AN ACT concerning motor vehicles, and amending section 39:3-27 of the Revised Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New*  
2 *Jersey:*

1 1. Section 39:3-27 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as  
2 follows:

3 39:3-27. No fee shall be charged for the registration of motor vehicles  
4 not used for pleasure or hire, owned by the United States, the State of New  
5 Jersey, a municipality, county, Passaic Valley Sewerage Commissioners,  
6 North Jersey District Water Supply Commission, duly authorized volunteer  
7 fire department, any duly recognized auxiliary or reserve police organization  
8 of any municipality, hospital, humane society, and anticruelty society in this  
9 State, New Jersey wing of the Civil Air Patrol incorporated by the Act of July  
10 1, 1946 (Public Law 476—79th Congress), the American Red Cross, *chartered*  
11 *local councils in New Jersey of the Boy Scouts of America or the Girl Scouts*  
12 *of the United States of America* or ambulances owned by nationally organ-  
13 ized recognized veterans' organizations. These vehicles shall be registered  
14 and display number plates as provided in this subtitle or the director may,  
15 in his discretion, issue special registration certificates and special number  
16 plates for any of these motor vehicles which shall be valid for such motor  
17 vehicles until the transfer of ownership or the destruction of such motor

18 vehicles at which time the special registration shall expire. Upon the ex-  
19 piration of any special registration the registration certificate and special  
20 number marker shall be returned to the director; provided, however, upon  
21 proper application to the director the special registration and special num-  
22 ber marker may be transferred to another motor vehicle acquired by the  
23 owner to whom the special registration and marker were issued.

1     2. This act shall take effect immediately.

A 13 D'Aloia, Williams, Laufer Apr. 11  
—Amends the law permitting the expung-  
ing of criminal records to allow same  
within 2, instead of 10, years where sen-  
tence was suspended, or probation was  
allowed, or the fine was less than \$1,000,  
and within 5 years where a sentence has  
been served and no subsequent conviction  
has been entered.

A 14 Bowkley Apr. 11—Provides that

sence granted to members of its police  
or fire department, the member, or his  
estate, upon retirement, shall be entitled  
to be paid for the number of days ac-  
crued.

A 15 Matthews, Maraziti, Crabiel Jan.  
25—Designated the "New Jersey Boating  
Act, 1960" provides for the registering  
and numbering of certain power vessels  
operating on the waters of the State and  
the licensing of dealers; establishes fees  
and licensing procedure; provides for the  
regulation and development of certain  
marine activities; and the administration  
and enforcement thereof; effective March  
1, 1960.

(Senate com. sub.)  
(Authorizes the Department of Con-  
servation and Economic Development to  
register and number power vessels on  
waters of the State in conformance with  
the provisions and requirements of the  
Federal Boating Act of 1959, known as the  
"Bonner Act"; establishes a \$3.00 regis-  
tration fee for 3 years.)

police organization.

A 17 Beadleston, Salsburg Apr. 11—  
Amends the law determining the rights of  
persons to share in amounts recovered in  
wrongful death actions under NJSA 2A:  
31-4 where the deceased left no depend-  
ents so as to make distribution according  
to the law governing the distribution of  
an intestate's personal property; pre-  
scribes the method for distribution among  
dependents based on total support which  
might have been received from the de-  
cedent.

A 18 Beadleston Apr. 11—Exempts from  
taxation all property owned and used by  
any non-profit corporation in connection  
with its curriculum, work, care, treatment  
and study of feeble minded, mentally re-  
tarded, or idiotic men, women or children,  
providing the corporation conducts and  
maintains research or professional train-  
ing facilities for the care and training of  
these people.

A 19 Crabiel, Wilson, Koenig, Maraziti,

termine which of the following purposes  
the turnpike surplus revenues should be  
used, construction and maintenance of  
public highways, State aid for construc-  
tion of schools, or construction of addi-  
tional State institutions.

A 20 Crabiel, Wilson, Koenig, Maraziti,  
Kurtz, Martin, Bateman, Franklin, Mi-  
notty, Williams, Stamler Apr. 11—Pro-  
vides for the State guaranty of Turnpike  
Authority bonds in an amount not to ex-  
ceed \$430,000,000; authorizes the Legisla-  
ture to provide for the use of Turnpike  
surplus funds to be made available for  
one of the following purposes: construc-  
tion and maintenance of public highways,  
State aid for the construction of public  
schools, or construction of additional State  
institutions, choice to be made at a State  
referendum at the November, 1960, Gen-  
eral Election.

A 23 Minotty Apr. 11—Provides that no  
person whose name was not printed on a  
primary ballot as a candidate for member  
of the county committee of any political  
party shall be elected at the primary elec-  
tion for the general election as a member  
of such county committee unless he re-  
ceives the same or more votes than the  
required number of petition signatures  
needed to place his name on the ballot.

A 24 Doren Apr. 11—Prohibits the at-  
taching of any billboards, panels, or other  
unnecessary material or objects to any  
railroad or highway structure over any  
highway or pedestrian underpass; excepts  
cables, conduits, information relative to  
the clearance and traffic control, safety  
devices, the names of railroads, highways  
or municipalities, and memorial plaques;  
effective January 1, 1961.

A 25 Crabiel, Marryatt Apr. 11—Re-  
quires the State to bear the cost of main-  
tenance, repair and renewal of structures  
constructed within the rights of way of  
railroad companies carrying railroads  
over highways.

Sep. 12—Returned by Governor with  
recommended amendment.

A 26 Davis Apr. 11—Prohibits illegally  
imported cattle to remain in the State,  
even if tested at the owner's expense.

A 27 Davis Apr. 11—Requires all indus-  
tries desiring to locate on any watershed  
in this State to obtain a permit from the  
Department of Health before constructing  
their plants.

May 23—Passed in Assembly.  
May 23—Received in Senate.  
May 23—Inst, Pub Health & Welf Com.

A 28 Davis Apr. 11—Increases from 2  
years to 30 months the age of any bovine  
animal that may be imported into the  
State without a certificate of vaccination.  
Apr. 11—Appropriations Com.

A 29 Franklin, Hughes, Maraziti, Hig-  
gins Apr. 11—Provides that when a mother  
of a child born out of wedlock marries a  
person who is not the father of child, the  
surname of the child may be changed to  
the surname of the husband of the mother  
by submitting proof of such marriage to  
the Registrar of Vital Statistics, or to  
any local registrar with a declaration that  
they desire the surname of the child to be  
changed to that of the husband.
