#### PRE-FILED FOR INTRODUCTION IN THE 1984 SESSION

By Assemblywoman PERUN, Assemblymen DORIA, SCHWARTZ, PATERNITI, PELLY, WATSON, NAPLES, CHARLES, HER-MAN, KARCHER, FELICE, BAER and MAZUR

An Act concerning the treatment and diagnosis of acquired immune deficiency syndrome and making an appropriation.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
- 2 of New Jersey:
- 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "AIDS
- 2 Assistance Act."
- 1 2. The Legislature finds that:
- 2 a. The effective identification, diagnosis, care and treatment of
- 3 persons who have contracted acquired immune deficiency syndrome,
- 4 commonly known as "AIDS," is of paramount public importance;
- 5 b. AIDS is thought to be the result of a virus or other highly
- 6 infectious agent which may be spread through bodily secretions,
- 7 especially blood and semen, or through an as yet unidentified
- 8 method of transmission;
- 9 c. The AIDS organism is responsible for the near total collapse
- 10 of the body's immune system, resulting in the susceptibility to
- 11 cancer and other fatal infections;
- 12 d. AIDS although first diagnosed in homosexual men is now
- 13 striking so many groups such as drug users, hemophiliacs, persons
- 14 who have received blood transfusions and Haitians, that its course
- 15 is currently unpredictable;
- 16 e. The spread of AIDS may be impossible to stop because the
- 17 AIDS organism can be dormant for months before it manifests

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f. People who have already been infected might not be aware of their exposure and may unknowingly infect hundreds more individuals:

g. Resultingly, the outbreak of AIDS has reached alarming proportions because of its highly contagious nature with New Jersey ranking fourth in the nation in the number of reported cases.

Jersey ranking fourth in the nation in the number of reported cases.
The Legislature further finds that researchers have no conclusive evidence regarding the detection, treatment, cure or prevention of AIDS; that many health care professionals are not yet familiar with the symptoms or treatment techniques of AIDS; that most victims are not aware that they have been exposed to AIDS and therefore, infect others; that, accordingly, the magnitude of the AIDS outbreak has not yet been realized.

Therefore, the Legislature declares that it is imperative that 33 34 programs be established for diagnosing and treating persons who have been exposed to AIDS, referring AIDS victims and their 35 36 families to sources of treatment and counseling, and providing an educational program to health care professionals to heighten their 37 38 awareness of the latest diagnostic procedures and treatment. The 39 Legislature further declares that a task force be established to 40 coordinate the medical and social services needed by AIDS victims.

### SPONSORS STATEMENT

This bill establishes a program in the Department of Health to educate the public and health care professionals about the diagnosis and treatment of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and to promote efforts to combat AIDS.

The bill requires the Commissioner of Health to: set up a public information campaign and a Statewide telephone hotline to provide information and referrals; establish a public appeal campaign to promote voluntary efforts by pharmaceutical companies, medical laboratories and health care facilities; and develop local support programs to provide early detection, counseling and referrals.

The bill also requires the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in Newark to establish an "AIDS Task Force Center" which would coordinate its efforts with the Department of Health to provide technical advice, diagnosis, treatment and counseling.

The bill appropriates \$75,000.00 to the Department of Health to carry out the AIDS program.

# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: FEBRUARY 6, 1984

The purpose of this bill is to establish a program within the Department of Health to educate the public and health care professionals about the diagnosis and treatment of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and promote efforts to combat AIDS.

The bill requires the Commissioner of Health to set up a public information campaign and a Statewide telephone hotline to provide information and referrals, and to develop support programs to provide early detection, counseling and referrals.

The bill appropriates \$75,000.00 to the Department of Health and, as amended by the committee, provides for the establishment of an "AIDS Education Center" at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (UMDNJ) in Newark. The center would provide conferences, symposia, and continuing medical education programs with the Department of Health. The committee deleted the provision establishing an "AIDS Task Force Center" at UMDNJ in Newark while retaining language that authorizes the university to serve as a resource center to assist AIDS victims and their families.

The committee further amended the bill to delete the requirement for a public appeal campaign by the Commissioner of Health to urge pharmaceutical companies, medical laboratories and health care facilities to volunteer resources, products or services to combat AIDS. The Department of Health contends that this kind of appeal would have little impact on the effort to deal with AIDS.

## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: MAY 17, 1984

As amended by committee, this bill establishes a program in the Department of Health to educate the public and health care professionals about the diagnosis and treatment of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and to promote efforts to combat AIDS.

The bill requires the Commissioner of Health to: set up a public information campaign and a Statewide telephone hotline to provide information and referrals; establish a program to educate health care professionals and others who come into contact with persons who have AIDS about the diagnosis and treatment of AIDS; and develop departmental and local support programs to provide early detection, counseling, social services and referrals to persons who suspect exposure to AIDS.

The bill also requires the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in cooperation with the Department of Health to serve as a resource center and offer diagnostic procedures, medical treatment and other services to assist persons with AIDS and their families. The bill appropriates \$75,000.00 to the Department of Health to carry out the AIDS program.

Committee amendments were adopted at the request of the sponsor. The amendments delete the provision that the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey establish an "AIDS Education Center."
