AN ACT to authorize the establishment of the New Jersey ******[Volunteer]****** Youth Corps in the Department of Community Affairs and prescribing the purposes and organization thereof.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "New Jersey
 2 **[Volunteer]** Youth Corps Act."

1 2. a. The Legislature finds and declares :

(1) There persist in the State and especially in the urban communities of New Jersey, areas of economic decay and declining
housing stock and human deprivation, marked by the progressive
deterioration of housing and community facilities and installations
of the economic infrastructure.

7 (2) The ******[darth]**** *****dearth******* of employment opportunities 8 for young persons in these areas has chronically exceeded any 9 life problems experienced in other areas and under current eco-10 nomic conditions, has reached catastropic proportions, particularly 11 with respect to minority youth.

12(3) The persistence of these problems despite the fact that the very youth thus affected present a vast and largely untapped 1314 resource of talent, energy and zeal sufficient to make a significant contribution to the revitalization of our urban and urbanized areas, 15suggests the need and desirability of establishing some mechanism 16to recruit, organize and direct the boundless energy and vigorous 17idealism of youth, so as to match their hitherto neglected potential 18 19 against the currently intractable problems of urban reconstruction.

this act to establish a New Jersey **[Volunteer]** Youth Corps to
recruit, train and employ young persons to supplement and assist
in preserving, conserving and enhancing those assets that are
necessary to a sound and flourishing community life and are currently threatened by ongoing forces of urban decay.

26c. Specifically, but without limiting the generality of the fore-27going, it is the intent of the Legislature that the New Jersey 28******[Volunteer] ****** Youth Corps would be employed in such projects 29as the rehabilitation of substandard housing; ** [the preparation of land for the redevelopment, the assembly of modular and prefabri-3031cated housing,]** the repair, restoration and maintenance of ** [public buildings, parks, streets and other] ** public facilities 3233 and amenities; assisting in the organization and delivery of educational and health services and other social services required by 3435various segments of urban populations.

36d. It is the further intent of the Legislature that the New Jersey **[Volunteer]** Youth Corps, in recruiting young persons for 37 service thereon, should aim primarily at providing socially worth-38while and reasonably remunerative employment to urban youth to 39 whom these opportunities might not otherwise be available**[, and 40 also, if secondarily, at enlisting the talents and zeal of other young 41 42persons who, whatever their opportunities for other employment, may volunteer their special skills or training for community service **4**3 within the context of this program]**. $\mathbf{44}$

Assembly Bill No. 1154 is reported favorably, with amendments.

This bill provides for establishment of a "New Jersey Volunteer Youth Corps" to employ young persons, aged 16 to 21, in community service projects in the State's economically distressed areas.

The bill authorizes the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs to establish the Volunteer Youth Corps, but adds provisions for decentralization of its administration: with the approval of the Commissioner, the chief executives of the several municipalities in which the Corps is engaged in projects may administer those projects and related Corps activities.

Provision is made for Corps members to be given not only employment, but also vocational training and, where appropriate, additional basic education. The bill envisages two bases for membership in the Corps: (1) those young persons to whom other opportunities for socially worthwhile and reasonably remunerative employment are unavailable, and (2) those who, whatever their other employment prospects, have talents applicable to community-service projects and a disposition to volunteer for such service.

The committee adopted amendments which:

1) Prohibit the Volunteer Youth Corps from seeking to provide its services under circumstances where that would constitute competition with private business, or with organized labor.

2) Authorize the retaining of labor unions to provide supervisory services or training programs, or a combination thereof. Such services and the compensation therefor, would be by agreement between the administrator and the union or its representative, subject to approval by the Commissioner of Labor.

The bill provides for the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs to establish the "New Jersey Volunteer Youth Corps." The corps would be employed in such projects as the rehabilitation of substandard housing; the preparation of land for redevelopment, the assembly of modular and prefabricated housing, the repair, restoration and maintenance of public buildings, parks, streets and other public facilities and amenities; assisting in the organization and delivery of educational and health services and other social services required by various segments of urban populations.

The corps would employ young persons who are 16 through 25 years of age and who either are unable, through lack of skills or jobs, to find work or possess skills and interests appropriate to community service projects. To enroll and continue membership in the corps, a person without a high school diploma or its equivalent must pursue additional education and a person who is deficient in job skills or who has a aptitude for developing special skills must agree to pursue a course of training. Members of the corps would receive reasonable remunerative stipends while engaged in community service projects.

