A SUPPLEMENT to the "State Lottery Law," approved February 16,
1970 (P. L. 1970, c. 13; C. 5:9-1 et seq.).

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State*
2 *of New Jersey:*

1 1. In addition to any penalty, fine or term of imprisonment au-
2 thorized by law, the commission shall, after appropriate hearings
3 and factual determinations, have the authority to impose the follow-
4 ing sanctions upon any person licensed pursuant to P. L. 1970, c. 13
5 (C. 5:9-1 et seq.):

6 a. Assess such civil penalties as may be necessary to punish mis-
7 conduct and to deter future violations, which penalties may not
8 exceed \$10,000.00;

9 b. Order restitution of any moneys or property unlawfully ob-
10 tained or retained by a licensee;

11 c. Enter a cease and desist order which specifies the conduct
12 which is to be discontinued, altered or implemented by the licensee;

13 d. Issue letters of reprimand or censure, which letters shall be
14 made a permanent part of the file of each licensee so sanctioned; or

15 e. Impose any or all of the foregoing sanctions in combination
16 with each other.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill strengthens the State Lottery Commission's ability to deal with violations by persons licensed to sell lottery tickets or shares. It gives the Lottery Commission certain powers similar to those currently possessed by the Casino Control Commission.

DATED: JANUARY 11, 1983

The purpose of this bill is to strengthen the State Lottery Commission's regulatory powers over persons licensed to sell lottery tickets.

It allows the commission to:

1. assess civil penalties not in excess of \$10,000.00;
2. order restitution of money or property unlawfully obtained or retained;
3. enter cease and desist orders; and
4. issue letters of reprimand or censure.

These powers are already possessed by the Casino Control Commission with respect to casino licensees.

BILLS SIGNED

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JANUARY 5, 1984

S-1911, sponsored by State Senator Carmen A. Orechio, D-Essex, which permits license plates on sanitation trucks to be displayed more than 48 inches above the ground.

S-1993, sponsored by State Senator Herman T. Costello, D-Burlington, which increases the Lottery Commission's authority to impose sanctions for violations by ticket sellers.

S-3039, sponsored by State Senator Edward T. O'Connor, which would permit the appointment of acting municipal court judges on an as-needed basis.

S-3574, sponsored by State Senator Gerald R. Stockman, D-Mercer, which eliminates the limit placed upon the Division of Youth and Family Services for providing emergency funds to families with children to prevent out-of-the-home placement of those children.

A-1752, sponsored by Assemblyman Dennis L. Riley, D-Camden, which prohibits mobile home park owners and operators from evicting residents for posting "for sale" signs on their mobile homes.

A-2006, sponsored by Assemblyman Vincent O. Pellicchia, D-Passaic, which restores to the Passaic County Prosecutor's Office county detective positions lost when the statute fixing the number of positions available was amended last year.

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
