AN ACT to include in the organizations entitled to delegates to the annual State Agricultural Convention the New Jersey Field Crop Improvement Co-operative Association and to eliminate the New Jersey Alfalfa Association, and amending section 4:1-6 of the Revised Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New*  
2 *Jersey:*

1 1. Section 4:1-6 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

2 4:1-6. Each of the following organizations shall be entitled to be repre-  
3 sented in the annual convention by two delegates: each county board of agri-  
4 culture, the New Jersey State Horticultural Society, the New Jersey State  
5 Poultry Association, Jersey Chick Association, the American Cranberry  
6 Growers' Association, the New Jersey State Grange, Patrons of Husbandry,  
7 the New Jersey Association of Nurserymen and the New Jersey Florists'  
8 Club.

9 Each of the following organizations shall be entitled to be represented in  
10 the annual convention by one delegate: the State Agricultural College, the  
11 State Experiment Station, each Pomona Grange, Patrons of Husbandry,  
12 North Jersey Society for Promotion of Agriculture, New Jersey Guernsey  
13 Breeders' Association, Incorporated, Holstein Friesian Co-operative As-  
14 sociation of New Jersey, the E. B. Voorhees Agricultural Society, [New Jer-  
15 sey Alfalfa Association,] New Jersey Field Crop Improvement Co-operative

16 Association, New Jersey State Potato Association, New Jersey Beekeepers'  
17 Association, the Co-operative Growers' Association of Beverly, New Jersey,  
18 and the Blueberry Co-operative Association of New Jersey.

19 Prior to the time fixed for the holding of the annual convention each of  
20 the organizations named in this section shall choose from its members the  
21 authorized number of delegates and certify to the convention their qualifica-  
22 tion as such. The credentials shall be filed with the proper convention officer  
23 or committee, and upon the acceptance thereof by the convention such per-  
24 sons shall have all the rights and powers of delegates.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

#### STATEMENT

This act substitutes the New Jersey Field Crop Improvement Co-opera-  
tive Association in place of the New Jersey Alfalfa Association, as the ac-  
tivities of the latter association have been taken over by the New Jersey Field  
Crop Improvement Co-operative Association and the New Jersey Alfalfa As-  
sociation is no longer in existence. This has the approval of the Department of  
Agriculture and the members and former members of the above-mentioned as-  
sociations.

15 Jersey Field Crop Improvement Co-operative Association, New Jersey State

16 Potato Association, New Jersey Beekeepers' Association, the Co-operative  
17 Growers' Association of Beverly, New Jersey, and the Blueberry Co-opera-  
18 tive Association of New Jersey.

19 Prior to the time fixed for the holding of the annual convention each of  
20 the organizations named in this section shall choose from its members the  
21 authorized number of delegates and certify to the convention their qualifica-  
22 tion as such. The credentials shall be filed with the proper convention officer  
23 or committee, and upon the acceptance thereof by the convention such per-
