1 AN ACT concerning public health priority funding and amending
P.L.1966, c.36.

3
5 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the
State of New Jersey:

7 1. Section 9 of P.L.1966, c.36 (C.26:2F-9) is amended to read
as follows:

9 9. Pending final passage of the applicable General
Appropriations Act, the commissioner shall notify each eligible
11 local health agency as to the priority health services and the
amount of public health priority funds estimated to be payable
13 during the next [State fiscal] calendar year to provide these
services. On or before a date set by the commissioner, the health
15 officer of each local health agency, or in his absence another
person designated by the official body under which the local
17 health agency operates, may submit an application for public
health priority funds for the following calendar year [beginning
19 July 1]. The application shall include the budget of the agency,
the plan of work and such other information as the commissioner
21 may require, to be presented in a form prescribed by the
commissioner. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to
23 describe in detail in the application how all the public health
priority services will be met by the local health agency. The
25 application shall be certified, under the penalties of perjury, as
true to the best knowledge of the person making it.

31 **STATEMENT**

33 This bill amends the "Public Health Priority Funding Act of
1977," P.L.1977, c.332 (C.26:2F-1 et seq.), to permit the
Department of Health to award public health priority funds on a
35 calendar, rather than a fiscal, year basis.

1 These funds are awarded to municipal, county and regional
3 entities to support certain public health priority activities with

The Senate Institutions, Health and Welfare Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 3082.

This bill amends the "Public Health Priority Funding Act of 1977," (C.26:2F-1 et seq.), to permit the Department of Health to award public health priority funds on a calendar, rather than a fiscal, year basis.

These funds are awarded to municipal, county and regional entities to support certain public health priority activities with respect to communicable diseases and chronic illnesses. Each entity is required to submit an application to the department which outlines how these funds will be used to address public health priority service needs. Currently, the law requires that these applications be submitted on a fiscal year basis; however, the agencies which apply for these funds operate on a calendar year budget cycle. Therefore, this bill will help to rationalize the budgeting process for these agencies and assist them in their fiscal planning.
