# INTRODUCED SEPTEMBER 23, 1982 

By Senators BASSANO and GRAVES<br>Referred to Committee on Law, Public Safety and Defense

An Act concerning alcohol and drug prevention and amending R. S. 39:3-10.

Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. R. S. $39: 3-10$ is amended to read as follows:
$39: 3-10$. No person shall drive a motor vehicle on a public highway in this State unless licensed to do so in accordance with this article. No person under 17 years of age shall be licensed to drive motor vehicles, nor shall a person be licensed until he has passed a satisfactory examination as to his ability as an operator. The examination shall include a test of the applicant's vision, his ability to understand traffic control devices, his knowledge of safe driving practices and of the effects that ingestion of alcohol or drugs has on a person's ability to operate a motor vehicle, his knowledge of such portions of the mechanism of motor vehicles as is necessary to insure the safe operation of a vehicle of the kind or kinds indicated by the applicant and of the laws and ordinary usages of the road and a demonstration of his ability to operate a vehicle of the class designated.
The director shall expand the driver's license examination by $20 \%$. The additional questions to be added shall consist solely of questions developed in conjunction with the State Department of Health concerning the use of alcohol or drugs as related to highway safety. The director shall develop in conjunction with the State Department of Health supplements to the driver's manual which shall include information necessary to answer any question on the
driver's license examination concerning alcohol or drugs as related
to highway safety.
Any person applying for a driver's license to operate a motor
vehicle or motorized bicycle in this State shall surrender to the
director any current driver's license issued to him by another state
or foreign country upon his receipt of a driver's license for this
State. The director shall refuse to issue a driver's license if the
applicant fails to comply with this provision.

The director shall create classified licensing of drivers covering the following classifications:
a. Motorcycles;
b. Omnibuses as classified by R. S. 39:3-10.1 and school buses classified under N. J. S. 18A :39-1 et seq.;
c. Articulated vehicles means a combination of a commercial motor vehicle registered at a gross weight in excess of 18,000 pounds and one or more motor-drawn vehicles joined together by means of a coupling device;
d. All motor vehicles not included in classifications a., b. and c. A license issued pursuant to this classification d. shall be referred to as the "basic driver's license."

Every applicant for a license under classification b. or c. shall be a holder of a basic driver's license. Any issuance of a license under classification b. or c. shall be by endorsement on the basic driver's license.

A driver's license for motorcycles may be issued separately, but if issued to the holder of a basic driver's license, it shall be by endorsement on the basic driver's license.
The director, upon payment of the lawful fee and after he or an inspector of his has examined the applicant and is satisfied of the applicant's ability as an operator, may, in his discretion, license the applicant to drive a motor vehicle. The license shall authorize him to drive any registered vehicle, of the kind or kinds indicated, and shall expire, except as otherwise provided, on the last day of the forty-eighth calendar month following the calendar month in which such license was issued.

The director may issue a renewal of a basic driver's license which does not bear a photograph, and which shall expire on the last day of the twenty-fourth calendar month following the calendar month in which such license was issued, to any person 60 years of age or older who makes application for such a license.

The director may, at his discretion and for good cause shown, issue licenses which shall expire on a date fixed by him. The fee for such licenses shall be fixed by the director in amounts proportionately less or greater than the fee herein established.

100 All applications for renewals of licenses shall be made on forms 101 prescribed by the director and in accordance with procedures 102 established by him.
103 The director in his discretion may refuse to grant a license to 104 drive motor vehicles to a person who is, in his estimation, not a 105 proper person to be granted such a license, but no defect of the 106 applicant shall debar him from receiving a license unless it can be 107 shown by tests approved by the Director of the Division of Motor 108 Vehicles that the defect incapacitates him from safely operating 109 a motor vehicle.

110 A person violating this section shall be subject to a fine not ex111 ceeding $\$ 500.00$ or imprisonment in the county jail for not more 112 than 60 days, but if that person has never been licensed to drive in 113 this State or any other jurisdiction, he shall be subject to a fine of 114 not less than $\$ 200.00$ and, in addition, the court shall issue an order 115 to the Director of the Division of Motor Velhicles requiring the 116 director to refuse to issue a license to operate a motor vehicle to 117 the person for a period of not less than 180 days. The penalties 118 provided for by this paragraph shall not be applicable in cases 119 where failure to have actual possession of the operator's license is 120 due to an administrative or technical error by the Division of 121 Motor Vehicles.

122 Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter or extend the 123 expiration of any license issued prior to the date this amendatory 124 and supplementary act becomes operative.
1 2. This act shall take effect three months following enactment.

## STATEMENT

In 1981, young drivers under age 21 were involved in 30,151 serious motor vehicle accidents in this State resulting in 287 fatalities and 29,864 injuries. Although this age group accounts for only $7.5 \%$ of the State's drivers, the group accounts for $16 \%$ of all fatal crashes, $15 \%$ of all injuries and $18 \%$ of all alcoholrelated crashes. Statistics reveal an enormous increase in alcoholrelated accidents involving drivers between age 18 and 20 from $8.9 \%$ of the number of accidents in 1972 to $32 \%$ of the total number of accidents in 1978.

This bill authorizes the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to expand the current driver's license examination by $20 \%$. The additional questions to be added to the examination would cover the subject of alcohol or drugs as related to highway safety. The director is authorized to expand the driver's manual to include supplemental information required to be known for the driver's license examinatiou.

Increased emphasis on preventive education should yield savings in lives and suffering, savings of millions of dollars annually in health care costs for persons injured or incapacitated by drunk drivers and savings in the high cost of property damage.

Governor Thomas H. Kean today signed the following bills:

S-1754, sponsored by Senator C. Louis Bassano, R-Union, to expand the current drivers' license examination to include information and questions concerning alcohol or drugs as related to highway safety.

S-1869, also sponsored by Senator Bassano, to eliminate the requirement that a person surrender a current drivers' license issued by a foreign country upon receipt of a New Jersey drivers' license.

S-866, sponsored by Senator Raymond Zane, D- Gloucester, to appropriate $\$ 61,614$ to the Department of Agriculture to indemnify the owners of several cattle dairy herds which the Department has determined must be destroyed due to the incidence of brucellosis, a contagious and fatal disease.

S-1604, sponsored by Senator Wynona Lipman, D-Essex, to appropriate $\$ 115,000$ to the Newark Public Library. The bill was conditionally vetoed by the Governor to reduce the amount from $\$ 200,000$ as originally provided. The additional $\$ 85,000$ would be provided by legislative passage of a bill to provide an additional $\$ 2.05$ million appropriation for additional aid to libraries throughout the state.
