### INTRODUCED SEPTEMBER 29, 1980

An Act concerning Police and Firemen's Retirement System pension rights of certain police officers in certain municipalities establishing police departments.

#### STATEMENT

In establishing a new police department, the township of Branch-burg has found that the experienced officers which it has hired have been required to transfer from the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS) to the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS). PERS establishes lower benefits than PFRS and makes it difficult to attract and keep experienced, qualified officers. A referendum to establish the Police and Firemen's Retirement System in the township of Branchburg has been requested by the requisite number of voters, and the question will be placed on the November 1980 ballot.

When they were forced to transfer from PFRS to PERS, Branchburg township's experienced police officers lost a substantial portion of the contributions made by former employing municipalities on their behalf. These lost funds have not been credited in any way to the township of Branchburg, to the police officers or to the former employing municipalities, but have been in accordance with present law diverted to general State pension purposes. If the police officers transfer back to PFRS, these lost funds will not be restored to their accounts by the State, but rather the township of Branchburg will be required to restore them. This imposes a burden on the township in its hiring of experienced police officers which would not be imposed on a municipality which had an existing police department and had adopted PFRS.

The purpose of the bill is to place municipalities which, like the township of Branchburg, have started new police departments on an equal footing with municipalities which already have police departments in the hiring of experienced officers, and to prevent a diversion of funds at the expense of such municipalities.

Governor Brendan Byrne signed A-2101, sponsored by Assemblyman Walter J. Kavanaugh (R-Somerset), which is a pension bill designed for the Branchburg Township Police Force.

At the beginning of 1980, the Township dropped State Police coverage and started its own force of six men. Five of them had been policemen in other New Jersey municipalities and members of the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS).

Since Branchburg had not joined PFRS, the new policemen were enrolled in the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS).

This hill will permit the crediting of previous employers' contributions to the PFRS to be carried forward if the municipality's police force joins the PFRS in accordance with statutes.

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
