## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

PRE-FILED FOR INTRODUCTION IN THE 1980 SESSION

By Senator LIPMAN

AN ACT to increase the compensation of district election board workers and amending R. S. 19:45-6.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. R. S. 19:45-6 is amended to read as follows:

19:45-6. The compensation of each member of the district boards
for all services performed by them under the provisions of this
Title shall be as follows:

In all counties, for all services rendered including the counting 5 of the votes, and in counties wherein voting machines are used, 6 the tabulation of the votes registered on the voting machines, and 7the delivery of the returns, registry binders, ballot boxes and 8 9 keys for the voting machines to the proper election officials, 10 [\$40.00] \$50.00 each time the primary election, the general election or any special election is held under this Title; provided, however, 11 12that in counties wherein voting machines are used no compensation shall be paid for any services rendered at any special election held 13at the same time as any primary or general election and, provided, 14 further, that in the other counties the compensation for services 1516rendered at any special election held at the same time as any 17 primary or general election shall be \$5.00;

18 In counties where the county board of elections does not mail 19 out the sample ballots to each registered voter in the county, \$7.50 20 shall be paid each time members of the district board shall address 21 and mail such sample ballots.

Such compensation shall be in lieu of all other fees and payments. ### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### DATED: FEBRUARY 21, 1980

The purpose of this bill is to increase the compensation of district board of election workers from the present rate of \$40.00 for each election day to \$50.00. The last increase in compensation (from \$30.00 to \$40.00) was enacted in 1972.

The election officials in five counties polled by committee staff (Essex, Hudson, Mercer, Bergen and Passaic) are in support of the proposed increase. The President of the Association of Election Officials, Joseph Brady, who is also Superintendent of Elections for Hudson County, has said that the organization is giving unanimous support to the bill.

It is pointed out that, given the hours worked by the district board workers on election days, the rate of pay is below that of the minimum wage of \$3.10 per hour.

The election officials feel that the increase would assist them in filling vacancies on district boards and motivate the workers to attend classes.

Based on the minimum number of four workers per district, as required by law, the total Statewide cost increase would be approximately \$320,000.00. This figure, based on preliminary calculations, does not take into account the additional Spanish-speaking board workers required in election districts in which the primary language of 10% or more of the registered voters is Spanish.

A fiscal note has been requested.

# SENATE AMENDMENT TO SENATE, No. 438

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### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

### ADOPTED APRIL 17, 1980

Amend page 2, section 2, line 1, delete "immediately", insert "January 1, 1981".

### STATEMENT

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This amendment delays the effective date of the increase until January 1, 1981.

<u>S-438</u>, sponsored by Senator Wynona M. Lipman (D-Essex), which will increase the compensation of district election board members for working on election day from \$40 to \$50. Their last increase in pay from \$30 to \$40 occurred in 1972. The bill will take effect on January 1, 1981.

SEPTEMBER 19, 1980

<u>S-884</u>, sponsored by Senator Brian T. Kennedy (R-Monmouth), which clarifies the crime of "burglary" in the penal code by expanding the definition of "structure" to include certain unoccupied places, by narrowing the affirmative defense to prosecution for burglary, and by eliminating burglary as a crime of the fourth degree.

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
