The bill provides that the Department of Law and Public Safety, in conjunction with the Statewide Computer Crime Task Force, would establish, maintain and publicize the availability of this hotline. Hotline operations would receive and respond to inquiries or complaints from citizens reporting computer crime, including but not limited to online child pornography; cyber-stalking; threats of violence in schools or other institutions; internet fraud, and unauthorized intrusions into computer systems.

The Statewide Computer Crime Task Force consists of the Computer Analysis and Technology Unit in the Division of Criminal Justice and the High Technology Crime and Investigations Support Unit in the Division of State Police, as well as representatives of federal, county and municipal law enforcement.

The division estimates that another \$15,000 will be needed for supplies and \$21,000 for data processing and other services. After adjusting for inflation and certain one-time costs, the division estimates the second and third year costs of the bill at \$276,000 and \$294,000, respectively.

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) does not concur with the Executive estimate. OLS estimates the cost of this bill at \$64,500 in the first year after enactment. OLS observes that the division's estimate for additional personnel is excessive. Current staff can receive and respond to inquiries or complaints from the public reporting computer crime during normal business hours. OLS notes that this is currently part of the High Tech Crime and Investigations unit's mission. Calls originating during nonbusiness hours could be recorded by voice mail.

OLS notes that the cost to establish a toll-free number is \$50 per month plus 5.5 cents per minute for calls originating from New Jersey. OLS assumes that the unit will receive approximately 50 calls per month, at an average length of 15 minutes. Thus, the toll-free number would cost the unit approximately \$49,500 per year. Other costs would include publicizing the toll-free number. OLS estimates this cost at \$15,000 per year.

OLS observes that the High Tech Crime and Investigations unit may need the additional personnel noted in the division's estimate to respond to inquires and complaints from the public, should the number of complaints increase substantially due to the availability of the toll free number.

The department shall take appropriate steps to publicize the hotline.
