

No person under the age [of 18 years] at which a person is authorized to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages, other than a person licensed under the provisions of this act in the regular course of his licensed activities, shall enter a licensed casino except by way of passage to another room.

b. Any licensee or employee of a casino who allows a [minor] person under the age [of 18] at which a person is authorized to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages to remain in a casino is a disorderly person; except that the establishment of all of the following facts by a "[person] "licensee or employee" allowing any such [minor] underage person to remain shall constitute a defense to any prosecution therefor:

16 (1) That the [minor] underage person falsely represented in 17 writing that he or she was [18 years of age or over] at or over 18 the age at which a person is authorized to purchase and consume 19 alcoholic beverages;

Enactment of this bill would have the effect of raising the age at which individuals may participate in casino gambling from 18 to 21 years of age. This purpose is accomplished by amending both the Casino Control Act and Title 9 which contains the age of majority to indicate that the age at which the consumption of alcoholic beverages is permitted shall be the age at which participation in casino gambling is permitted.

The committee adopted amendments to Assembly Bill No. 1709 to conform its provisions to those of recently enacted chapter 215 of the Laws of 1982 which raised the drinking age to 21.

A-1466, sponsored by Assembly Minority Leader Dean A. Gallo,
R-Morris, which regulates the resale of tickets for entertainment events at public facilities in the state. The bill requires that ticket brokers be licensed, post a bond and maintain an office in the state. It limits the resale value of tickets to \$3 or 20 percent over face value, whichever is greater.

The provisions of the bill apply to tickets for events at publicly owned venues: the Meadowlands Sports Complex, Rutgers University

Athletic Center and the Garden State Arts Center. The bill makes violation of the law a crime of the fourth degree, carrying maximum penalties of 18 months in jail and a \$7,500 fine.

A-1709/S-2068, sponsored by Assemblyman Dennis L. Riley, D-Camden and State Senator John F. Russo, D-Ocean, which establishes the age at which a person is able to legally purchase and consume alcoholic beverages as the minimum age for attendance and participation in casino gambling.
