are one of the most commonly reported injuries in children and adolescents who participate in sports and recreational activities, little effort and resources have been committed to inform athletes, coaches, and parents and guardians about the causes and symptoms of concussions;
- d. If a person sustains a second concussion while still having symptoms of a previous concussion, it can lead to the severe impairment and even the death of the victim, and is referred to as second-impact syndrome; and
- e. In order to ensure the safety of student-athletes, it is imperative that athletes, coaches, and parents and guardians are educated about the nature and treatment of concussions and other sports-related ³[brain] <u>head</u> injuries, and that all measures are taken to prevent a student-athlete from experiencing second-impact syndrome.

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2. a. The ³[Commissioner] Department of Education ³[, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services,] shall ³work to develop ³and implement, by the 2011-2012 school year, and an amount and area concerning the prevention, risk, and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes. As a component of this awareness program, the commissioner shall develop a brain injury fact sheet that provides information about sports-related concussions and other brain injuries. The brain injury fact sheet shall include, but need not be limited to:

- (1) information concerning the most effective means of preventing concussions and other brain injuries to ensure the safety of student-athletes;
- (2) information identifying the signs and symptoms indicative of concussions and other brain injuries;
- (3) information concerning the short and long-term dangers of concussions and other brain injuries; and
 - (4) information concerning

- interscholastic athletic head injury safety training program. The program shall be completed by a school physician, a person who coaches a public school district or nonpublic school interscholastic sport, and an athletic trainer involved in a public or nonpublic school interscholastic sports program. The safety training program shall include, but need not be limited to, the following:
- (1) the recognition of the symptoms of head and neck injuries, concussions, and injuries related to second-impact syndrome; and
- (2)³ the appropriate amount of time to delay the return to sports competition or practice of a student-athlete who has sustained a concussion or other ³[brain] head³ injury.
- ³[The commissioner shall update the fact sheet as necessary and shall make copies available to nonpublic schools upon request.
- b. Beginning with the 2011-2012 school year, the Commissioner of Education shall annually distribute the brain injury fact sheet to all school districts in the State.
- c. A school district shall distribute the fact sheet annually to all student-athletes, parents or guardians of student-athletes, coaches, and athletic trainers. The district shall require that the student-athlete and his parent or guardian both sign a copy of the fact sheet to acknowledge that they have read and understood the information provided in the fact sheet.
- b. The department shall update the safety training program as necessary to ensure that it reflects the most current information available on the nature, risk, and treatment of sports-related concussions and other head injuries.

The Assembly Education Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 2743 with committee amendments.

As amended, this bill requires the Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, to develop an awareness program concerning the prevention, risk, and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes. The awareness program will include the following components:

- (1) the development by the commissioner of a brain injury fact sheet that provides information concerning the prevention, symptoms, and dangers of concussions and other brain injuries. The fact sheet will also include information on the appropriate amount of time to delay a student's return to competition; and
- (2) the annual distribution of the fact sheet to student-athletes, parents, coaches, and athletic trainers.

The bill also requires school districts to develop a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries. The written policy will also include the procedure to be followed when it is suspected that a student-athlete has sustained a concussion or other brain injury.

Under the bill, a student-athlete who sustains or is suspected of having sustained a concussion or other brain injury while engaged in a sports competition or practice is required to be immediately removed from the sports competition or practice, in accordance with the school district's written policy. The student-athlete may not participate in further sports activity until he is evaluated by a physician trained in the evaluation and management of concussions, and receives written clearance from that physician to return to competition or practice.

The committee amended the bill to direct a school district to review recommendations made by organizations with expertise in preventing or treating sports-related concussions and other brain injuries in student-athletes when developing its written policy on the matter. In its original form, the bill only required a district to review the policies of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

with Assembly Floor Amendments (Proposed by Assemblyman DIEGNAN)

ADOPTED: JUNE 21, 2010

These Assembly floor amendments specify that the Commissioner of Education, rather than each school district, will develop a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes. School districts would be required to implement the policy no later than the 2011-2012 school year. The amendments also require that, when developing the policy, the commissioner review the recommendations developed by the New Jersey Brain Injury Association Concussion in Sports Steering Committee. The amendments also provide that a student-athlete who has been removed from a competition or practice after sustaining or being suspected of having sustained a concussion, may be evaluated by a licensed health care provider who is trained in the evaluation and management of concussions. In its current form, the bill only allows a trained physician to evaluate the student-athlete.

The Senate Education Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 2743 (2R) with committee amendments.

