**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

In addition to the requirements for the form and content of a motor vehicle driver's license under R.S.39:3-10 and a probationary license issued under section 4 of P.L.1950, c.127 (C.39:3-13.4), the Chief Administrator of the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission shall, upon submission of satisfactory proof, designate on an initial license, renewal license, or probationary license, as appropriate, that the license holder is a veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States of America. The designation of veteran status on an initial license, renewal license, or probationary license shall not be deemed sufficient valid proof of veteran status for official governmental purposes when any other statute, or any regulation or other directive of a governmental entity, requires documentation of veteran status.

b. For the purpose of this section:

"Veteran" means a person who has been honorably discharged from the active military service of the United States; and "Satisfactory proof" means a copy of form DD-214 or federal activation orders showing service under Title 10, section 672 or section 12301, of the United States Code.

- This legislation will require the MVC to have two items of programming and two change orders with its vendors in order to comply with proposed legislation.

### **BILL DESCRIPTION**

Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill Nos. 691 and 2030 of 2012 would require driver's licenses and identification cards issued by the MVC to indicate the licensee's or applicant's veteran status upon request. The bill would apply to any person who ahs been honorably discharged from the active military service of the United States and would provide them with a convenient way to show proof of their veteran status on a daily basis.



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#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### **EXECUTIVE BRANCH**

#### OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) finds that it is not possible to determine the full cost of the Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill Nos. 691 and 2030 at this time. The bill would require a minor redesign of the existing driver's license in order to identify a location on the license for the display of a driver's veteran status. The MVC has existing staff capable of such design work on the license, but that will consume MVC staff hours. Once a location for such a designation is decided it will be necessary to work with the current driver's license vendor to redesign the software that produces driver's licenses to incorporate those changes. The MVC periodically makes change orders of this type, but the OLS does not have access to the cost or nature of these change orders, so it is not possible to derive an estimate from a comparable change order.

The MVC also must accommodate such a change in its ongoing upgrades to its technology system, known as MATRX. These upgrades include actions such as updating the computer language used on legacy MVC databases, allowing the MVC to conduct basic transactions online, and developing a computer framework that would allow for mobile or temporary MVC locations. Based on consultation with the MVC staff, it appears that any MATRX related programming can be conducted by OIT, but would likely require an eventual change order to be filed with the MATRX vendor. The MVC has indicated that such a change order would be similar in scope to other orders that the MVC has made, and that such an order would not be billed separately, but is likely to be batched with those other orders as part of a negotiated cost package. This will make it difficult to identify the cost of the change orders, even after the work has been performed.

The cost of the changes proposed by this legislation are unlikely to have a significant impact on the annual MVC or OIT budget and probably will not require any sort of additional appropriation or subsidy from the Legislature in order to implement the provisions of this bill. If a budgetary cost is realized, it would likely be in the form of a slightly increased appropriation to Motor Vehicle Services in the following budget year, to maintain the surplus that the MVC carries from year to year in order to ensure its financial health as a quasi-independent government operation.

The Office of Legislative Services finds that it is not possible to determine the full cost of Senate Bill No. 717 at this time. The bill would require a minor redesign of the existing driver's license in order to identify a location on the license for the display of a driver's veteran status. The MVC has existing staff capable of such design work on the license, but that will consume MVC staff hours. Once a location for such a designation is decided it will be necessary to work with the current driver's license vendor to redesign the software that produces driver's licenses to incorporate those changes. The MVC periodically makes change orders of this type, but the Office of Legislative Services does not have access to the cost or nature of these change orders, so it is not possible to derive an estimate from a comparable change order.

The MVC also must accommodate such a change in its ongoing upgrades to its technology system, known as MATRX. These upgrades include actions such as updating the computer language used on legacy MVC databases, allowing the MVC to conduct basic transactions online, and developing a computer framework that would allow for mobile or temporary MVC locations. Based on consultation with the MVC staff, it appears that any MATRX related programming can be conducted by OIT, but would likely require an eventual change order to be filed with the MATRX vendor. The MVC has indicated that such a change order would be similar in scope to other orders that the MVC has made, and that such an order would not be billed separately, but is likely to be batched with those other orders as part of a negotiated cost package. This will make it difficult to identify the cost of the change orders, even after the work has been performed.

