An Act concerning death benefits paid to minor children of certain municipal employees and amending P. L. 1964, c. 275.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
- 2 of New Jersey:
- 1 Section 7 of P. L. 1964, c. 275 (C. 43:13-22.56) is amended to

- 4 (a) Upon the death of a member in service who shall have paid

22A pension in an amount equal to 21/2% of the member's final 23 salary for each year of his service shall be paid to the surviving 24widow, so long as she remains unmarried, surviving widower, so long as he remains unmarried, minor children or dependent parents, 25as the case may be; provided, however, that in no instance shall 26 27 such pension exceed, in the aggregate, an amount equal to \$100.00 28per annum for each year of the member's service. If the pension 29 is payable to minor children, no one of such children shall receive more than \$600.00 \$2,500.00 per annum, nor shall a pension be 30 31 paid to any such child after he marries or reaches the age of 18 32years.

In the event a pension shall be payable as a result of the death of a member in service and there are no eligible survivors at the time of such member's death, an amount equal to such member's contributions to the fund, without interest, shall be paid to his estate.

If at the time of the death of a member in service the sole eligible survivors of such member are minor children and the total of the aggregate payments on account of such children shall be an amount which is less than such member's contributions to the fund, without interest, the balance of such amount shall be payable to the guardian of such minor children.

This bill amends the law governing municipal retirement systems in cities of the first class having a population of less than 300,000.

Under that law, upon the death of an active member of the system, if the death occurs as the result of a service-connected injury or after 20 years' service, or upon the death of a retired member of the system, a pension is payable to each minor child of the deceased member or retired member. At present, the statutory amount of the pension is \$600.00 per year; the bill would raise this amount to \$2,500.00 per year.

COMMITTEE ACTION

The committee reported the bill favorably.

Governor Thomas H. Kean today signed legislation increasing the amount of funds which can be expended for funeral and burial expenses for a foster child or one receiving welfare assistance.

The legislation, $\underline{A-2846}$, was sponsored by Assemblywoman Marlene Ford, D-Ocean.

Currently, the maximum payment for such expenses is \$550. The bill, effective in 30 days, increases that amount to a sum based on the average cost of a funeral and burial in the area.

Other bills signed by Kean include:

A-1929, sponsored by Assemblyman Anthony Marsella, D-Camden, to permit the Department of Energy to expend \$1 million to renovate public buildings in a program to reduce energy consumption. The \$1 million is in unexpended bond funds originally allocated to conduct energy audits of State buildings.

 $\underline{A-1963}$, sponsored by Assemblyman John Doyle, D-Ocean, to require designated parking spaces for handicapped persons at multiple dwellings with handicapped residents.

 $\underline{A-2764}$, sponsored by Assemblyman Paul Cuprowski, D-Hudson, to increase the annual pension of a minor child of a deceased member of the Jersey City Retirement System from \$600 to \$2,500.

 $\underline{A-3762}$, sponsored by Assemblyman Joseph Charles, D-Hudson, to reactivate the pension account of a municipal court judge in Union City, who had retired from public service and was re-employed within four years.