As amended, this bill requires the Department of Education to develop an interscholastic athletic head injury safety training program. The program must be completed by a school physician, a person who coaches a public school district or nonpublic school interscholastic sport, and an athletic trainer involved in a public or nonpublic school interscholastic sports program. The bill also directs the department to develop an educational fact sheet that provides information about sports-related concussions and other head injuries. A school district or a nonpublic school that participates in an interscholastic sports program must distribute the educational fact sheet annually to the parents or guardians of student-athletes and must obtain a signed acknowledgment of the receipt of the fact sheet by the student-athlete and his parent or guardian.

The bill requires each school district to develop a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other head injuries among student-athletes. The policy must include the procedure to be followed when it is suspected that a student-athlete has sustained a concussion or other head injury. To assist school districts in developing these policies, the Commissioner of Education must develop a model policy applicable to grades kindergarten through 12. The model policy must be issued no later than March 31, 2011.

Under the bill, a student who participates in an interscholastic sports program and who sustains or is suspected of having sustained a concussion or other head injury while engaged in a sports competition or practice must be immediately removed from the sports competition or practice. A student-athlete who is removed from competition or practice cannot participate in further sports activity until he is evaluated by a physician or other licensed healthcare provider trained in the evaluation and management of concussions, and receives written

clearance from a physician trained in the evaluation and management of concussions to return to competition or practice.

The bill provides that a school district or nonpublic school will not be liable for the injury or death of a person due to the action or inaction of persons employed by, or under contract with, a youth sports team organization that operates on school grounds, if the organization provides proof of insurance and a statement of compliance with the school district or nonpublic school's policies for the management of concussions and other head injuries.

Finally, the bill requires each person licensed as an athletic trainer, as a condition for biennial license renewal, to complete 24 hours of continuing education credits, including a specific number of credits of instruction on topics related to concussions and head injuries.

The committee amended the bill to provide that:

- the interscholastic athletic head injury safety training program will be completed by a school physician, a person who coaches a public school district or nonpublic school interscholastic sport, and an athletic trainer involved in a public or nonpublic school interscholastic sports program;
- each school district, rather than the Commissioner of Education, will develop a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other head injuries among student-athletes;
- the Commissioner of Education will develop a model policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other head injuries among student-athletes which will be reviewed by districts in developing their own policies;
- a school district or nonpublic school will not be liable for the injury or death of a person due to the action or inaction of persons employed by, or under contract with, a youth sports team organization that operates on school grounds, if the organization provides certain documentation; and
- each person licensed as an athletic trainer must, as a condition for biennial license renewal, complete 24 hours of continuing education credits, including a specific number of credits of instruction on topics related to concussions and head injuries.

As reported by the committee, this bill is identical to the Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 2106, which also was reported by the committee on this same date.

1 AN ACT concerning the health of student-athletes and 2 supplementing chapter 40 of Title 18A of the New Jersey 3 Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. A concussion is caused by a blow or motion to the head or body that disrupts the normal functioning of the brain, and can cause significant and sustained neuropsychological impairments including, but not limited to, problem solving, planning, memory, and behavioral problems;
- b. The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that 300,000 concussions are sustained during sport-related activity in the United States, and more than 62,000 concussions are sustained each year in high-school contact sports;
- c. Although concussions are one of the most commonly reported injuries in children and adolescents who participate in sports and recreational activities, little effort and resources have been committed to inform athletes, coaches, and parents and guardians about the causes and symptoms of concussions;
- d. If a person sustains a second concussion while still having symptoms of a previous concussion, it can lead to the severe impairment and even the death of the victim, and is referred to as second-impact syndrome; and
- e. In order to ensure the safety of student-athletes, it is imperative that athletes, coaches, and parents and guardians are educated about the nature and treatment of concussions and other sports-related brain injuries, and that all measures are taken to prevent a student-athlete from experiencing second-impact syndrome.

- 2. a. The Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, shall develop an awareness program concerning the prevention, risk, and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes. As a component of this awareness program, the commissioner shall develop a brain injury fact sheet that provides information about sports-related concussions and other brain injuries. The brain injury fact sheet shall include, but need not be limited to:
- (1) information concerning the most effective means of preventing concussions and other brain injuries to ensure the safety of student-athletes;
- (2) information identifying the signs and symptoms indicative of concussions and other brain injuries;

- (3) information concerning the short and long-term dangers of concussions and other brain injuries; and
- (4) information concerning the appropriate amount of time to delay the return to sports competition or practice of a student-athlete who has sustained a concussion or other brain injury.

The commissioner shall update the fact sheet as necessary and shall make copies available to nonpublic schools upon request.

