- The bill eliminates the discretionary authority of the Greenwood Lake Commission to charge fees for docks, wharves and moorings on Greenwood Lake, lowers the permit fee for rowing shells 21 feet in length or more, and establishes a penalty for operating a boat or vessel without a permit on the lake.
- The discretionary authority for the commission to charge fees for docks, wharves and moorings and for annual permits for certain boats and vessels was established pursuant to P.L.2009, c.310 (C.32:20A-5.1), approved January 18, 2010. Since the enactment of P.L.2009, c.310, no dock, wharf or mooring fee has been assessed or collected.
- The Greenwood Lake Commission is a bi-state agency created jointly by the States of New Jersey and New York for the purpose of protecting and enhancing the environmental quality of the lake. This bill, if enacted into law, would take effect only upon the State of New York enacting into law substantially similar legislation, or if the State of New York has already enacted such legislation, the bill would take effect immediately.
- The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the bill would have no fiscal impact
 on State or local government budgets. The OLS cannot estimate the loss of revenue to the
 commission from eliminating the commission's discretionary authority to charge dock fees
 or the revenue that might be gained from penalties assessed for violations. The OLS



estimates that revenue would be lost by charging a flat fee instead of a per foot fee for rowing shells at least 21 feet long.

BILL DESCRIPTION

Senate Bill No. 1955 of 2010 would remove the discretionary authority of the Greenwood Lake Commission to charge fees for commercial and residential docks and would establish a penalty of up to \$500 for boat permit violations. Of the penalties collected, 50 percent would be allocated to the State or local government entity that issued the summons and 50 percent would be deposited into the Greenwood Lake Commission Fund.

In addition, the bill would authorize an annual permit fee of \$37.50 for rowing shells 21 feet in length or more. Under current law, boats or vessels greater than 25 feet must pay a fee of \$37.50 in addition to \$7.50 for each foot by which the length overall exceeds 25 feet, and \$30 for each foot by which the length overall exceeds 25 feet if the boat or vessel is outfitted for overnight use.

The bill would take effect only if and when the State of New York enacts similar legislation.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

None received.

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS estimates that the bill's enactment will have no fiscal impact on the State Budget or on local government budgets because the Greenwood Lake Commission does not receive regular funding or support from these bodies. However, it is possible that the State or a local government could voluntarily decide to provide funds to the commission to make up in whole or in part for any potential revenue lost to the commission because of this bill. The removal of the discretionary authority to charge fees for a dock, wharf, or mooring under the bill could be considered as a loss of unrealized revenue for the commission, since the commission has not yet assessed and collected the fees authorized pursuant to P.L.2009, c.310. In addition, there likely will be a loss of potential revenue to the commission from lowering the permit fee amount for certain rowing shells.

The commission is a bi-state agency supported by federal, state, and local grants, local government donations and volunteers. While the OLS cannot estimate the amount of revenue that would be lost from eliminating the authority to charge dock fees, upon enactment this bill would cause a loss of unrealized revenue to the commission since the commission has not yet assessed and collected these fees. Previously, the commission estimated that approximately \$140,000 would be collected from fees authorized by the New York State version of P.L.2009, c.310. However, the commission recently informally projected that some marinas could have been required to pay more than \$20,000 in dock fees had the fees actually been assessed, and the current law applies to not only marinas but to all kinds of docks, public and private. If all of these fees were actually collected, they could amount to significantly more than the initial

estimate of \$140,000. The elimination of the authority to charge these dock fees greatly reduces the funds that otherwise potentially could have been collected by the commission.

This bill requires rowing shells 21 feet in length or more to obtain an annual permit for a flat fee of \$37.50. The commission has informally indicated to the OLS that about 75 shells currently use the lake and that many shells are 62 feet long. Under the existing formula, a rowing shell 62 feet long would pay a total of \$315, which is composed of the \$37.50 fee plus the \$7.50 per foot for the additional 37 feet; 75 shells of this length would equate to \$23,625 to be collected by the commission. Under the bill's provisions, the commission would receive \$2,812.50 from 75 rowing shells paying a flat fee of \$37.50, instead of \$23,625 (assuming 75 shells averaging 62 feet in length), for a total revenue loss of approximately \$20,000 to \$21,000. Additionally, the \$37.50 permit fee would likely also apply to shells that take part in a competition or regatta, and thus more rowing shells may be eligible for this smaller fee.

The penalty for operating a boat without an annual permit would be a fine of up to \$500 per violation, of which 50 percent would be allocated to the entity that issued the summons and 50 percent would be deposited into the Greenwood Lake Commission Fund. The OLS cannot estimate the amount of penalty revenue that would be received by the commission or by any entity authorized to issue a summons. The commission has informally indicated to the OLS that the penalty is not intended as a revenue source for the commission; rather, the possibility of being fined will be used to encourage the boating public to obtain the required permit. However, as more boaters comply with the law, more permit fee revenue should be realized by the commission. Additionally, as the public becomes more aware of the permit requirement, it is projected that fewer violations will occur.
