

# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED JANUARY 27, 1983

By Assemblymen KAVANAUGH, SMITH and ZIMMER

AN ACT concerning county celleges and amending section 25 of P. L. 1982, c. 189.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. Section 25 of P. L. 1982, c. 189 (C. 18A:64A-25.25) is amended 2 to read as follows:

25. In the preparation of plans and specifications for the construction, alteration or repair of any building by a county college, when the entire cost of the work and materials will exceed \$4,500.00, separate plans and specifications [shall] may be prepared for each of the following to include all work and materials related thereto or to be performed or furnished in connection therewith:

9 (a) The plumbing and gas fitting work;

10 (b) The heating and ventilating systems and equipment;

11 (c) The electrical work, including any electrical power plants;

(d) The structural steel and ornamental iron works;

(e) All other work and materials required for the completion ofthe project.

15The contracting agent shall advertise for and receive in the 16 manner provided by law (1) separate bids for each of the foregoing categories (a) through (e) [and] or (2) bids for all work and 17 18 materials required to complete the entire project if awarded as a single contract or, (3) both. All bids submitted shall set forth the 19 20name or names of, and evidence of performance security from, all 21subcontractors to whom the bidder will subcontract the work described in the foregoing categories (a) through (e). 22

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law. Matter printed in italics *thus* is new matter. 23Contracts shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder. 24 [A] In the event that a contract is advertised in accordance with 25(3) above, the contract shall be awarded in the following manner: if the sum total of the amounts bid by the lowest responsible bidder 26for each category (a) through (e) is less than the amount bid by 2728the lowest responsible bidder for all the work and materials, the 29county college shall award separate contracts for each of such 30 categories to the lowest responsible bidder therefor, but if the sum total of the amount bid by the lowest responsible bidder for each 3132category is not less than the amount bid by the lowest responsible 33 bidder for all the work and materials, the county college shall award  $\mathbf{34}$ a single contract to the lowest responsible bidder for all of such 35 work and materials. In every case in which a contract is awarded under (2) above, all payments required to be made under the 36 37 contract for work and materials supplied by a subcontractor shall, upon the certification of the contractor of the amount due to the sub-38 contractor, be paid directly to the subcontractor. 39

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Governor Thomas H. Kean has signed the following bills:

<u>S-3100</u>, sponsored by State Seantor John A. Lynch, D-Middlesex, which extends the municipal budget calendar for 1983. The bill provides for a five week extension on various filing deadlines for municipal budget preparation. It was made necessary by delays in revisions to the cap law and in obtaining State and Federal aid figures. The extension applies for this year only.

<u>A-3046</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Walter J. Kavanaugh, R-Somerset, which amends the County College Contracts Law to permit county colleges to prepare separate plans and specifications for the various aspects of a construction, repair or alteration job when the total cost of the work to be done exceeds \$4,500.

<u>S-1187</u>, sponsored by State Senator John H. Dorsey, R-Morris, which permits local boards of health and county health departments to enforce the Solid Waste Management Act.

<u>A-1074</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Walter M.D. Kern, R-Bergen, which will permit public libraries to keep and use revenues realized from the operation photocopy machines. Currently, libraries can charge for the use of the machines, but must turn the revenues over to the municipality rather than use them itself.

<u>S-1202</u>, sponsored by State Senator Carmen A. Orechio, D-Essex, which allows municipalities to conduct "cap" referenda using school election laws concerning polling places and compensation of election workers. The bill is intended to save money for a municipality, since school elections are conducted in a less expensive manner that normal municipal elections.
