

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ASSEMBLY, No. 566 STATE OF NEW JERSEY

PRE-FILED FOR INTRODUCTION IN THE 1986 SESSION

By Assemblyman BRYANT

An Act to amend the "New Jersey Higher Education Tuition Aid Act," approved February 11, 1969 (P. L. 1968, c. 429).

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. Section 7 of P. L. 1968, c. 429 (C. 18A:71-47) is amended to 2 read as follows:

3 7. A college tuition aid grant shall be awarded annually to each eligible, qualified full-time undergraduate student enrolled in a 4 curriculum leading to a degree or certificate in an institution of $\mathbf{5}$ 6 collegiate grade in New Jersey approved or licensed by the State Board of Higher Education, or in an institution of collegiate grade 7in another state, provided that such state permits its residents to 8 9 utilize its state student financial assistance grants in New Jersey institutions of higher education through reciprocity agreements 10 approved by the Student Assistance Board and the Board of 11 12Higher Education. In no event shall a New Jersey tuition aid 13grant be utilized at an out of [state] State institution which is not licensed by that state and accredited by a regional accrediting as-14 15sociation recognized by the Council on Postsecondary Accreditation. (a) Eligibility. To each New Jersey resident enrolled as a full-16 time student after July 1, 1978 for the academic year beginning in 1718 September of 1978 the State shall grant an amount as provided 19in paragraph (b) of this section [7]. No student shall be eligible for 20 a grant unless he has certified in a form satisfactory to the Student Assistance Board that the grant is essential to his carrying out 21his plans for attending college. No student shall be eligible for 22EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law. Matter printed in italics thus is new matter.

23grants in more than [four] four and one-half academic years, unless 24the recipient is enrolled in an undergraduate program regularly requiring five academic years for completion, in which case the Stu-25dent Assistance Board shall permit [a fifth] five and one-half years 2627of eligibility. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, a student receiving aid under the provisions of P. L. 1968, c. 142 (C. 2818A:71-28 et seq.) shall be entitled to a sixth year of eligibility. 2930 Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, a county college student who transfers to a four year institution, or any student who 3132is required to pursue 18 or more credit hours in a remedial or 33 developmental curriculum as defined by regulations adopted by the Board of Higher Education is entitled to an additional half year of 34 eligibility. For the purpose of this amendatory act, a remedial 3536 curriculum shall include only noncredit courses in which a student is directed to enroll as a result of his score on the New Jersey 3738 College Basic Skills Placement test or its equivalent at independent 39 colleges or universities. Eligibility for tuition aid grants may be extended to part-time students through regulations developed by 40 the Student Assistance Board and approved by the Board of Higher 41 Education if the level of appropriated funds allows such an exten-4243sion, subject to prior approval by the Director of the Division of 44 Budget and Accounting in the Department of the Treasury and Joint Appropriation Committee's subcommittee on transfers or its 4546 successor. No student shall be eligible for grants unless he main-47 tains such minimum standards of academic performance as are required by the institution in which he is enrolled. No student shall 4849be eligible for a tuition aid grant who is enrolled in a course leading to a degree in theology or divinity. 50

51 In the event a student for any reason ceases to continue to be 52 enrolled or otherwise becomes ineligible during the course of an 53 academic year, he shall cease to be eligible for tuition aid. Both the 54 student and the institution shall have the responsibility to notify 55 the Student Assistance Board when a student ceases to be eligible 56 to receive student assistance because of withdrawal for any reason 57 or a change in status from a full to part-time student.

58(b) Amount of grant. The amount of a tuition aid grant under 59this act to any student attending an institution of higher education 60 in New Jersey shall be established by the Student Assistance Board 61 but shall not exceed the maximum amount of tuition normally 62charged at a public institution of higher education for students attending that institution or 50% of the average tuition normally 63 64 charged at the independent colleges and universities for students attending those institutions. The amount of a New Jersey Tuition 65

66 Assistance grant under this act to any student attending an insti-67 tuition of higher education in any state other than New Jersey pursuant to this section [7 of P. L. 1968, c. 429] shall not exceed 68 \$500.00 in an academic year. The amount of grant to be paid for 69 each semester or equivalent shall be based on the financial need 70for such a grant as determined by standards and procedures estab-7172lished by the Student Assistance Board and approved by the State 73 Board of Higher Education. The standards and procedures which 74shall be established by the Student Assistance Board for the fiscal 75year 1978-79 shall be submitted to the Legislature, together with appropriate supporting information, and such standards and pro-76cedures shall be deemed approved by the Legislature at the end 77of 30 calendar days after the date on which they are transmitted 7879 to the Legislature, or if the Legislature is not in session on the thirtieth day, then on the next succeeding day on which it shall be 80 meeting, unless between the date of transmittal and the end of the 81 82 30-day period the Legislature passes a concurrent resolution rejecting the standards and procedures in which case the standards 83 and procedures then in effect shall continue in effect. 84

85Any subsequent revisions of said standards and procedures shall 86 be submitted to the Legislature, together with appropriate supporting information, and such standards and procedures shall be 87 deemed approved by the Legislature at the end of 60 calendar days 88 after the date on which they are transmitted to the Legislature, or 89 if the Legislature is not in session on the sixtieth day, then on the 90 91 next succeeding day on which it shall be meeting, unless between the date of transmittal and the end of the 60-day period the Legislature 92 passes a concurrent resolution rejecting the standards and pro-93 94 cedures in which case the standards and procedures then in effect shall continue in effect. 95

96 (c) Appropriations for each program category of tuition aid97 grants shall be separately made by line item.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately and shall apply to tuition 2 aid grants awarded for the 1987-88 academic year and thereafter.

