STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED MARCH 6, 1986

By Senators CONTILLO, FELDMAN and MCNAMARA

Referred to Committee on County and Municipal Government

An Act concerning county appropriations to certain health and welfare councils and amending P. L. 1978, c. 170.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. Section 2 of P. L. 1978, c. 170 (C. 40:23-8.28) is amended to 2 read as follows:

2. The governing body of any county may annually appropriate **[**funds in an amount not to exceed \$7,500.00] such sums as it deems 5 necessary to any private, nonprofit health and welfare council en-6 gaged in reviewing, developing, promoting and coordinating in an 7 advisory and consultative capacity, health and welfare programs 8 and services offered by any public or private agency, organization 9 or institution in that county, for the purpose of helping to defray 10 expenses incurred by such council in the provision of the aforesaid 11 services.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill would permit counties to appropriate funds as they deem necessary, to non-profit health and welfare councils to review, develop, promote and coordinate health and welfare programs in that county. Under the provisions of this bill, counties will be able to more efficiently provide for the health and welfare of residents.

LOCAL BUDGET AND FINANCE

Eliminates the \$7,500.00 cap placed on county appropriations to certain health and welfare councils.

ASSEMBLY COUNTY GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE STATEMENT TO SENATE, No. 1925 STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: JANUARY 13, 1987

The Assembly County Government Committee reports Senate Bill No. 1925 favorably.

Senate Bill No. 1925 amends section 2 of P. L. 1978, c. 170 (C. 40:23–5.28) to eliminate the \$7,500.00 cap currently imposed on the amount the governing body of a county may annually appropriate to private, nonprofit health and welfare councils and permit the appropriation of whatever amounts its members deemed necessary.

The councils eligible to receive the appropriations authorized under this bill are those private, nonprofit health and welfare councils which are engaged in reviewing, developing, promoting and coordinating health and welfare programs and services offered by public or private agencies in the county. The moneys received are to be used by the councils to help defray the costs incurred in providing those services.

The Senate County and Municipal Government Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1925.

Senate Bill No. 1925 permits the governing body of any county to annually appropriate any sum deemed necessary to certain private, nonprofit health and welfare councils. Currently, the county is limited to appropriations of not more than \$7,500.00 for those purposes.

Private, nonprofit councils eligible to receive appropriations are those councils engaged in reviewing, developing, promoting and coordinating health and welfare programs and services offered by public or private agencies in the county. The money received is to help defray the expenses of the council in providing its services.
