An Act concerning the operation of motorized bicycles and supplementing P. L. 1975, c. 250 (C. 39:4-14.3).

STATEMENT

This bill would establish stringent suspension periods for any juvenile under the age of 17 who is convicted more than once of violating any of the provisions of chapter 4 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes while operating a motorized bicycle. Juveniles of the ages of 15 or 16 are permitted to obtain a limited license to operate a motorized bicycle in this State. Chapter 4 codifies the New Jersey law of motor vehicle moving violations.

For a second violation, the juvenile would have his permit or license suspended for a period of 30 days. A subsequent violation would result in termination of the juvenile's privilege to operate a motorized bicycle until he qualified to obtain a standard license to operate a motor vehicle.

Pending legislation would give the municipal court jurisdiction in cases involving violations of the motor vehicle laws by persons operating motorized bicycles who are under the age of 17.

The purpose of the bill is to require suspension of moped driving privileges in cases where a pattern of poor driving habits have begun to emerge. The privilege of driving mopeds is afforded to young people under 17 in anticipation that they will develop good driving habits.

Legislation providing that interest earned on investment of revenue from the Casino Revenue Fund be credited to the fund was signed into law today by Governor Thomas H. Kean.

The bill, A-42, was sponsored by Assemblyman Michael Matthews, D-Atlantic.

The Governor noted that he had supported the proposal during his campaign last year and that it is appropriate for these funds to be used now that the voters have approved additional uses for the casino tax revenue.

The Governor also signed three other bills:

A-761, sponsored by Assembly Speaker Alan Karcher, D-Middlesex, to simplify the title reassignment procedures now in use in the Division of Motor Vehicles.

A-762, sponsored by Karcher, to permit the Division of Motor Vehicles to impose a 30-day suspension of a license for a moped driver upon a second offense.
