The Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 812.

This bill amends P.L.1991, c.187, s.46 (C.45:9-22.11) and P.L.1991, c.385, s.9 (C.45:12-11) to remove the limitations with respect to dispensing and charging patients for contact lenses that emit therapeutic pharmaceutical agents. This type of contact lens represents new technology.

Current law generally restricts ophthalmologists from dispensing more than a seven-day supply of most drugs to their patients, and limits administrative charges to patients to 10% of a drug's cost. In the case of optometrists, current law prohibits them from dispensing more than a three-day supply of drugs unless the patient is not charged at all. Consequently, ophthalmologists and optometrists are limited in their ability to provide patients with this new form of eye treatment.

This bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1756 (Watson Coleman/Biondi), which is pending in the Assembly Regulated Professions Committee.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2010-2011 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.
