An Acr authorizing the Department of Health to establish a program of medical treatment for persons 21 years of age or older who have cystic fibrosis and making an appropriation.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State

STATEMENT

This bill establishes a program within the Department of Health to provide medical care and treatment to victims of cystic fibrosis who are 21 years of age or older and who meet eligibility requirements.

This bill establishes a program in the Department of Health to provide medical care and treatment to persons having cystic fibrosis who are 21 years of age or older and who meet certain eligibility requirements. The bill appropriates \$50,000.00.

Children afflicted with cystic fibrosis are presently able, through the Crippled Children's Services Program, to obtain both financial support and medical care. This legislation extends these services to adults who face long-term and expensive treatment for this disease.

Cystic fibrosis is an uncommon hereditary defect of numerous glands, including the mucous glands of the bronchi, the sweat glands and the digestive glands. The symptoms include severe digestive disorders, difficulty with breathing, lung infections and heat stroke.

The committee agreed with the purpose of this legislation and released the bill without amendment.

Acting Governor Joseph P. Merlino today signed into law legislation establishing a medical treatment program for adult victims of cystic fibrosis, a crippling and usually fatal children's disease characterized by pancreatic malfunctions and frequent respiratory infections.

The bill, S-1358, sponsored by former Senator Anthony Scardino Jr. (D-Bergen). appropriates \$50,000 this fiscal year for the treatment of cystic fibrosis victims over 21 years of age. The services under the new adult program will be similar to those available for cystic fibrosis victims under the Crippled Children's Services Program, including financial aid for prescription drugs, doctor visits and physical therapy.

State aid under the Crippled Children's program is automatically ended when an individual reaches 21 years of age — the average life expectancy of a child afflicted with cystic fibrosis. The new program would enable eligible recipients to continue receiving assistance for life-sustaining medical treatments.

There are approximately fifty cystic fibrosis adults living in New Jersey, most of whom receive benefits under social security disability programs and third party payors such as Blue Cross. The new program is directed at the minority of cystic fibrosis adults who receive less than adequate assistance for medical treatments which cost an estimated \$2,500 per year; the majority of those costs resulting from the 35 to 50 pills each individual must take daily.

Senator Matthew Feldman (D-Bergen) co-sponsored the legislation.

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
