STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED JULY 12, 1982

By Senators FELDMAN, DUMONT and EWING

Referred to Committee on Education

AN ACT concerning school board expenditure procedures, amending sections 18A:19-1, 18A:19-2 and 18A:19-4 of the New Jersey Statutes, and supplementing chapter 19 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. N. J. S. 18A:19-1 is amended to read as follows:

18A:19-1. The money or funds of the board in the custody of the treasurer of school moneys shall be expended by such treasurer by, and only by, warrants, each made payable to the order of the person entitled to receive the amount thereof and specifying the object for which is issued, signed by the president and secretary of the board and by such treasurer of school moneys,

8 (a) After audit of the account or demand to be paid, by the 9 secretary, and after approval by the board, or

10 (b) In accordance with payrolls duly certified as provided by 11 this title, or

12 (c) For debt service; or

(d) When provided by resolution of the board, after audit of the
account or demand to be paid, and approval by a person designated by the board.

1 2. N. J. S. 18A:19-2 is amended to read as follows:

The secretary thereupon shall for-10 ward such warrant to the treasurer of school moneys of the district. 11 1 4. (New section) A board of education may, by resolution, $\mathbf{2}$ designate a person in addition to the secretary to audit any account and demand to be paid, and provide for approval of such 3 account or demand by such person or the secretary prior to pres-4 entation to the board. Any such approval shall be presented to the $\mathbf{5}$ 6 board at their next meeting for ratification. The board may establish a maximum dollar amount for which payment may be 7 authorized without prior board approval. 8

Provisions:

This bill allows a school board to designate a person to audit and approve accounts and demands for payment prior to presentation to the board. The board could establish a maximum amount authorized for payment without prior approval.

BACKGROUND:

This bill is one of a series of bills designed to implement the report of the Financial Management Subcommittee of the Commission on Business Efficiency of the Public Schools.

According to the commission, the requirement that the board approve all claims prior to payment results in the loss of prompt payment discounts. Also, it discourages some vendors, especially small local dealers, from doing business with the board, resulting in limited competition and higher prices.

Governor Thomas H. Kean has signed the following bills:

<u>S-1606</u>, sponsored by Senator Matthew Feldman, D-Bergen (identical to A-1742, sponsored by Assemblyman John A. Rocco, R-Camden), which allows school boards to designate a person in addition to the board secretary to audit accounts and demands prior to presentation to the board. The bill simplifies the procedure for a board of education to make payment.

<u>A-433</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Robert C. Janiszewski, D-Hudson, which excludes from the plain language law written agreements involving transactions in securities or commodities.

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