The cost of the changes proposed by this legislation are unlikely to have a significant impact on the annual MVC or OIT budget and probably will not require any sort of additional appropriation or subsidy from the Legislature in order to implement the provisions of this bill. If a budgetary cost is realized, it would likely be in the form of a slightly increased appropriation to Motor Vehicle Services in the following budget year, to maintain the surplus that the MVC carries from year to year in order to ensure its financial health as a quasi-independent government operation.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 717, with committee amendments.

As amended, this bill requires the Chief Administrator of the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (MVC), upon the submission of satisfactory proof, to designate on an individual's driver's license or identification card that the individual is a veteran of the United States Armed Forces.

The bill provides that the designation of veteran status on an individual's driver's license or identification card will not be deemed to be sufficient valid proof of veteran status for official governmental purposes if any other statute, or any other regulation or directive of a governmental entity, requires documentation of veteran status.

The bill provides that satisfactory proof of an individual's veteran status means a copy of form DD-214 or federal activation orders showing service under sections 672 or 12301 of Title 10 of the United States Code. The bill provides that veteran means a person who has been honorably discharged from the active military service of the United States.

The bill takes effect on the first day of the 18th month beginning after enactment, but permits the chief administrator to take anticipatory actions in advance of the effective date.

The purpose of the bill is to provide individuals who are honorably discharged from the active military service of the United States with a convenient way to show proof of their veteran status.

As amended and reported, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill Nos. 691 and 2030 (ACS), as also reported by the committee.

### **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:**

The committee amendments require that the MVC also add the designation of veteran status to the currently issued identification cards that are provided to State residents who are not driver's license holders.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**:

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the State may incur certain one-time costs as a result of the bill. The potential costs are related to a redesign of the existing driver's license and the existing identification card that is necessary to display an individual's veteran status, and the redesign and upgrade of software and the commission's technology system that are necessary for the production of those documents.

The OLS lacks sufficient data to quantify the potential costs, but notes that the bill's changes are unlikely to have a significant impact on the budgets of affected State agencies and notes that affected State agencies are unlikely to require an additional appropriation or other form of assistance to effectuate the bill's provisions.

**Trenton, NJ** – Building on his record of support for New Jersey's veterans and their families, Governor Chris Christie today signed legislation requiring the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (MVC), upon submission of satisfactory proof, to indicate a veteran status on a driver's license or identification card. The legislation will allow for easier access to services and incentives for veterans by conveniently identifying them as a former member of the Armed Forces. It builds on the "County Identification Cards for Veterans Act" signed by Governor Christie in 2012 that empowered county officials to create identification cards for resident veterans.

"Providing every possible support for New Jersey's veterans and their families has been a priority of mine since taking office," said Governor Christie. "Plain and simple, this legislation will make life easier and more convenient for veterans of all ages. With this single point of identification, veterans will now have easier access to services and discounts at businesses across the state, which is the least we can do for the brave men and women who have sacrificed so much to serve our nation."

Governor Christie signed the bill during the 28th annual Governor's military review and awards ceremony in Sea Girt, an event he participates in each year as the Commander-In-Chief of the New Jersey National Guard. This was the first military review since Superstorm Sandy.

"When tragedy struck last year, the men and women of our National Guard played an instrumental role in keeping our citizens safe and secure," added Governor Christie. "By helping evacuate, shelter, and provide food and water until folks could return home, the National Guard stood with New Jersey during its darkest hours, and we will all be forever grateful."

Throughout his term in office, Governor Christie has supported New Jersey's veterans and their families through increased funding and support for various veterans-based housing, employment, and educational services and programs, including increased funding for the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMAVA) in the Governor's Fiscal Year 2014 Budget. He also has signed a series of job-creating bills for veterans, including measures easing access to teaching, nursing, and EMT certificates, extending occupational licenses after returning from active service, and making it easier to obtain Commercial Drivers Licenses.
