An Act concerning judges of the Superior Court in certain counties, amending N. J. S. 2A:2-1 and P. L. 1983, c. 405.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State

STATEMENT

This bill provides for two additional judges of the Superior Court in Hudson county. The bill incorporates the amendments made to N. J. S. 2A:2-1 by chapters 405, 498, 505 and 556 of 1983 which respectively merged the county court, county district court and juvenile and domestic relations court judges into the Superior

Court and added additional judges to Atlantic, Union and Ocean counties.

This bill also amends section 11 of 1983, c. 405 (C. 2A:2-1.3) to allow these additional judges to be "phased in" over the course of this year. This "phase in" method was employed in the recent laws which added additional judges to Atlantic, Union and Ocean counties. Hudson county would be responsible for funding 50% of the cost of the salary of the judges until December 31, 1984.

Governor Thomas H. Kean has signed the following bills: Trenton, N. J.

S-1058, sponsored by State Senate Edward T. O'Connor, Jr., D-Hudson, which creases the number of Superior Court judges in Hudson County from 14 to 16.

<u>S-1430</u>, sponsored by State Senator John A. Lynch, D-Middlesex, which gives the counties a temporary, one-year extension for certain budget cap exemptions which were recently disallowed by the Attorney General. The bill allows counties to ontinue to take an exemption for tax levies used to operate certain government-supported facilities such as county hospitals and nursing homes.

S-1461, sponsored by State Senator Walter Rand, D-Camden, which allows a sudget eap exemption for Deptford Township to pay budget overexpenditures. The sownship overspent its 1983 budget by approximately \$1.5 million. Without the exemption the payment of overexpenditures would have to be paid from within the approximately the municipality without sufficient funds to pay other necessary bligations.

A-1169, sponsored by Assemblyman John P. Doyle, D-Ocean, which updates the Municipal Land Use Law. The bill incorporates into the law a series of technical mendments recommended by the Municipal Land Use Drafting Committee convened by the League of Municipalities. The amendment address such issues as variances from moning ordinances, completeness of an application for development, resolutions stating teasons for approval or denial of an application for development and related areas.
