The Assembly Higher Education and Regulated Professions Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 555 OCR Aca.

As amended by the committee, this bill permits the New Jersey State Board of Architects to use the uniform examination and grading service of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards and changes the requirements for taking the examination to become a licensed architect as follows:

- 1. An applicant would be required to be 18 or more years of age instead of the presently required age of more than 21 years;
- 2. An applicant would be required to submit an application 60 days prior to examination instead of 45 days;
- 3. An application would no longer be required to be endorsed by two registered architects;
  - 4. Present requirements regarding citizenship would be deleted;
- 5. An applicant would be required to have a baccalaureate or master's degree in architecture from a school with an architectural program accredited by the National Architecture Accrediting Board or have completed what the State board deems to be an equivalent education. Presently, candidates for licensure are required to complete a State board-approved program in architecture and work experience under a reputable architect; or the board may admit to examination a person who has acquired through experience, or experience and partial schooling the equivalent of a full course in architecture; and
- 6. The additional three-year experience requirement would be changed so that no part of the applicant's architectural experience would have to take place following the applicant's completion of his course in architecture.

The committee amended the bill (1) to clarify that the degree which an applicant must have to qualify to take the licensure examination must be a baccalaureate or master's degree in architecture and (2) to provide that to be eligible to take the licensure examination under the present educational and experience requirements, the applicant would have to meet these requirements on or before July 1, 1987.
