1 AN ACT concerning abandoned motor vehicles and amending P.L. 1964, c.81.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 1 of P.L.1964, c.81 (C.39:10A-1) is an ended to read as follows:
- 1. a. When the State or any county, county park commission, municipality or any authority created by any thereof, hereinafter referred to as a "public agency." shall have taken possession of a motor vehicle found abandoned, such taking of possession shall be reported immediately to (1) the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles on a form prescribed by him, for verification of ownership and (2) the National Automobile Theft Bureau.
- b. When such motor vehicle which has been ascertained not to 15 be stolen and to be one which can be certified for a junk title certificate under section 3 of P.L.1964, c.81 (C.39:10A-3) shall 17 have remained unclaimed by the owner or other person having a legal right thereto for a period of 15 business days, even if at 19 that time the owner has not been identified as a result of efforts to make identification by the public agency or the Division of 21 Motor Vehicles, the same may be sold at auction in a public 23 place. If the certified motor vehicle is sold at auction prior to identification of the owner, the public agency shall document the 25 condition of the motor vehicle in writing and with photographs prior to the sale; document the amount obtained from the sale of the motor vehicle; and notify the owner, if his name and address 27 are identified after the sale, of the actions taken by the public agency to dispose of the motor vehicle. 29
- c. When a motor vehicle which cannot be certified for a junk title certificate under section 3 of P.L.1964, c.81 (C.39:10A-3) remains unclaimed by the owner or other person having a legal right thereto for a period of 20 business days, the motor

vehicle may be sold at auction in a public place, but shall be sold no later than 90 business days after the public agency takes possession of the vehicle, except that a waiver of the 90-day limit may be obtained for good cause from the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs.

d. The public agency shall give notice of a sale conducted pursuant to subsection b. or c. of this section, by certified mail, to the owner, if his name and address be known and to the holder of any security interest filed with the director, and by publication in a form to be prescribed by the director by one insertion, at least five days before the date of the sale, in one or more newspapers published in this State and circulating in the municipality in which such motor vehicle is held.

The Assembly Law Public Safety and Corrections Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 3124.
