- (1) identification of existing State and local sources of data concerning youth suicide deaths, youth suicide attempts, and selfinflicted injuries by youth;
- (2) coordination and sharing of such data among identified State and local sources;

These amendments stipulate that the Commissioners of Human Services and Children and Families, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, shall prepare a report reviewing the effectiveness and sufficiency of services provided by the New Jersey-based suicide prevention hotlines, and transmit the report to the Governor and the Legislature, no later than 12 months after the effective date of the bill.

The amendments remove the provisions that require the Commissioner of Children and Families to review the effectiveness of services provide by the three crisis centers participating in the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network, and to implement measures affecting staffing levels, telephone calls, and personnel.

An August 2010 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline report stated that from August 2009 through July 2010, 60% of New Jersey's crisis calls were answered by Lifeline crisis counselors in other states (primarily New York and Nebraska), and that these counselors likely lacked access to specific information regarding New Jersey's youth suicide prevention services and resources.

The bill takes effect immediately, and requires the commissioner to transmit its report to the Governor and the Legislature within 18 months after the effective date of the bill.

According to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, more than 140 crisis centers participate in the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network. Each center receives calls from designated areas of the country, and calls are routed to the closest available crisis center. New Jersey operates three crisis centers in the Lifeline network: CONTACT We Care in Westfield, CONTACT of Mercer County in Ewing, and CONTACT of Burlington County in Moorestown.

An August 2010 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline report stated that from August 2009 through July 2010, 60% of New Jersey's crisis calls were answered by Lifeline crisis counselors in other states (primarily New York and Nebraska), and that these counselors likely lacked access to specific information regarding New Jersey's youth suicide prevention services and resources.

The committee amendments:

--stipulate that the Commissioners of Human Services and Children and Families, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, shall prepare a report reviewing the effectiveness and sufficiency of services provided by the New Jersey-based suicide prevention hotlines, and transmit the report to the Governor and the Legislature, no later than 12 months after the effective date of the bill;

--remove the provision that required the Commissioner of Children and Families to review the effectiveness of services provide by the three crisis centers participating in the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network and to implement measures affecting staffing levels, telephone calls, and personnel, and replace it with a general directive to review the New Jersey-based suicide prevention hotlines; and

--clarify that the Commissioner of Children and Families shall give thorough consideration to and, where appropriate, apply for any federal grants, and contributions and donations from other public or private sources; the amendments remove the provision requiring that the commissioner accept such grants, contributions, and donations.

As amended, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 3659(1R) (Angelini/Rible/Wolfe/Holzapfel/Vainieri Huttle), which the committee also reported on this date.