In addition to the authority to enter agreements with the Department of Education or the Department of Labor, or with any public or private educational institution for the design, provision or supervision of educational, vocational-training or apprenticeship programs, the commissioner may retain recognized labor unions to provide supervisory services on projects or vocational training or apprenticeship programs, or a combination thereof, for just compensation.

The commissioner may delegate to mayors or chief executive officers of municipalities or to the Executive Director of the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency the authority to recruit youth for the corps, procure their training and designate the community service projects.

The corps must be used on cost-effective projects; may not be employed in unfair price or wage competition with business or individuals; and may not compete for any project on which an incorporated business or recognized labor union has expressed an intention to bid. ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1154 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1154 (OCR), with my objections, for reconsideration.

I am in full agreement with the purposes of this legislation to address the problem of youth unemployment in New Jersey.

It should be noted that significant amounts of money under the Job Training Partnership Act, a Federal program, are spent in New Jersey as part of our efforts to address this problem. These Federal funds are distributed locally through the New Jersey Department of Labor, and \$27 million has been spent on the program in New Jersey for the summer of 1984.

The program contemplated under A-1154 should not be duplicative of the Job Training Partnership Act effort. Rather, our efforts under this legislation should be targeted toward those most in need who may not qualify for training under other programs. I recommend calling the program the New Jersey Youth Corps Act.

I envision and my recommendations suggest a program under which the Department of Community Affairs could designate community service project sponsors to recruit, train and employ eligible youth in community service projects for a period not ordinarily to exceed 52 weeks. Sponsors could include any county, municipality or school district, or public or private non-profit corporations.

My recommendations include a provision that the sponsors may be required to contribute a portion of the cost of funding of this program, and no more than 10% of the money appropriated for this program should be utilized for its administration.

The program would be targeted to those between the ages of 16 and 25 who have not completed the course of instruction prescribed for graduation from high school and who have the skills, character and initiative, or the potential to develop them, to benefit from the corps. I am recommending an initial appropriation of \$1.5 million for this. This will ensure that the program is well targeted, but it is a sufficient amount of money to create a meaningful program.

I am also proposing various minor amendments to facilitate the administration of the program.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1154 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Governor Thomas H. Kean unveiled the New Jersey Youth Corps Program today calling it one of the most unique of its kind in the nation.

He officiated at ceremonies where nine sponsors of the new State-financed program were awarded grants to provide education and employment for some 600 high school dropouts aged 16 to 25.

"It is with a great deal of pride that I point to the implementation of this program as a major accomplishment of my Administration," Kean said. "We will reap the benefits for many years to come."

The ceremonies launching the program were held at the St. Joseph's Home for Elderly Women in Paterson.

The program provides paying jobs and the basic education necessary to achieve a high school diploma for young people who cannot read or write well and lack a sustained employment experience.

"It's a second chance for people. It puts high school dropouts back into the classroom and gives them employment and an income while teaching them good work habits," the Governor said.

The program is sponsored jointly by the State Departments of Community Affairs and Education with appropriation of \$1.5 million and \$500,000 respectively. The year-long program is being divided into two six-month segments.

Commissioner Saul Cooperman of the State Department of Education said, "This program isn't just another plan to give young people a summer job picking up litter or pulling weeds --- it provides them with a sustained employment experience and teaches them how to work. Most important, however, it brings them back to school with an opportunity to earn their high school diplomas."

The program's participants will be required to spend four hours a day in the classroom and four hours working in carefully supervised community service projects. They will be paid \$3.35 an hour for their work.

"There are other youth corps programs in the nation, but this is the first one written exclusively to help high school dropouts earn their diplomas," said Commissioner John P. Renna of the State Department of Community Affairs.

"The type of person this plan will assist has dropped out of high school for one reason or another and is already having problems functioning in our society. The program will change the attitudes and behavior of these young adults by providing counseling, job experience and academic training," he said.

A pilot program to judge the value and efficiency of the project has been underway in this city for three months. The Adult Education School of Paterson was selected to administer the experimental program.

It involves 20 young people studying for their high school diplomas in the adult education facilities and working in places like the local library, a church-operated day-care center, the Paterson Welfare Office and helping to distribute food to the needy.

Renna said the pilot program here has been closely monitored and is considered to be very successful.

"We are pleased with what we have seen demonstrated here and are anxious to proceed with the program with new sponsors," Renna said.
