P.L. 1991, CHAPTER 76, approved March 28, 1991 1990 Assembly No. 4016

AN ACT concerning pilotage of vessels operating within the waters of this State, amending R.S.12:8-8, R.S.12:8-10, R.S.12:8-16 and R.S.12:8-35, and supplementing chapter 8 of Title 12 of the Revised Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. R.S.12:8-8 is amended to read as follows:

12:8-8. Whenever the services of a pilot by way of Sandy Hook is required to pilot a vessel sailing from any other port in the United States bound in or over the bar of Sandy Hook or into any bays, rivers, harbors, or ports of the waters of this State between Sandy Hook, in the county of Monmouth and the city of Atlantic City, in the county of Atlantic, written application for the pilot must first be made by the master, owner or consignee of the vessel to the commissioners. The commissioners shall thereupon designate the pilots so to be employed in rotation, according to the designated number of boats in service, beginning with the lowest number, so that the company of every boat in the service shall in their turn have the right to avail of such employment. The commissioners shall enforce this regulation by proper by-laws.

2. R.S.12:8-10 is amended to read as follows:

12:8-10. The pilot boats belonging in whole or in part to the United New Jersey Sandy Hook Pilots' Benevolent Association, or to the United New Jersey Sandy Hook Pilots' Association, shall be the only pilot boats in the New Jersey Sandy Hook pilot service, or in any bays, rivers, harbors, or ports of the waters of this State between Sandy Hook, in the county of Monmouth and the city of Atlantic City, in the county of Atlantic. Apprentices shall be attached to the pilot boats of said association and the pilot boats may have more than one apprentice.

The apprentices shall be entered in the books of the commissioners in the name of and indentured to the executive committee of the association or the board of directors of the association, and shall serve as apprentices under the laws of this State.

Said executive committee or board of directors shall have the sole control of all apprentices until they have served the full term of four years and shall see that all apprentices entered in

the commissioners' books in its name are fully instructed in their duties in such manner as is necessary to fully qualify them in every respect to perform the duties of a Sandy Hook pilot. (cf: R.S.12:8-10)

12:8-16. Whenever a person shall produce to the Covernor, or, in case of his absence from the seat of government, to the Secretary of State, a certificate of appointment from the commissioners, or a majority of them, the Governor or the Secretary of State, as the case may be, shall administer to such person the following oath:

"I, A.B., do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will well and faithfully, and according to the best of my skill and knowledge, execute and discharge the business and duty of a branch pilot for the bar, Jersey City, Newark, and Perth Amboy and harbor of Sandy Hook, and any bays, rivers, harbors, or ports of the waters of this State between Sandy Hook, in the county of Monmouth and the city of Atlantic City, in the county of Atlantic, and that I will at all times use my best endeavors to repair on board all ships and vessels that I shall see and conceive to be bound for, or coming into, or going out of the harbor and bodies of water aforesaid, unless I am well assured that some other licensed pilot is then on board the same; and I do further swear (or affirm), that I will, from time to time and at all times, make the best dispatch in my power to bring safely over the bar at Sandy Hook and into any bays, rivers, harbors, or ports of the waters of this State between Sandy Hook, in the county of Monmouth and the city of Atlantic City, in the county of Atlantic, every vessel committed to my care in coming in or going out; and that I will, from time to time and at all times, truly observe, follow, and fulfill, to the best of my skill, ability, and knowledge, all such orders and directions as I shall or may receive from the commissioners of pilotage, relative to all matters or things that may appertain to the duty of a pilot."

The Secretary of State shall charge a fee of \$25.00 for administering the oath.

4. R.S.12:8-35 is amended to read as follows:

12:8-35. All masters of foreign vessels and vessels from a foreign port, and all vessels sailing under register, bound in or over the bar of Sandy Hook or into any bays, rivers, harbors, or ports of the waters of this State between Sandy Hook, in the county of Monmouth and the city of Atlantic City, in the county of Atlantic, shall take a licensed pilot, or in case of refusal to take such pilot, the master, owner or consignee shall pay the pilotage as if one had been employed, and such pilotage shall be paid to the pilot first speaking or offering his services as pilot to such vessel.

5. (New section) The Board of Commissioners of Pilotage of

the State of New Jersey. Division of Coastal Resources. Department of Environmental Protection, shall establish rules and regulations regarding fees for inbound, outbound, and transporting vessels operating within a bay, river, harbor, or port between Sandy Hook in the county of Monmouth, and the city of Atlantic City in the county of Atlantic.

