P.L. 2018, CHAPTER 60, *approved July 3, 2018*

1 AN ACT establishing the Transgender Equality Task Force to assess
2 legal and societal barriers to equality and provide
3 recommendations to Legislature.
4

5 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
6 of New Jersey:
7

8 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:

9 a. Transgender individuals, those whose gender identity,
10 expression, or behavior is different from those typically associated
11 with their assigned sex at birth, face considerable challenges in
12 society, including discrimination, harassment, physical abuse, and
13 social isolation.

14 b. It is estimated that 1.4 million adults in the United States
15 identify as transgender, a number double that previously thought,
16 while the number of transgender children in the United States is
17 unknown.

18 c. According to the 2015 U.S. Transgender Survey, an
19 anonymous online survey of over 27,000 transgender adults, 10
20 percent of respondents who were out to their families reported that
21 they had experienced violence from a family member due to their
22 being transgender, while eight percent of respondents reported that
23 they were forced to leave the family home because they were
24 transgender. Nearly 30 percent of survey respondents reported that
25 they had been homeless at some point in their lives.

26 d. One third of survey respondents who saw a health care
27 provider in the year preceding the survey reported having a negative
28 experience related to being transgender, including being refused
29 treatment, verbal harassment, physical or sexual assault, or having
30 to educate the provider in order to get appropriate care.

31 e. Transgender individuals are more likely to experience
32 physical violence than those who are not transgender when
33 interacting with law enforcement.

34 f. Despite federal legal protections, transgender students
35 nonetheless face daily challenges in accessing the full array of
36 educational, social, athletic, and after-school activities that are
37 available to students who are not transgender.

38 g. More than 75 percent of survey respondents experienced
39 some form of mistreatment, including physical or sexual assault,
40 between kindergarten and grade 12, due to their being out or being
41 perceived as transgender.

42 h. Nearly one quarter of survey respondents who were out or
43 perceived as being transgender in college or vocational school
44 reported being verbally, physically, or sexually harassed.

1 i. Transgender individuals are disproportionately unemployed
2 due to discrimination, and as a result, their circumstances may be
3 rendered even more difficult by poverty, which survey respondents
4 reported experiencing at more than twice the rate as is experienced
5 in the general U.S. population.

6 j. Because of the myriad difficulties faced by transgender
7 individuals in the course of their daily lives, as detailed above, they
8 are subject to severe psychological distress, and report attempting
9 suicide at rates almost nine times that of the U.S. population
10 overall.

11 k. In order to better understand and address the challenges to
12 equality faced by the transgender community, it is appropriate for
13 the Legislature to establish a dedicated task force so that those
14 challenges to equality may be eliminated.

15
16 2. a. There is hereby created a task force to be known as the
17 “Transgender Equality Task Force.” The purpose of the task force
18 shall be to assess the legal and societal barriers to equality for
19 transgender individuals in the State, and provide recommendations
20 to the Governor and the Legislature on how to ensure equality and
21 improve the lives of transgender individuals, with particular
22 attention to the following areas:

23 (1) healthcare, including, but not limited to, access to healthcare
24 providers that are trained in transgender medical issues, including
25 sexual health;

26 (2) long term care for the chronically ill and senior citizens in
27 the transgender population;

28 (3) education;

29 (4) higher education;

30 (5) housing, including, but not limited to, homelessness
31 prevention and reduction for transgender youth and adults;

32 (6) employment; and

33 (7) criminal justice, including raising transgender awareness
34 among law enforcement through training, and facilitating the
35 appropriate placement of transgender individuals in correctional
36 facilities based on an individual’s gender identity.

37 b. The Transgender Equality Task Force shall consist of 17
38 members as follows: a representative of the Department of Banking
39 and Insurance whose duties or expertise includes insurance and
40 banking services and policies as applied to transgender individuals;
41 a representative of the Department of Human Services whose duties
42 or expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to
43 the department’s services or eliminating discrimination in the
44 delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives; a
45 representative of the Department of Health whose duties or
46 expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to
47 clinically appropriate healthcare services or eliminating
48 discrimination in the delivery of healthcare programs, policies, or

