## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED JULY 31, 1980

An Act to amend and supplement the "New Jersey State Wage and Hour Law," approved June 17, 1966 (P. L. 1966, c. 113).

Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. Section 5 of P. L. 1966, c. 113 (C. $34: 11-56 \mathrm{a} 4$ ) is amended to read as follows:
2. Every employer shall pay to each of his employees wages at a rate of not less than $\mathbf{[ \$ 2 . 9 0 ]}$ * $\mathbf{\$ 3 . 4 0} \mathbf{]}^{*}{ }^{*} \$ 3.35^{*}$ per hour as of the effective date of this amendatory and supplementary act [and \$3.10 per hour as of January 1, 1980] for 40 hours of working time in any week and $11 / 2$ times such employee's regular hourly wage for each hour of working time in excess of 40 hours in any week, except this overtime rate shall not include any individual employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity or, if an applicable wage order has been issued by the commissioner under section 17 (C. $34: 11-56 \mathrm{a} 16$ ) of this act, not less than the wages prescribed in said order. The wage rates fixed in this section shall not be applicable to part-time employees primarily engaged in the care and tending of children in the home of the employer, to persons under the age of 18 not possessing a special vocational school graduate permit issued pursuant to section 15 of P. L. 1940, c. 153 (C. $34: 2-21.15$ ) or to persons employed as salesmen of motor vehicles; or to persons employed as outside salesmen as such terms shall be defined and delimited in regulations adopted by the commissioner.

The provisions of this section for the payment to an employee of not less than $11 / 2$ times such employee's regular hourly rate for each hour of working time in excess of 40 hours in any week shall not apply to employees engaged to labor on a farm, or employed in a hotel or to an employec of a common carrier of pas-

27 sengers by motor bus or employees engaged in labor relative to 28 the raising or care of livestock.

Employees engaged on a piece-rate or regular hourly rate basis to labor on a farm shall be paid for each day worked not less than the minimum hourly wage rate multiplied by the total number of hours worked.

Full-time students may be employed by the college or university at which they are enrolled at not less than $85 \%$ of the effective minimum wage rate.
2. (New section) The provisions of this act shall be applicable to wages covered by wage orders issued pursuant to section 17 of P. L. 1966, c. 113 (C. $34: 11-56 a 16$ ).
3. This act shall take effect January 1, 1981.

The Assembly Labor Committee favorably reports this bill to raise the State's minimum wage rate to $\$ 3.35$ an hour, effective January 1, 1981. It is a rate equivalent to the last of three scheduled Federal rate phase-ins and will directly benefit an estimated 30,000 workers here.

The group covered by the proposed increase are those low wage earners not covered by the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act, such as certain farm workers, restaurant, hotel and motel workers, custodial and domestic workers and "mom and pop" retail store employees. The new rate will not only be compatible with the Federal rate, but will also match the minimum wage of many of the State's neighbors, including New York, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts.

Governor Brendan Byrne today signed a bill increasing the state's minimum wage from $\$ 3.10$ to $\$ 3.35$ per hour, retroactive to January $1,1981$. The bill, Senate No. 1451, was sponsored by Senator Joseph P. Merlino (D-Mercer).

The measure brings the state minimum wage into parity with the federal minimum wage, which was raised to $\$ 3.35$ on January 1.

Of the more than 3.5 million people in New Jersey's workforce, only about 356,000 are excluded from coverage of the federal minimum wage but covered by the state's minimum wage. Many of those people are already employed at jobs paying more than the minimum wage.
