An Act relating to emergency warning lights for members of volunteer fire companies and volunteer first aid or rescue squads, \*[and]\* supplementing chapter 3 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes \*and repealing P. L. 1971, c. 352\*.

Assembly Bill No. 645 would authorize members of volunteer fire companies and of first aid and rescue squads to display and use emergency warning lights on their cars. Such emergency warning lights could be used only in answering emergency and fire calls. The bill specifies the nature, number and placement of such lights. The Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles is directed to prepare identification cards under his signature to be forwarded to the mayor or chief executive of the municipality. The mayor would countersign and issue the cards to such volunteer members, who would be required to be in possession of the cards while using the warning lights and may not mount such lights without having received such a card. Persons possessing these lights are not entitled to any privileges or exemptions denied to other drivers and shall obey all traffic laws. Persons possessing these lights shall, however, be yielded the right of way as other emergency vehicles are. The bill provides for a \$50.00 fine and for the revocation by the Director of Motor Vehicles of the privilege to display such lights, if such lights are willfully misused.

Under P. L. 1971, c. 352 (C. 39:3-54.1 et seq.), volunteer firemen and first aid and rescue squad members are entitled to display on their cars, one special identification light. This is a flashing blue light required to be displayed on the front of the car, no higher than the car's headlights. This light is authorized by certificate of the chief officer of the volunteer fire company.

The committee amendments reflect the committee's belief that warning lights for volunteer firemen and first aid and rescue squad members should remain blue in color in order to avoid confusion with fire and police vehicles displaying red warning lights. The committee also determined that such lights should be temporary in nature, and easily removable. The committee did, however, believe that the restrictions placed upon the use of these warning lights in this bill are superior to those contained in P. L. 1971, c. 352, and, therefore, chose to repeal that statute.

The committee acknowledged that volunteer firemen and first aid and rescue squads members should be able to respond quickly to calls, and that more prominently displayed warning lights, under the proper safeguards, would promote this ability, while reducing traffic confusion and hazard.

This bill would authorize the use of blue lens emergency warning lights by bona fide members of voluntary fire companies or volunteer first aid or rescue squads. The bill provides that such lights may only be used while answering a fire or emergency call and specifically enumerates how they may be mounted on the vehicle.

The Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles is required to prepare identification cards for distribution by municipalities as permits to display and operate the light authorized by the act. Persons must have a permit on them while displaying such lights.

Drivers of nonemergency vehicles under the act are required to yield the right of way to any member of a volunteer fire company or volunteer first aid or rescue squad displaying such light in the same manner as provided for authorized emergency vehicles in R. S. 39:4–92.

Willful display of emergency lights in violation of the act by persons authorized to display subjects the offender to a fine of not more than \$50.00 and the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles may suspend or revoke his privilege to display.

An Assembly amendment provides for the repeal of P. L. 1971, c. 352 (C. 39:3-54.1 et seq.).

The purpose of the bill is to permit a new and easily identified emergency warning device to be used by emergency volunteers on their own vehicles in order to assist them in getting to emergencies more easily.

Covernor Brendan Byrne today signed into law  $\underline{A-645}$ , sponsored by Assemblyman Thomas J. Deverin, D-Middlesex, which allows volunteer firemen and first aid or rescue squad members to use emergency warning lights on their own cars.

The bill specifies the maximum size and candle power of these lights. The bill also requires that the temporary removable lights be used only while the vehicle is being used to answer an emergency call.

Prior to this legislation, only members of volunteer fire companies were permitted to use these lights. That law allowed only one light to be used and required that it be placed at the front of the vehicle on the grill of the car.

This legislation permits the lights to be placed either on the roof of the car or on the windshield columns.

The bill also provides for a \$50 fine for anyone who willfully violates the provisions of this act.
