



When this "economic rental" is determined, the Federal Authority will, upon approval, make a contract to pay fixed and uniform annual contributions in the amount necessary to reduce this "economic rental" to the level of very low income groups.

Laws 1938, Chapter 19 - A-96 - sec. 20 (property exempt from tax levy) Introduced  
by Mr. Wilensky.

This bill had statement:

This bill establishes the right of any municipality and county to create housing authorities for the purpose of slum clearance and low-cost housing as separate entities. It complies with the requirements of the United States Housing Act of 1937 and permits federal aid in such venture. Proper restrictions and safeguards are included for an efficient economical administration of the authority.

It is the plan of this act to provide the machinery for local authorities cooperating with the State and Federal Governments in providing adequate, safe and decent housing facilities for low income persons. Allotments will be made available for a period of three years, upon passage of this and other enabling legislation, by the United States Housing Authority.

The bill was amended on January 28th by the Assembly, to add the indicated wording to section 20:

All such public property devoted to such a public purpose shall be exempt from all taxes and special assessments of the State or any political subdivision thereof as long as such public property remains under exclusive control and jurisdiction of a housing authority or public body which owns or holds such property;

Laws 1949, Chapter 300, sec. 12 - S-259 - Introduced March 24, 1949 by Mr. Farley.  
This bill had statement:

This bill authorizes local housing authorities to function as public agencies for slum clearance and urban redevelopment. In situations where the rebuilding of the blighted area, in whole or in part, as public housing may not be suitable, the local housing authorities are empowered to resell the cleared sites for other uses. They may cooperate with, and obtain funds from, Federal agencies to accomplish the purposes of this bill.

The bill was amended several times during passage. Section 12 was remembered and the wording changed to comply with the recommendations in the Governor's conditional veto. The changes are shown here:

6. Any property which the authority leases to private individuals or corporations for development under a redevelopment plan shall have the same tax status as if such leased property were owned by such private individuals or corporations.

Laws 1950, Chapter 262, sec. 1 - S-226 - Introduced March 6, 1950 by Mr. Farley.  
Not amended during passage. This bill had statement:

The purpose of this bill is to amend Ch. 300 of the Laws of 1949 to take into account provisions of the United States Housing Act of 1949 for Federal aid to slum clearance and urban redevelopment projects.
