6. (New section) A registered professional nurse who attests to 1 2the actual determination and pronouncement of death on the certificate of death or who executes the certificate of death may receive 3 a reasonable fee for the performance of these services.

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7. This act shall take effect immediately.

#### STATEMENT

This bill recognizes that, in many instances, the actual determination and pronouncement of death need not be performed by a physician. Today, registered professional-nurses routinely perform 51813 (1983)

this service; however, this fact is not documented on the certificate of death. Under this bill, a registered professional nurse may: (1) make the actual determination and pronouncement of death, and attest to the fact of this pronouncement in a designated space on the certificate of death form; (2) officially execute the certificate of death and (3) receive a reasonable fee for the performance of these services. # STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### DATED: JUNE 20, 1983

This bill would authorize a registered professional nurse (RN) to make a determination and pronouncement of death. The bill would also permit an RN to sign a correction to a death certificate.

The Senate Institutions, Health and Welfare Committee made technical amendments to the bill to change a reference from "coroner" to "county medical examiner."

The committee amended the bill at the request of the sponsor to make the following changes:

1. Delete the provision allowing an RN to execute the death certificate;

2. Delete the provision allowing an RN to sign corrections or amendments to causes or duration of death.

3. Delete the provision whereby an RN who makes a determination or pronouncement of death would receive a fee for this service; and,

4. Specify that an RN shall make a determination or pronouncement of death only in the case of a death which occurs in the home or place of residence of the deceased, in a hospice, or in a long term care facility or nursing home.

# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

### DATED: NOVEMBER 23, 1982

The bill authorizes registered professional nurses (RN's) to make a determination and pronouncement of death. The bill permits RN's to execute the death certificate and to make any necessary amendments thereto. Also, it provides that a RN who makes a determination or pronouncement of death or executes the death certificate may receive a reasonable fee for this service.

The committee made technical amendments to the bill to change a reference from "coroner" to "county medical examiner."