1 initiatives; a representative of the Department of Education whose
2 duties or expertise includes protecting the rights of minority
3 students or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of educational
4 programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Office of
5 the Secretary of Higher Education whose duties or expertise
6 includes protecting the rights of minority students in the higher
7 education system or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of
8 higher educational programs, policies, or initiatives; a
9 representative of the Division of Civil Rights in the Department of
10 Law and Public Safety whose duties or expertise includes
11 expanding access by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender
12 individuals to the department's services or eliminating
13 discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender
14 individuals in the delivery of the division's programs, policies, or
15 initiatives; and a representative of the Department of Children and
16 Families whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by
17 lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender youth to the department's
18 services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of
19 departmental programs, policies, or initiatives with regard to
20 lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender youth; a representative of
21 the Department of Corrections whose duties or expertise includes
22 protecting the safety of minority populations or eliminating
23 discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or
24 initiatives; a representative of the Department of Labor and
25 Workforce Development whose duties or expertise includes
26 expanding access by minority populations to the department's
27 services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of
28 departmental programs, policies, or initiatives; two public members
29 to be appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly, one of
30 whom shall be a physician who specializes in transgender health
31 issues, and one of whom shall be a transgender individual; two
32 public members to be appointed by the President of the Senate, one
33 of whom shall be a parent or guardian of a transgender individual,
34 and one of whom shall be an attorney specializing in transgender
35 rights; one public member to be appointed by the Governor, who
36 shall be a representative of a social service agency that provides
37 services and supports to transgender individuals; a representative of
38 the American Civil Liberties Union; a representative of Garden
39 State Equality; and a representative of The Gender Rights
40 Advocacy Association of New Jersey.

41 c. The task force shall organize as soon as practicable
42 following the appointment of its members, but not later than the 30th
43 day following the appointment of its members. Upon its
44 organization, the task force shall select a chairperson from among
45 its members. The task force may meet and hold meetings at the
46 times and places it may designate. A majority of the authorized
47 members shall constitute a quorum. The task force may conduct
48 business without a quorum, but may only vote on a recommendation

1 when a quorum is present. The members of the task force shall
2 serve without compensation, but shall be eligible for reimbursement
3 for necessary and reasonable expenses incurred in the performance
4 of their official duties within the limits of funds appropriated or
5 otherwise made available to the task force for its purposes.

6 d. The task force is entitled to receive assistance and services
7 from any State, county, or municipal department, board,
8 commission, or agency, as it may require, and as may be available
9 to it for its purposes. The Division on Civil Rights in the
10 Department of Law and Public Safety shall provide professional
11 and clerical staff to the task force, as may be necessary to effectuate
12 the purposes of this act.

13 e. Not later than six months after the initial meeting of the task
14 force, it shall prepare and submit a written report to the Governor,
15 and to the Legislature, pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164
16 (C.52:14-19.1), outlining its recommendations for advancing
17 transgender equality in the State.

19 3. This act shall take effect immediately and shall expire on the
20 30th day following submission by the task force of its written
21 recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature, as provided
22 by subsection e. of section 2 of this act.

The Assembly Human Services Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 705.

This bill establishes the Transgender Equality Task Force, which is charged with assessing the legal and societal barriers to equality for transgender individuals in the State, and providing recommendations to the Legislature and the Governor on how to ensure equality and improve the lives of transgender individuals, with particular attention to the following areas: healthcare, long term care, education, higher education, housing, employment, and criminal justice.

The bill provides that the task force shall consist of 17 members as follows: a representative of the Department of Banking and Insurance whose duties or expertise includes insurance and banking services and policies as applied to transgender individuals; a representative of the Department of Human Services whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to the department's services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Department of Health whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to clinically appropriate healthcare services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of healthcare programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Department of Education whose duties or expertise includes protecting the rights of minority students or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of educational programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education whose duties or expertise includes protecting the rights of minority students in the higher education system or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of higher educational programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Division of Civil Rights in the Department of Law and Public Safety whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals to the department's services or eliminating discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals in the delivery of the division's programs, policies, or initiatives; and a representative of the Department of Children and Families whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender youth to the department's services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives with regard to lesbian,

The bill permits the task force to hold meetings at the times and places it may designate, and provides that a majority of the authorized members of the task force shall constitute a quorum. The bill also provides that the task force may conduct business without a quorum, but may only vote on a recommendation when a quorum is present. Pursuant to the bill, the task force is entitled to receive assistance and services from any State, county, or municipal department, board, commission, or agency, as it may require, and as may be available to it for its purposes, and The Division on Civil Rights in the Department of Law and Public Safety is to provide professional and clerical staff to the task force, as necessary to effectuate the purposes of the bill.

The bill requires that the task force prepare and submit a written report to the Governor and the Legislature, outlining its recommendations for advancing transgender equality in the State, not later than six months after its initial meeting. The bill will expire on the 30th day following the submission of this written report.

As reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1727 (Vainieri Huttler/Eustace/Pinkin/Jasey), which the committee also reported on this date.

