P.L.1990, CHAPTER 5, approved March 6, 1990 1990 Senate No. 2263

AN ACT concerning the taking of striped bass, amending and supplementing P.L.1983, c.506, and amending P.L.1987, c.83.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 2 of P.L.1983, c.506 (C.23:5-44) is amended to read as follows:
 - 2. As used in this act:
- a. (Deleted by amendment, P.L.1985, c.211).
- 10 b. "Marine waters" means all the salt waters of this State, including the waters of the Atlantic Ocean, and all bays, inlets 11 and estuarine waters located below the freshwater portion of any 13 river, stream or creek, but shall not include any of the 14 freshwaters of this State as defined in R.S.23:1-2;
 - c. (Deleted by amendment, P.L.1985, c.211).
 - d. "Spearfishing" means the taking of striped bass by means of a spear, harpoon, or other missile, while the swimmer is completely submerged in marine waters, but shall not include the use of blinding lights for the purpose of spearing striped bass, or spears, harpoons or other missiles with exploding heads;
 - e. "Striped bass" means a game fish of the species "Morone saxatilis" commonly referred to as rockfish, rock or striper;
 - "Delaware bay" means all the waters of the State delineated by a line drawn from Cape May Point, New Jersey to Cape Henlopen, Delaware and the boundary line between New Jersey and Delaware extending to the northern terminus of Artificial Island, Lower Alloways Creek township, Salem county. (cf: P.L.1985, c.211, s.1)
 - 2. Section 1 of P.L.1987, c.83 (C.23:5-45.1) is amended to read as follows:
 - 1. a. No person shall take from the [marine] waters of the State in any one day, or sell, barter, offer for sale or barter or have in his possession at any time, more than five striped bass measuring not less than [31 inches in length, from the effective date of this amendatory and supplementary act through July 31, 1987, not less than 33 inches in length from August 1, 1987 through December 31, 1988, not less than 34 inches in length from January 1, 1989 through June 30, 1989, and not less than] 36 inches in length from July 1, 1989 through December 31, 1989, or

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more than one striped bass not less than 28 inches in length on or after January 1, 1990, except not less than 36 inches in length from the waters of the Delaware bay or the Delaware river, or their tributaries. No person shall have in his possession any striped bass not less than 36 inches in length while on or angling in the Delaware bay or the Delaware river, or their tributaries.

b. The possession of any striped bass or parts of a striped bass from which the head or tail has been removed other than immediately prior to preparation or being served as food, which is less than [31 inches in length from the effective date of this amendatory and supplementary act through July 31, 1987, less than 33 inches in length from August 1, 1987 through December 31, 1988, less than 34 inches in length from January 1, 1989 through June 30, 1989, or less than 36 inches in length from July 1, 1989 through December 31, 1989, or less than 28 inches in length on or after January 1, 1990, except not less than 36 inches in length while on or angling in the waters of the Delaware bay or the Delaware river, or their tributaries, shall be presumed to be possessed in violation of this section.

c. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections a and b of this section to the contrary, upon approval by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission, the Department of Environmental Protection shall, by regulation adopted pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), provide that no person may take from the waters of the State, other than the Delaware bay and the Delaware river, and their tributaries, in any one day, or sell, barter, offer for sale or barter or have in his possession at any time more than two striped bass, of which one shall be not less than 28 inches in length.

The possession of any striped bass or parts of a striped bass from which the head or tail has been removed other than immediately prior to preparation or being served as food, which is less than 28 inches in length shall be presumed to be possessed in violation of this section, except the minimum limit shall be 38 inches in length for a second fish possessed.

The department shall monitor the catch provided for in this subsection and provide for its discontinuance as necessary to keep the State in compliance with the allowances of the commission. (cf. P.L. 1989, c.82, s.1)

3. (New section) a. No person may take, or attempt to take, or have in his possession, any striped bass from any waters of the State, except the Atlantic Ocean, from January 1 through February 28 of each year.

b. The department shall, by regulation adopted pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), implement a closed season for the striped bass spawning area of the Delaware river during the spawning period.

. This act shall take effect immediately.

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STATEMENT

 This bill would amend current law regarding the taking of striped bass. Most significantly, this bill would keep the State in compliance with federal law regarding the quantity and measurement for striped bass possession. Under the bill, one striped bass may be possessed which is not less than 28 inches in length if caught in marine waters other than the Delaware bay and river. For the Delaware bay and river system, the striped bass must not be less than 36 inches in length. The larger size limit in the Delaware estuary is to protect immature females to allow for continued restoration of the striped bass resource in that system.

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission plan allows for the reinstatement of a commercial harvest at a level equal to 20% of the historic yearly average. The allowable harvest for New Jersey would be 63,800 pounds. However, the sale and netting of striped bass is currently prohibited in New Jersey. Instead, the State will propose to the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission that this allocation be used for an additional one fish catch not less than 38 inches in length and that the State will monitor the consumption of this fishery. This bill would direct the department to implement such a program in the event the commission approves it.

In addition, the bill would reinstate a closed season for the taking of striped bass from bays and estuaries during January and February. The purpose of this closure, which does not affect the harvest of fish from ocean waters, is to prevent the high mortality rates that result from the snagging with a hook and line of striped bass that winter in back bays and estuarine waters. Also, the bill would authorize the department to impose a closed season for the taking of striped bass from the spawning area of the Delaware river during the spawning season. The department would need to coordinate such a restriction with the states of Pennsylvania and Delaware.

Finally, the bill would require that the Department of Environmental Protection promulgate regulations when implementing the additional one fish catch of not less than 38 inches in length, if and when that additional catch is approved by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission.

The Assembly Conservation and Natural Resources Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 2263.

This bill would amend current law regarding the taking of striped bass. Most significantly, this bill would keep the State in compliance with federal law regarding the quantity and measurement for striped bass possession. Under the bill, one striped bass may be possessed which is not less than 28 inches in length if caught in marine or fresh waters other than the Delaware bay and river. For the Delaware bay and river system, the striped bass must not be less than 36 inches in length. The larger size limit in the Delaware estuary is to protect immature females to allow for continued restoration of the striped bass resource in that system.

The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission plan allows for the reinstatement of a commercial harvest at a level equal to 20% of the historic yearly average. The allowable harvest for New Jersey would be 63,800 pounds. However, the sale and netting of striped bass is currently prohibited in New Jersey. Instead, the State will propose to the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission that this allocation be used for an additional one fish catch not less than 38 inches in length and that the State will monitor the consumption of this fishery. This bill would direct the department to implement such a program in the event the commission approves it.

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Because the State has been out of compliance with federal requirements concerning striped bass since January 1, 1990, the federal government imposed a moratorium on striped bass fishing in New Jersey effective March 1, 1990. It is expected that this bill, if enacted, would satisfy the federal requirements and prompt the federal government to lift the moratorium.

The Division of Fish, Game and Wildlife testified in favor of the bill, as did a representative of the Jersey Coast Anglers Association. Two representatives of the Delaware Bay Watermans Association testified in opposition, arguing for a resumption of commercial fishing for striped bass in Delaware bay as part of a "bicatch" (i.e., an incidental catch) with other fish that are presently harvested commercially.

As released by the committee, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 2922, which was also released by the committee.
