PRE-FILED FOR INTRODUCTION IN THE 1984 SESSION

By Senator RAND

AN ACT to amend the "Cancer Research Act," approved January 17, 1983 (P. L. 1983, c. 6).

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State*
2 *of New Jersey:*

1 1. Section 4 of P. L. 1983, c. 6 (C. 52:9U-4) is amended to read
2 as follows:

3 4. a. There is established in the Executive Branch of the State
4 government, the New Jersey State Commission on Cancer Research.
5 For the purposes of complying with the provisions of Article V,
6 Section IV, paragraph 1 of the New Jersey Constitution, the
7 commission is allocated within the Department of Health, but not-
8 withstanding that allocation, the commission shall be independent
9 of any supervision or control by the department or by any board
10 or officer thereof.

11 b. The commission shall consist of **[nine]** *11* members including
12 the Commissioners of the Department of Health and the Depart-
13 ment of Environmental Protection or their appointed designees,
14 and **[seven]** *nine* citizens of New Jersey or persons otherwise as-
15 sociated with the State who are known for their knowledge, com-
16 petence, experience or interest in medical research, appointed by
17 the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate.

18 c. The term of office of each appointed member shall be three
19 years, but of the members first appointed, three shall be appointed
20 for terms of one year, three for terms of two years, and one for a
21 term of three years. *The terms of office of the two additional mem-*
22 *bers appointed pursuant to this amendatory act shall expire upon*

23 *the expiration of the term of office of the member first appointed*
24 *for a term of three years.* All vacancies shall be filled for the bal-
25 ance of the unexpired term in the same manner as the original
26 appointment. The members of the commission shall not receive
27 any compensation for their services, but shall be reimbursed for
28 the actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of
29 their duties as members of the commission.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

The purpose of this bill is to increase the number of members of the New Jersey State Commission on Cancer Research from nine to 11 members. Of the original nine members, seven members are to be citizens of New Jersey or persons otherwise associated with the State who are known for their knowledge, competence, experience or interest in medical research. This bill requires that the commission be comprised of two additional citizens who meet that description.

Governor Thomas H. Kean today signed legislation to transfer the Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund from the Division of Motor Vehicles to the Department of Insurance and to provide for the appointment of an executive director to administer the fund.

The legislation, A-1846, was sponsored by Assemblyman Michael Adubato, D-Essex.

It also transfers the duty of licensing auto body shops from the Department of Insurance to the Division of Motor Vehicles.

Other bills signed by the Governor today are:

A-3228, sponsored by Assemblyman Harold Colburn, R-Burlington, to provide a supplemental appropriation of \$1.45 million from a Federal Veterans' Administration grant to construct a New Jersey Veterans' Cemetery in Arneytown, Burlington County.

S-139, sponsored by Senator Walter Rand, D-Camden, to increase the membership of the State Commission on Cancer Research from nine to eleven members by adding two public members.

S-2042, sponsored by Senator Wayne Dumont, R-Warren, to increase the membership of the State Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors from eight to ten.

S-2252, sponsored by Senator Raymond Lesniak, D-Union, to permit consumers to place money for funeral expenses in a trust.

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