- b. Beginning with the 2011-2012 school year, the Commissioner of Education shall annually distribute the brain injury fact sheet to all school districts in the State.
- c. A school district shall distribute the fact sheet annually to all student-athletes, parents or guardians of student-athletes, coaches, and athletic trainers. The district shall require that the student-athlete and his parent or guardian both sign a copy of the fact sheet to acknowledge that they have read and understood the information provided in the fact sheet.

3. a. Each school district shall develop and implement, by the 2011-2012 school year, a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes. The policy shall include, but need not be limited to, the procedure to be followed when it is suspected that a student-athlete has sustained a concussion or other brain injury. A school district shall review the policies established by the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association, the National Collegiate Athletic Association, and recommendations made by other organizations with expertise in the area of preventing or treating sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes when developing the district policy.

The policy shall be reviewed annually by a physician trained in the evaluation and management of concussions, athletic trainer, and coach, and shall be updated as necessary to ensure that it reflects the most current information available on the prevention, risk, and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries.

b. A student-athlete who sustains or is suspected of having sustained a concussion or other brain injury while engaged in a sports competition or practice shall be immediately removed from the sports competition or practice in accordance with the school district's written policy. A student-athlete who is removed from competition or practice shall not participate in further sports activity until he is evaluated by a physician trained in the evaluation and management of concussions, and receives written clearance from that physician to return to competition or practice.

4. This act shall take effect immediately.

| STATEMENT |
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This bill requires the Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, to develop an awareness program concerning the prevention, risk, and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries among student-athletes. The awareness program will include the following components:

- (1) the development by the commissioner of a brain injury fact sheet that provides information concerning the prevention, symptoms, and dangers of concussions and other brain injuries. The fact sheet will also include information on the appropriate amount of time to delay a student's return to competition; and
- (2) the annual distribution of the fact sheet to student-athletes, parents, coaches, and athletic trainers.

The bill also requires school districts to develop a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other brain injuries. The written policy will also include the procedure to be followed when it is suspected that a student-athlete has sustained a concussion or other brain injury.

Under the bill, a student-athlete who sustains or is suspected of having sustained a concussion or other brain injury while engaged in a sports competition or practice is required to be immediately removed from the sports competition or practice, in accordance with the school district's written policy. The student-athlete may not participate in further sports activity until he is evaluated by a physician trained in the evaluation and management of concussions, and receives written clearance from that physician to return to competition or practice.

SENATE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE, No. 2106

The Senate Education Committee favorably reports a Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 2106.

This substitute requires the Department of Education to develop an interscholastic athletic head injury safety training program. The program must be completed by a school physician, a person who coaches a public school district or nonpublic school interscholastic sport, and an athletic trainer involved in a public or nonpublic school interscholastic sports program. The substitute also directs the department to develop an educational fact sheet that provides information about sports-related concussions and other head injuries. A school district or a nonpublic school that participates in an interscholastic sports program must distribute the educational fact sheet annually to the parents or guardians of student-athletes and must obtain a signed acknowledgment of the receipt of the fact sheet by the student-athlete and his parent or guardian.

The substitute requires each school district to develop a written policy concerning the prevention and treatment of sports-related concussions and other head injuries among student-athletes. The policy must include the procedure to be followed when it is suspected that a student-athlete has sustained a concussion or other head injury. To assist school districts in developing these policies, the Commissioner of Education must develop a model policy applicable to grades kindergarten through 12. The model policy must be issued no later than March 31, 2011.

Under the substitute, a student who participates in an interscholastic sports program and who sustains or is suspected of having sustained a concussion or other head injury while engaged in a sports competition or practice must be immediately removed from the sports competition or practice. A student-athlete who is removed from competition or practice cannot participate in further sports activity until he is evaluated by a physician or other licensed healthcare provider trained in the evaluation and management of concussions, and receives written clearance from a physician trained in the evaluation and management of concussions to return to competition or practice.

The substitute provides that a school district or nonpublic school will not be liable for the injury or death of a person due to the action or inaction of persons employed by, or under contract with, a youth sports team organization that operates on school grounds, if the organization provides proof of insurance and a statement of compliance with the school district or nonpublic school's policies for the management of concussions and other head injuries.

Finally, the substitute requires each person licensed as an athletic trainer, as a condition for biennial license renewal, to complete 24 hours of continuing education credits, including a specific number of credits of instruction on topics related to concussions and head injuries.

As reported by the committee, this substitute is identical to Assembly Bill No. 2743 (2R) with committee amendments, which also was reported by the committee on this same date.
