INTRODUCED APRIL 15, 1991

1 AN ACT establishing the Council on Community Restoration and
2 supplementing Title 52 of the Revised Statutes.

3

4 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the*
5 *State of New Jersey:*

6 1. a. There is established in the Department of Community
7 Affairs the Council on Community Restoration.

8 b. The council shall be composed of:

9 1) a director, to be appointed by and to serve at the pleasure
10 of the Governor;

11 2) the Commissioner of Community Affairs, or his designee, ex
12 officio;

13 3) the Commissioner of Human Services, or his designee, ex
14 officio;

15 4) the Commissioner of Commerce, Energy and Economic
16 Development, or his designee, ex officio;

17 5) the Commissioner of Labor, or his designee, ex officio;

18 6) the Attorney General, or his designee, ex officio;

19 7) the Commissioner of Transportation, or his designee, ex
20 officio;

21 8) the Commissioner of Health, or his designee, ex officio;

22 9) the Commissioner of Education, or his designee, ex officio;

23 10) a representative from and designated by the Economic
24 Development Authority;

25 11) a representative from and designated by the Health Care
26 Finance Authority;

27 12) a representative from and designated by the Housing and
28 Mortgage Finance Authority; and

29 13) 1nine additional members, including¹ five members from
30 the private sector representing nonprofit organizations and
31 professional service providers ¹and four members of the general
32 public¹, appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent
33 of the Senate, to serve staggered three-year terms. Of the
34 members first to be appointed ¹[three] five¹ shall be appointed
35 for a term of one year each, ¹[one] two¹ for a term of two years,
36 and ¹[one] two¹ for a term of three years. The successors of the
37 members first appointed shall be appointed for three-year terms.

EXPLANATION--Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the
above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

1 Vacancies other than by expiration of terms shall be filled for the
2 unexpired term. Any member may be reappointed.

3 c. The director shall employ a person to serve as secretary to
4 the council. The secretary shall not be a member of the council.

5 d. All members of the council shall serve without
6 compensation but shall be reimbursed for their actual expenses in
7 attending the meetings of the council and in the performance of
8 their other duties.

9 2. a. It shall be the duty of the council to consult with and
10 advise the Governor with respect to the allocation, coordination
11 and prioritization of resources for community restoration
12 projects. The council shall target neighborhoods as
13 demonstration projects for new community development. The
14 targeted projects shall include infrastructure improvement and
15 expansion, facility rehabilitation and renovation, economic
16 development, and neighborhood revitalization.

17 b. The council shall meet at least once annually at the call of
18 the director and at such other times as the council shall
19 determine, the time and place of such other meetings to be fixed
20 by resolution of the council.

21 3. It shall be the responsibility of the Department of
22 Community Affairs to furnish such equipment and staff as are
23 necessary to implement the work of the council within the limits
24 of appropriations for the purpose.

25 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Assembly Health and Human Services Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 4705 with committee amendments.

As amended by the committee, this bill establishes a 21-member Council on Community Restoration to advise the Governor with respect to the allocation, coordination and prioritization of resources for community restoration projects. The council would include the following the following members: the Commissioners of Education, Human Services, Community Affairs, Commerce, Energy and Economic Development, Labor, Health, and Transportation, the Attorney General; a representative of the Economic Development Authority; a representative from the Health Care Finance Authority; a representative from the Housing and Mortgage Finance Authority; five members from the private sector representing nonprofit organizations and professional service providers, and four members of the general public, to be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve staggered three-year terms; and a director, to be appointed by and to serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

Specifically, the council would target certain neighborhoods as demonstration projects for new community development. These demonstration projects would include infrastructure improvement and expansion, facility rehabilitation and renovation, economic development, and neighborhood revitalization.

The committee amendments increase the number of council members from 17 to 21 by adding four members of the general public.

This bill is part of a legislative package which includes five other bills that are designed to effect significant reforms in the AFDC program and address the needs of the economically disadvantaged in this State.