REGULATED PROFESSIONS --- COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

Provides that students eligible for tuition aid grant program are eligible for an additional one-half year. 86 (c) Appropriations for each program category of tuition aid87 grants shall be separately made by line item.

STATEMENT

This bill extends eligibility for a State Tuition Aid Grant (TAG) award for an additional one-half year to all TAG recipients. In addition, a county college student who transfers to a four-year institution and any student who is required to pursue a noncredit remedial or developmental program of 18 or more credit hours is entitled to an additional one-half year of TAG eligibility beyond the extension otherwise granted in the bill.

ASSEMBLY HIGHER EDUCATION AND REGULATED PROFESSIONS COMMITTEE

STATEMENT TO

ASSEMBLY, No. 566

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: MAY 5, 1986

The Assembly Higher Education and Regulated Professions Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 566.

This bill provides that a student who qualifies for a tuition aid grant (TAG) will be eligible to receive a grant for $4\frac{1}{2}$ academic years. If the student is enrolled in an undergraduate program regularly requiring five academic years, then he may receive a grant for $5\frac{1}{2}$ years. Also, a county college student who transfers to a four year institution, or a student who is required to take a remedial or developmental curriculum of 18 or more credit hours will be entitled to an additional half-year of eligibility.

Currently, students are eligible for a tuition aid grant for four academic years unless enrolled in a five year program in which case eligibility is extended to a fifth year. Also, a student who is receiving aid from the educational opportunity fund is entitled to a sixth year of eligibility.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 1986 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review which has been performed.

ASSEMBLY APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE STATEMENT TO ASSEMBLY, No. 566 STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: JUNE 12, 1986

The Assembly Appropriations Committee favorably reports this bill. Assembly Bill No. 566 provides that a student who qualifies for a tuition aid grant (TAG) would be eligible to receive a grant for 4½ academic years, depending on the program requirements. Currently, students are eligible for a tuition aid grant for four academic years unless enrolled in a five year program in which case eligibility is extended to a fifth year. In addition, a county college student who transfers to a four year institution, or a student who is required to take a remedial or developmental curriculum of 18 or more credit hours will be entitled to an additional half-year of eligibility.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Department of Higher Education has estimated the cost to be approximately \$740,000.00. The current appropriation for the TAG program is \$52 million and according to the department the projected need is estimated at \$50.6 million. The balance should be sufficient to absorb the cost of this bill without requiring an additional appropriation.

SENATE REVENUE, FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

STATEMENT TO

ASSEMBLY, No. 566

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: OCTOBER 2, 1986

The Senate Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee reported this bill favorably.

Assembly Bill No. 566 provides that a student who qualifies for a tuition aid grant (TAG) would be eligible to receive a grant for $4\frac{1}{2}$ or $5\frac{1}{2}$ academic years, depending on the program requirements. Further, a county college student who transfers to a four year institution, or a student who is required to take a remedial or developmental curriculum of 18 or more credit hours will be entitled to an additional half-year of eligibility. Currently, students are eligible for a tuition aid grant for four academic years unless enrolled in a five year program, in which case eligibility is extended for a fifth year.

The extended grants will be available for the 1987-88 academic year.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Department of Higher Education estimates that the cost of this program, in FY 1987-88, will be between \$740,000.00 and \$800,000.00. Because the extended grants will not be provided until the fall of 1987, the bill will have no impact on the State during the current fiscal year. It is anticipated that the department's FY 1987-88 budget will contain moneys for the program.

SENATE EDUCATION COMMITTEE STATEMENT TO ASSEMBLY, No. 566 STATE OF NEW JERSEY

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DATED: SEPTEMBER 22, 1986

The Senate Education Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 566 without amendment.

This bill provides that a student who qualifies for a tuition aid grant (TAG) will be eligible to receive a grant for $4\frac{1}{2}$ academic years. If the student is enrolled in an undergraduate program regularly requiring five academic years, then he may receive a grant for $5\frac{1}{2}$ years. Also, a county college student who transfers to a four year institution, or a student who is required to take a remedial or developmental curriculum of 18 or more credit hours will be entitled to an additional half-year of eligibility.

Currently, students are eligible for a tuition aid grant for four academic years unless enrolled in a five year program in which case eligibility is extended to a fifth year. Also, a student who is receiving aid from the educational opportunity fund is entitled to a sixth year of eligibility.

According to a fiscal note prepared for this bill, the Department of Higher Education estimates that the additional cost of the TAG program will be \$730,000.00 for the current fiscal year. The costs for fiscal year 1987-88 are estimated at \$736,000.00. Thereafter, costs are expected to stablize since enrollment declines should offset increasing tuition costs. Since, according to the Department of Higher Education, the projected need for the TAG program for this year is \$52,000,000.00 no additional funds should be needed for the costs of this bill.
