- 1 1. R. S. 39:4-34 is amended to read as follows:
- 2 39:4-34. Where traffic is not controlled and directed either by a
- 3 police officer or a traffic control signal, pedestrians shall cross the
- 4 roadway within a crosswalk or, in the absence of a crosswalk, and
- 5 where not otherwise prohibited, at right angles to the roadway[,
- 6 and when crossing at a point other than at a crosswalk shall yield the
- 7 right-of-way to all vehicles on the roadway. It shall be unlawful
- 8 for a pedestrian to cross any highway having roadways separated
- 9 by a medial barrier, except where provision is made for pedestrian
- 10 crossing. On all highways where there are no sidewalks or paths

This bill provides that pedestrians crossing intersections within cross walks, whether marked or unmarked, shall have the right-of-way. In addition, this bill directs the Office of Highway Safety to conduct a public information campaign and a study to determine the most effective manner of implementation of the bill.

Testimony from the Office of Highway Safety at the committee meeting indicated that approximately 300 pedestrians are killed annually in New Jersey and thousands are injured. New Jersey has a higher percentage of pedestrian deaths than the national average. The reasons why are not clear. Therefore, the Division of Meter Vehicles endorses the bill.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1399

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution,
I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1399, with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill provides that pedestrians crossing intersections within crosswalks, whether marked or unmarked, shall have the right-of-way. In addition, this bill directs the Office of Highway Safety to conduct a public information campaign and a study to determine the most effective manner of implementation of the bill. Under present law, only pedestrians in marked crosswalks have the right-of-way.

Certain aspects of drivers and pedestrians responsibilities remain unclear in this bill.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1399 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 2, Section 3, Line 10: After "yield." insert

Page 2, Section 3, After Line 14: Add two new paragraphs

"Every pedestrian upon a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway.

"Nothing contained herein shall relieve a driver from the duty to exercise due care for the safety of any pedestrian upon a roadway."
