STATE OF NEW JERSEY

PRE-FILED FOR INTRODUCTION IN THE 1984 SESSION

By Senators BASSANO and DIFRANCESCO

AN ACT concerning vital records and amending R. S. 26:8-8.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. R. S. 26:8–8 is amended to read as follows:

2 26:8-8. Suitable quarters shall be provided for the registration 3 of vital records which quarters shall be properly equipped with 4 fire resistant **[**vault**]** area and filing cases for the permanent and 5 safe preservation of all official records made and returned under 6 this chapter and chapter 6 of this Title (§ 26:6-1 et seq.) as well as 7 chapter 1 of Title 37 of the Revised Statutes.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

The purpose of this bill is to change the requirement of a fire resistant vault to a fire resistant area to secure the vital statistics maintained by the State Department of Health. This is a more cost effective method to achieve the goal of safe and secure vital statistics.

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law. Matter printed in italics *thus* is new matter.

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ASSEMBLY CORRECTIONS, HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE

STATEMENT TO SENATE, No. 627

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: FEBRUARY 4, 1985

This bill changes the requirement of a fire resistant vault as currently provided in R. S. 26:8-8 to a fire resistant area to secure vital statistics maintained by the Department of Health.

The bill, which passed the Senate 32 to none. on April 30, 1984, is identical to A-308 (Franks) which the committee reported at the same time. Both bills were reported favorably without amendments.

SENATE INSTITUTIONS, HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

STATEMENT TO SENATE, No. 627

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: FEBRUARY 27, 1984

This bill requires that vital records (i.e., birth, marriage and death records) maintained by the State Department of Health be kept in a fire resistant area. The law presently requires that these records be kept in a fire resistant vault.

BILLS SIGNED

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JUNE 27, 1985

<u>A-2157</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Thomas A. Pankok, D-Salem, which permits county colleges to form insurance groups and to participate in joint self-insurance funds, risk management programs and related services.

<u>A-2040</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman John A. Girgenti, D-Passaic, which provides that if a public utility petitions the Board of Public Utilities for a hearing on an issue affecting a county or municipality, the utility must so notify the municipal clerk or the clerk of the board of freeholders at least 20 days prior to the hearing.

<u>S-627</u>, sponsored by State Senator C. Louis Bassano, R-Union, which alters the requirements for safekeeping of vital statistics maintained by the Department of Health. The bill requires that the records be maintained in a fire resistant area. The previous requirement was for the records to be kept in a fireproof vault.

<u>S-2873</u>, sponsored by State Senator Garrett W. Hagedorn, R-Bergen, which validates the authorization for school bonds authorized by the Borough of Pompton Lakes.

<u>A-393</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Vincent O. Pellecchia, D-Passaic, which establishes a Children's Trust Fund in the Department of Treasury funded by a taxpayer checkoff on the State income tax return. It also creates a Child Life Protection Commission empowered to make grants from the fund to public and private agencies for programs dealing with child abuse.
