L. 1917, Chapter 166 - A157

Introduced February 1 by Mr. Read.
Referred to Committee on Public Health.
Not amended during passage.
Statement:

The purpose of this amendment is to give power to local boards of health to pass ordinances and make rules and regulations regarding the practice of midwifery within their several jurisdictions, and to punish violations of the same.

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L. 1924, Chapter 136 - A232

Introduced January 22 by Mr. DeLorenzo.

Jan. 22 - Public Health Committee.

Jan. 29 - Reported favorably.

Jan. 29 - Read second time.

March 1924 - Signed 2d OCR.

Statement:

The purpose of this act is to simplify the procedure in adopting public health ordinances and to make the same conform to the procedure followed under the Home Rule Act.

L. 1930, Chapter 117 - A47

Introduced January 27 by Mrs. Peters.

March 18 - Reported with Committee amendments.

March 24 - Passed in Assembly.

March 25 - Received in Senate.

March 31 - Reported favorably.

March 31 - Read second time.

Statement:

The purpose of this act is to give power to local boards of health to pass ordinances requiring the owners of any building where more than two families reside, to furnish heat from the first day of October in each year to the first day of May of the succeeding year to keep each room of said building heated to a temperature of sixty-eight degrees Fahrenheit or above.
