INTRODUCED JANUARY 26, 1959

AN ACT concerning motor vehicles, and amending section 39:3-27 of the Revised Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New
2 Jersey:

1 1. Section 39:3-27 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:
2 39:3-27. No fee shall be charged for the registration of motor vehicles
3 not used for pleasure or hire, owned by the United States, the State of New
4 Jersey, a municipality, county, Passaic Valley Sewerage Commissioners,
5 North Jersey District Water Supply Commission, duly authorized volunteer
6 fire department, any duly recognized auxiliary or reserve police organization
7 of any municipality, hospital, humane society, an anticruelty society in this
8 State, New Jersey wing of the Civil Air Patrol incorporated by the Act of
9 July 1, 1946 (Public Law 476-79th Congress), the American Red Cross or
10 ambulances owned by nationally organized recognized veterans organizations.
11 These vehicles shall be registered and display number plates as provided in
12 this subtitle or the director may, in his discretion, issue special registration
13 certificates and special number plates for any of these motor vehicles which
14 shall be valid for such motor vehicles until the transfer of ownership or the
15 destruction of such motor vehicles at which time the special registration shall
16 expire. Upon the expiration of any special registration the registration cer-
17 tificate and special number marker shall be returned to the director; provided,
18 however, upon proper application to the director the special registration and
19 special number marker may be transferred to another motor vehicle acquired
20 by the owner to whom the special registration and marker were issued.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

S 48 Dumont Jan. 19 — Establishes standard requirements for manufacturing and selling of mozzarella, scamorza and ricotta cheese; prescribes penalty of up to \$100 for 1st offense and up to \$200 for the second and each subsequent offense.

S 49 Dumont Jan. 19—Requires railroad companies to equip track motor cars with a headlight and red rear light, each visible 300 feet, and with a windshield, windshield wiper and top cover.

S 50 Dumont Jan. 19—Authorizes the use of any fire fighting equipment no longer required by the municipality, by any county firemen's organization for use in any school conducted by such organization for the training and instruction of the firemen in the county.

S 51 Dumont Jan. 19—Extends application of Unemployment Compensation and Temporary Disability Benefits Laws to include employing units having one or more, instead of 4 or more, employees; effective January 1, 1960.

S 52 Dumont Jan. 19—Amends the unemployment compensation and temporary disability benefits law by providing that contributions due from a contractor or sub-contractor shall be paid by him and shall not be an obligation of the employing unit contracted with.

S 53 Dumont Jan. 19—Requires railroad, express, and air carriers of passengers and freight having station or office facilities in the State to provide and maintain specified adequate sanitary facilities for the health and comfort of their employes.

S 54 Dumont Jan. 19—Requires every common carrier, express, car-loading and car-forwarding company to pay its employees weekly instead of semi-monthly; effective July 1, 1959.
Jan. 19—Hwys, Trans & Pub Util Com.

S 55 Dumont Jan. 19—Grants tenure to exempt firemen presently serving, and to exempt firemen hereafter appointed, after 5 years' consecutive service; prohibits the abolition of such positions except in time of widespread depression or mandatory retrenchment, and then only in proportion to reduction of other State and local employment.

S 56 Dumont, Fox Jan. 19—Requires that public employes be given leaves of absence with pay to attend state or national conventions of the Army and Air National Guard Association of New Jersey, National Guard Association of the United States, Reserve Officers Association of the United States and Air Force Association.

S 57 Cowgill, Stout Jan. 19—Declares the practice of pharmacy to be a profession, and defines drugs and medicines which may be handled only by registered pharmacists; defines patent drugs and the labelling conditions pertaining thereto; operative 90 days after enactment.
Mar. 23—Withdrawn from files.

S 58 McCay, Lynch Jan. 26—Increases the annual paid vacation leave for permanent county, municipal and school district employees with 10 to 20 years of service from 12 to 15 days, and from 16 to 20 days for those having more than 20 years of service.

June 11—Approved, Chapter 88.

S 59 Stout Jan. 26—Reduces the residency requirement for members of elected school boards from 3 to 2 years residence in the territory contained in the school district.

S 60 Hannold, Waddington, (Messrs. Kay, Barkalow, Davis) Jan. 26—Extends the date from March 31, 1959 until June 30, 1960 in the law (C. 38, L. 1958) which permits municipalities to require the disposal of trash and garbage by the sanitary landfill or incinerator method, with the approval of the Commissioner of Health.

Feb. 16—Passed in Assembly as sub for A 224.
Mar. 9—Returned by Governor with recommended amendment.
Mar. 16—Amended as recommended, passed Senate under emergency resolution.

S 61 Lynch, Cowgill, Waddington Jan. 26—Defines and regulates installment sales of consumer goods up to \$7,500 cash price; requires licensing of, and regulates automobile time sales; specifies maximum rates for various age motor vehicles; repeals C. 419, L. 1948; effective 90 days after enactment.

S 62 Stout Jan. 26—Provides that permits, to carry concealed weapons, issued to an employee of an armored car company, rendering armored car service, shall continue to be in full force as long as the employe continues in his employment with the armored car company.

May 18—Approved, Chapter 32.

S 63 Fox Jan. 26—Permits any person receiving, or entitled to receive, a pension from this, or any other State, or from any county, municipality or school district of this or any other State, to hold any municipal office or employment with a city of the 1st class having more than 400,000 population, and to receive pay therefor, in addition to such pension.
May 21—Com. sub. passed in Senate.
May 25—Passed Assembly under emergency resolution.
June 15—Approved, Chapter 102.

S 64 Grossi Jan. 26—Provides that any person who shall manufacture, purchase, possess, sell, give, loan, furnish or deliver any knife having a blade which opens or falls, or is ejected into position by force of gravity, or by an outward, downward, upward or centrifugal thrust or movement shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
Apr. 6—Passed in Senate.
May 4—Passed in Assembly.
May 12—Approved, Chapter 29.

S 65 Ridolfi Jan. 26—Permits the free transportation of blind persons and their guides by any street railway, traction railway, railroad or autobus company, under such reasonable regulations as may be established by the carrier.
Jan. 26—Inst, Pub Health & Welf Com.

S 66 Hannold Jan. 26—Exempts motor vehicles owned by any duly recognized auxiliary or reserve police organization of any municipality from the payment of State registration fees.
Feb. 9—Passed in Senate.
May 25—Passed in Assembly.
June 11—Approved, Chapter 89.

S 67 Dumont, Ridolfi Jan. 26—Increases maximum pension for widow and children of deceased member of municipal police or fire department, from \$1,000 to \$1,200 annually; increases maximum benefits for children under 18; the State to contribute 1/2, and municipalities 1/2, of the amount necessary to provide for the increase of such pensions presently payable.
Feb. 16—Passed in Senate, amended.
Mar. 16—Passed in Assembly.
Jan. 12—Vetoed by the Governor.