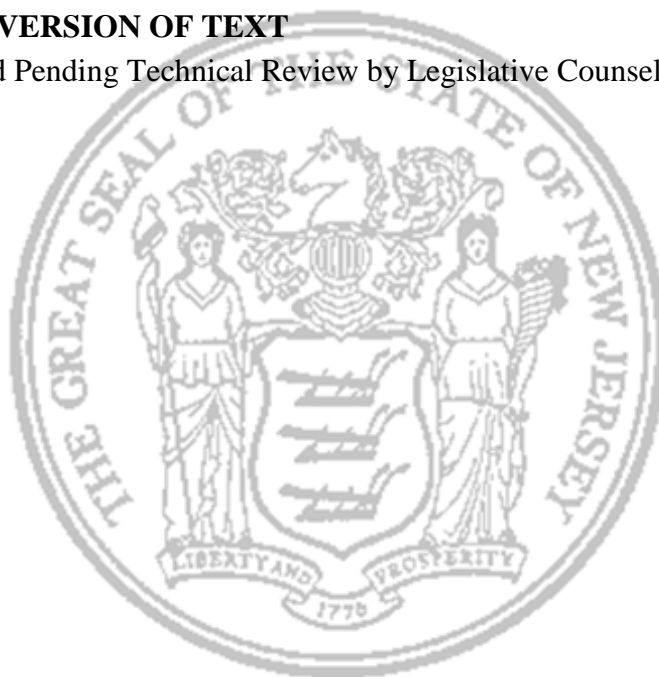

10 e. Not later than six months after the initial meeting of the task

The Assembly Human Services Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1727.

This bill establishes the Transgender Equality Task Force, which is charged with assessing the legal and societal barriers to equality for transgender individuals in the State, and providing recommendations to the Legislature and the Governor on how to ensure equality and improve the lives of transgender individuals, with particular attention to the following areas: healthcare, long term care, education, higher education, housing, employment, and criminal justice.

The bill provides that the task force shall consist of 17 members as follows: a representative of the Department of Banking and Insurance whose duties or expertise includes insurance and banking services and policies as applied to transgender individuals; a representative of the Department of Human Services whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to the department's services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Department of Health whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to clinically appropriate healthcare services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of healthcare programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Department of Education whose duties or expertise includes protecting the rights of minority students or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of educational programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education whose duties or expertise includes protecting the rights of minority students in the higher education system or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of higher educational programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Division of Civil Rights in the Department of Law and Public Safety whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals to the department's services or eliminating discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals in the delivery of the division's programs, policies, or initiatives; and a representative of the Department of Children and Families whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender youth to the department's services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives with regard to lesbian,

gay, bisexual, and transgender youth; a representative of the Department of Corrections whose duties or expertise includes protecting the safety of minority populations or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives; a representative of the Department of Labor and Workforce Development whose duties or expertise includes expanding access by minority populations to the department's services or eliminating discrimination in the delivery of departmental programs, policies, or initiatives; two public members to be appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly, one of whom shall be a physician who specializes in transgender health issues, and one of whom shall be a transgender individual; two public members to be appointed by the President of the Senate, one of whom shall be a parent or guardian of a transgender individual, and one of whom shall be an attorney specializing in transgender rights; one public member to be appointed by the Governor, who shall be a representative of a social service agency that provides services and supports to transgender individuals; a representative of the American Civil Liberties Union; a representative of Garden State Equality; and a representative of The Gender Rights Advocacy Association of New Jersey.

The bill provides that the task force is to organize as soon as practicable following the appointment of its members, but not later than the 30th day following the appointment of its members, and that the task force is to select a chairperson from among its members. The bill permits the task force to hold meetings at the times and places it may designate, and provides that a majority of the authorized members of the task force shall constitute a quorum. The bill also provides that the task force may conduct business without a quorum, but may only vote on a recommendation when a quorum is present. Pursuant to the bill, the task force is entitled to receive assistance and services from any State, county, or municipal department, board, commission, or agency, as it may require, and as may be available to it for its purposes, and The Division on Civil Rights in the Department of Law and Public Safety is to provide professional and clerical staff to the task force, as necessary to effectuate the purposes of the bill.

The bill requires that the task force prepare and submit a written report to the Governor and the Legislature, outlining its recommendations for advancing transgender equality in the State, not later than six months after its initial meeting. The bill will expire on the 30th day following the submission of this written report.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2018-2019 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

As reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 705 (Ruiz/Vitale), which the committee also reported on this date.

Senate Bill No. 478 will allow for the issuance of amended birth certificates for people who have undergone a change in gender, Senate Bill No. 493 will allow gender identity to be reflected on death certificates, and Senate Bill No. 705 will establish a Transgender Equality Task force.

"Today is an important day for New Jersey as we continue to strive toward equality for all of our residents, regardless of sex or gender expression," **said Governor Murphy**. "Allowing vital records to match gender identity is an important step forward that will allow transgender individuals to control the disclosure of their transgender status. And by creating a Transgender Equality Task Force, New Jersey can ensure that all residents receive the protections they deserve. New Jersey will continue to stand with our LGBTQ residents in the continued pursuit of similar rights nationwide."

"I am immensely proud of Governor Murphy for not only standing with our community, but also seeing that equality reaches everyone in New Jersey. Transgender people have long stood in solidarity with LGB people and here at Garden State Equality we make sure nobody is left behind," **said Christian Fuscarino, Executive Director of Garden State Equality**.

S478 is designated as the Babs Siperstein Law, recognizing transgender advocate Babs Siperstein for her tireless advocacy efforts related to protecting transgender individuals and expanding rights for LGBTQ New Jerseyans.
