AN ACT concerning the assessment and collection of taxes, and amending section 54:5-62 of the Revised Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New*  
2 *Jersey:*

1 1. Section 54:5-62 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

2 54:5-62. No such fees or expenses incurred as aforesaid shall be collect-  
3 ible, unless such redemption is made by payment to the collecting officer and  
4 unless the holder of the tax title shall have made and filed with such collect-  
5 ing officer affidavits showing the amount or amounts of such expenses actually  
6 disbursed or incurred, affidavits of service, including copies of the notices  
7 served, and certificates of the searches made in the form of an abstract of  
8 title covering a period of not less than twenty years.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

The purpose of the amendment is to make and keep complete the records of the collecting officer with reference to the redemption of all tax sales certificates, and further to make certain that delinquent taxpayers shall not, on redemption, be required to pay more than the statute requires.