- 6. (New section) Nothing in this amendatory and supplementary act shall be construed to extend the requirement of pilotage to any type of vassel that is not required to be piloted pursuant to chapter 8 of Title 12 of the Revised Statutes, and any rules or regulations established thereunder by the Board of Commissioners of Pilotage of the State of New Jersey, Division of Coastal Resources, Department of Environmental Protection.
- 7. This act shall take effect 60 days after enactment, but the Board of Commissioners of Pilotage of the State of New Jersey, Division of Coastal Resources, Department of Environmental Protection, may take any anticipatory action as may be necessary for the implementation of this act on the effective date thereof.

ASSEMBLY LABOR COMMITTEE STATEMENT TO

The Assembly Labor Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 4016.

This bill amends various sections of chapter 8 of Title 12 of the Revised Statutes to expand the requirement that State-licensed pilots be used for foreign vessels, vessels operating from a foreign port, vessels sailing under register, and certain vessels sailing from other ports in the United States so that the requirement applies to those vessels when they are in the rivers, bays, ports, and harbors on the Atlantic coast between Sandy Hook and Atlantic City. At present, those requirements apply only to vessels bound in or over the bar of Sandy Hook, that is, vessels which have destinations in Lower New York Bay, Upper New York Bay or adjoining rivers, channels, ports or harbors.

The bill also directs the Board of Commissioners of Pilotage to establish any rules or regulations regarding pilotage in order to effectuate the provisions of the bill.

The purpose of the bill is to extend the use of State-licensed pilots, with their high levels of training and experience, and therefore reduce the possibility of marine disasters such as collisions and pollution-causing oil spills.

The Senate Environmental Quality Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 4016.

This bill would expand the requirement that State-licensed pilots be used for foreign vessels, vessels operating from a foreign port, vessels sailing under register, and certain vessels sailing from other ports in the United States when they are in the rivers, bays, ports, and harbors of the Atlantic coast between Sandy Hook and Atlantic City. At present, the requirement applies only to vessels bound in or over the bar of Sandy Hook, that is, vessels with destinations in Lower New York Bay, Upper New York Bay, or adjoining rivers, channels, ports, or harbors.

The bill also directs the Board of Commissioners of Pilotage to establish rules and regulations to effectuate the provisions of the bill.

Pilots licensed by the State of New Jersey, as opposed to federally-licensed pilots, must pass more stringent training and experience requirements to be qualified as State pilots. Expanded use of State-licensed pilots along the coast of New Jersey will reduce the possibility of marine disasters such as collisions and pollution-causing oil spills.

GOVERNOR FLORIO SIGNS LEGISLATION SETTING MORE STRINGENT STANDARDS FOR PILOTS IN NEW JERSEY WATERS

BAYONNE -- Pilots travelling in New Jersey waters will now have to meet more stringent requirements under legislation signed by Governor Jim Florio today in an effort to decrease possible collisions and oil spills.

"When I talk about keeping our air pure and our water clean, I say that we need to do two things: clean up the mistakes of yesterday and prevent the mistakes of tomorrow. This law should go a long way toward preventing future mistakes," said Governor Florio. "It's been a good year for clean water and the future looks like it's going to be even better."

The bill, A 4016 sponsored by Assemblymen Joe Doria and Joseph Patero, requires that pilots meet stricter standards than current law by requiring state-licensed pilots be used on all vessels travelling in New Jersey waters from Sandy Hook to Atlantic City. Currently, the law only requires that state-licensed pilots be used on vessels above Sandy Hook, travelling in the Arthur Kill, Lower and Upper New York Bay and its tributaries. Requirements for state licensure are more stringent than those for federal licensure.

"As you might expect from a state serious about keeping its water clean, New Jersey has the toughest licensing tests for pilots. We trust New Jersey men and women of the sea to do their best to keep our harbor safe," he said. "New Jersey isn't waiting to learn its lesson a second time when it comes to oil spills. New Jersey will never stop fighting for what the people want."

Today's bill signing represents another step in New Jersey's efforts to enact tougher laws protecting its coastal waters. Last summer, Governor Florio signed a package of legislation enacting the toughest fines -- up to \$10 million -- for catastrophic spills, placing stricter liability on oil companies and toughening

industry standards. The Governor also signed the toughest clean water enforcement law in the nation last spring and on March 17, marked the end of ocean dumping of sludge.

"This legislation is another important step in making sure New Jersey has a clean and green tomorrow," Governor Florio said. "New Jersey is serious about keeping our water clean and protecting our Jersey shore. Because the people of New Jersey know that our children won't have the opportunity unless we preserve our small piece of the planet."
