An Act to amend "An act concerning municipal services to certain streets which have not been designated as public highways, and the dedication thereof supplementing Title 40 of the Revised Statutes and repealing P. L. 1944, c. 35 and R. S. 40:150-1," approved October 27, 1975, P. L. 1975, c. 243.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. Section 1 of P. L. 1975, c. 243 (C. 40:67-23.1) is amended to 2 read as follows:

1. The governing body of every municipality may make, amend, 3 repeal and enforce ordinances to cause the governing body of the 4 5 municipality to repair and maintain and provide for the removal of snow, ice and other obstructions from, and provide for the 6 lighting of, any roads or streets upon which the travel is sufficient, 7 in the opinion of said governing body, to warrant such expendi-8 tures, even though such roads or streets shall not have been taken 9 over by said municipal governing body or dedicated and accepted 10 as public highways. The municipality may also provide for the 11 12collection of garbage placed at the curb of such streets, or for the reimbursement of *such* garbage collection costs *as the munici-13 pality may determine to have been reasonably* incurred by persons 13a 14 residing adjacent to such streets. Roads or streets so serviced, which are not shown on the official map of the municipality, may, at 15 the option of the governing body of said municipality, be suitably 16 improved in accordance with any requirements established pur-17 suant to * [the "Official Map and Building Permit Act (1953)," P. L. 18 N—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law. EXPLANATION-Matter printed in italics thus is new matter. Senate Bill No. 1448 would permit municipalities, by ordinance, to provide garbage collection services to residents living along private roads, or to reimburse those residents for garbage collection costs incurred.

Under current law, municipalities may, by ordinance, provide for the repair and maintenance of private roads, for the removal of snow, ice and obstructions, and for street lighting. The present law does not provide for reimbursement to the residents living along private roads for costs incurred, privately, for these purposes.

The Senate committee amendments correct a citation in the existing law to P. L. 1953, c. 434 (C. 40:55–1.30 et seq.) which has been repealed, and substitutes a correct citation to the "Municipal Land Use Law," P. L. 1975, c. 91 (C. 40:55D–1 et seq.). The amendments also direct that the municipality may reimburse residents along private roads for such costs incurred as the municipality determines to be reasonable. RELEASE: IMMEDIATE

Governor Thomas H. Kean today signed the following bills:

<u>SJR-19</u>, sponsored by Senator James W. Bornheimer (D-Middlesex), designates Square Dancing as the official American Folk Dance of New Jersey. The square dance was made the National Folk Dance of the United States by the Federal government earlier this year.

<u>S-1598</u>, sponsored by Senator Wayne Dumont (R-Warren), allows boards of education to make two-year contracts to buy materials which are needed on a recurring basis. The contracts can be renewed every year for up to three years after the initial contract has expired, but the cost of the new contract may not be increased by more than 20 percent over the three-year period. This bill is one of several meant to carry out the recommendations of a report issued in July 1982 by the Commission on Business Efficiency of the Public Schools.

<u>S-889</u>, sponsored by Senator Wynona Lipman (D-Essex), amends statutes which deal with inheritance by children born out of wedlock. The bill defines a person as the child of his or her natural parents whether or not they were married, and is intended to clarify the laws governing inheritance by illegitimate children.

<u>S-1952</u>, sponsored by Senator Garrett W. Hagedorn (R-Bergen), establishes a special exemption from the municipal cap law for Ridgewood, because of legal expenses which the municipality will incur during a lawsuit against the Hackensack Water Company. The exemption only lasts for the calender year 1983, and will allow the town to fit the legal fees into its budget.

<u>S-1448</u>, sponsored by Senator John F. Russo (D-Ocean), allows municipalities to collect garbage on private streets or to pay for such service; the bill is designed to permit towns to collect garbage from places like senior citizen communities and planned-unit developments.

<u>S-981</u>, sponsored by Senator Wayne Dumont (R-Warren), allows for military service to be given to a teacher who had been wrongly listed as a substitute teacher before his military service; military service credits apply only to permanent teachers.

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
