The Assembly Law and Public Safety Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1710.

Assembly Bill No. 1710 requires each county Emergency Operations Plan to include, as part of their planning preparation for mutual-aid fires or other emergencies involving the cooperative efforts of fire departments and forces within the county, a proposed command structure that would afford appropriate command support for the designated battalion chief or incident commander. The bill specifically requires that battalion and deputy chiefs be included as part of the county fire mutual aid plan.

When a number of different fire departments are called to respond to an emergency situation, a clearly designated and delineated support command structure is essential to coordinate an effective cooperative emergency response.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 2000 legislative session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

ADOPTED: JUNE 29, 2000

In its present form, Assembly Bill No. 1710 requires that every county emergency operations plan include, as part of its mutual fire aid plan, a command structure to provide appropriate support for the incident commander. The bill specifies that deputy chiefs and battalion chiefs are to be included in that command and support structure.

This Senate amendment clarifies that company officers also are to be included among those incorporated in the incident command and support structure outlined in each county emergency operation plans.

The amendments also reverse the references to deputy chiefs and battalion chiefs to be reflective of the normal chain of command.

CHAPTER 177

Each county and municipal Emergency Operations Plan shall be based upon planning criteria, objectives, requirements, responsibilities and concepts of operation for the implementation of all necessary and appropriate protective or remedial measures to be taken in response to an actual or threatened emergency as determined by the State Director of Emergency Management. Each Emergency Operations Plan shall provide for a command structure that affords appropriate command support for the incident commander. Deputy chiefs and battalion chiefs and company officers shall be included in the county fire mutual aid plan to respond to any emergency to supply command support or be assigned to the command structure. Each county and municipal Emergency Operations Plan shall be reviewed and updated at least every two years.

Governor Whitman today signed the following legislation:

- **S-968**, sponsored by Senators Vitale (D-Middlesex) and Bennett (R-Monmouth) and Assembly Members Weinberg (D-Bergen) and Zisa (D-Bergen), creates the new third-degree offense of endangering an injured victim.
- S-1383, sponsored by Senators Bucco (R-Morris) and Littell
 (R-Sussex/Hunterdon/ Morris) and Assembly Members Gregg
 (R-Sussex/Hunterdon/Morris) and Carroll (R-Morris), creates the Lake
 Hopatcong Commission and appropriates \$3 million.
- **S-572**, sponsored by Senators Robertson (R-Essex/Passaic) and Codey (D-Essex) and Assembly Member O'Toole (R-Essex/Union), permits simulated voting for minors at polling places.
- **S-454**, sponsored by Senators Girgenti (D-Passaic) and Kosco (R-Bergen) and Assembly Member Wisniewski (D-Middlesex), raises the maximum age for appointment for exempt firemen to age 45. Additionally, the bill removes the residency and citizenship requirements for qaulification for an exempt fireman certificate.
- **A-1710**, sponsored by Assembly Members Wisniewski (D-Middlesex) and Kelly (R-Bergen/Essex/Passaic) and Senators Bucco (R-Morris) and Girgenti (D-Passaic), makes a designated command structure a required element in municipal and county Emergency Operations Plans involving responses to mutual-aid fires.
- **A-2271**, sponsored by Assembly Members Russo (R-Bergen/Passaic) and Zecker (R-Essex/Passaic) and Senator Bennett (R-Monmouth), clarifies certain duties of the municipal prosecutor with respect to zoning and building code violations.
