P.L.1992, CHAPTER 30, upproved June 29, 1992 1992 Senate No. 407

AN ACT concerning eligibility for the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled program and supplementing P.L.1975, c.194 (C.30:4D-20 et seq.).

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. Funds received from the federal government pursuant to sections 105 and 106 of the "Civil Liberties Act of 1988," Pub.L.100-383 (50 U.S.C. App. § 1989b-4 and § 1989b-5) shall not be counted as income for the purpose of determining eligibility for the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled program established pursuant to P.L.1975, c.194 (C.30:4D-20 et seq.).

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2. This act shall take effect immediately.

 This bill excludes reparations to Japanese American residents of New Jersey pursuant to the "Civil Liberties Act of 1988," Pub.L.100-383, from countable income for purposes of determining eligibility for the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program.

Section 104 of Pub.L.100-383 established the "Civil Liberties Public Education Fund" to provide individual restitution payments of \$20,000 to each person of Japanese descent who was relocated, interned or otherwise deprived of liberty during World War II as a result of the exclusion, relocation and detention policy adopted by the federal government. These payments were recommended by the federal Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians established in 1980.

Although Pub.L. 100-383 specifies that the restitution payments are not to be included as income or resources for purposes of determining eligibility for benefit programs which receive federal financing (such as Medicaid, Aid to Pamilies with Dependent Children, food stamps and Supplemental Security Income), this exclusion would not apply to the PAAD program which receives no federal funding. This bill will ensure that Japanese American residents of New Jersey who receive the reparations to which they are entitled under federal law are not ineligible for the PAAD program for reasons which would not render them ineligible for federally funded benefit programs in this State.

Excludes repositions to Jepanese American from amusclic income in determining PAAD objilities.

The Senate Health and Human Services Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 407.

This bill excludes reparations to Japanese American residents of New Jersey pursuant to the "Civil Liberties Act of 1988," Pub.L.100-383, from countable income for purposes of determining eligibility for the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program.

Section 104 of Pub.L.100-383 established the "Civil Liberties Public Education Fund" to provide individual restitution payments of \$20,000 to each person of Japanese descent who was relocated, interned or otherwise deprived of liberty during World War II as a result of the exclusion, relocation and detention policy adopted by the federal government. 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The committee favorably reported this bill as S2360 during the last legislative session.

Senate Bill No. 407 of 1992 excludes reparations to Japanese-American residents of New Jersey pursuant to the "Wartime Relocation of Civilians," Pub.L.100-383, from countable income for purposes of determining eligibility for the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program.

The Department of Human Services and Office of Management and Budget have not provided any fiscal information on the legislation.

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) is not able to estimate the cost of the legislation as the number of Japanese-American residents affected by this legislation who may become eligible for PAAD are not known.

OLS, however, is of the opinion that the legislation's fiscal impact would be minimal in view of total PAAD and Lifeline related expenditures. The legislative history of Pub. L. 100-383 does not indicate the number of persons in New Jersey who may be eligible for reparations, and the number of Japanese-Americans currently enrolled in PAAD is not known as the PAAD application does not request information on the individual's racial/ethnic background.

This legislative fiscal estimate has been produced by the Office of Legislative Services due to the failure of the Executive Branch to respond to our request for a fiscal note.
