The New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association, in consultation with Special Olympics New Jersey and any other adapted sports organizations, may establish interscholastic athletic programs for student-athletes with intellectual or developmental disabilities who are participating in a unified sports ¹ [or inclusive] ¹ program of athletics developed by a school district. The New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association may require any coach of a unified sports ¹ [or inclusive] ¹ program of athletics to receive training specific to that program.

The committee amended the bill to:

- 1) eliminate reference to "mainstream";
- 2) include a requirement that a school district ensure that a student with a disability has an opportunity to participate in existing classroom activities that involve physical activity;
- 3) provide that in the event that a student with a disability is subject to one of the exceptions established in the bill to the requirement for participation in athletic activities, the school district, in consultation with students, parents, community members, and advocacy groups, must make reasonable efforts to provide a student with a disability the opportunity to participate in existing adapted or unified sports programs facilitated by community organizations, such as the Special Olympics New Jersey. A school district may develop these programs on a school, district, regional, or county basis; and
- (4) provide that the bill will take effect in the 2015-2016 school year.

• The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) anticipates that Senate Bill No. 2079 (1R) will not have a fiscal impact on school districts. The OLS notes that the requirements of the bill mirror existing requirements under federal law. To the extent that school districts are currently required to provide equal opportunity to participate in physical education and extracurricular athletics to students with disabilities, this bill would not impose any additional requirements or costs.

BILL DESCRIPTION

Senate Bill No. 2079 (1R) of 2014 requires each school district to ensure that a student with a disability has an equal opportunity to participate in a physical education program, classroom activities that involve physical activity, and athletics programs. This includes the provision of reasonable modifications, aids, or services that would provide a student with a disability an equal opportunity to participate. An exception would be made to this requirement if the student's participation presents a health or safety risk to the student or others, or if it would fundamentally



alter the nature of the physical education or athletic program. In the event that such an exception is made, then the school district would be required to make reasonable efforts to provide a student with a disability with the opportunity to participate in existing adapted or unified sports programs facilitated by a community organization.

The OLS notes that the requirements of Senate Bill No. 2079 (1R) are similar to requirements under current federal law. As noted in a guidance document published by the Office of Civil Rights in the federal Department of Education, "[s]tates and schools are required to provide equal opportunity in physical education and extracurricular athletics by children and youth with and without disabilities." Specifically, under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. s.794, schools are required to ensure that children and youth with a disability have an equal opportunity to participate in the program or activity of the school, including extracurricular activities. To the extent that the provisions of the bill mirror the federal requirement, the OLS anticipates that school districts would not incur any additional costs.

A school district may develop these programs on a school, district, regional, or county basis.

Under the provisions of the bill, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association, in consultation with Special Olympics New Jersey and other adapted sports organizations, may establish interscholastic athletic programs for students participating in unified sports programs developed by the school districts. Additionally, the association may require a coach of a unified sports program of athletics to receive training specific to that program.

As reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 2709 (1R) (Sweeney), which was released by the Senate Education Committee on June 9, 2014.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The committee amended the bill to eliminate reference to "mainstream"; include a requirement that a school district ensure that a student with a disability has an opportunity to participate in existing classroom activities that involve physical activity; and provide that in the event that a student with a disability is subject to one of the exceptions to the requirement for participation in athletic activities, the school district, in consultation with students, parents, community members, and advocacy groups, must make reasonable efforts to provide a student with a disability the opportunity to participate in existing adapted or unified sports programs facilitated by community organizations, such as the Special Olympics New Jersey. The committee also amended to allow a school district to develop these programs on a school, district, regional, or county basis, and provide that the bill would take effect in the 2015-2016 school year.

• The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) anticipates that Assembly Bill No. 3152 (1R) will not have a fiscal impact on school districts. The OLS notes that the requirements of the bill mirror existing requirements under federal law. To the extent that school districts are currently required to provide equal opportunity to participate in physical education and extracurricular athletics to students with disabilities, this bill would not impose any additional requirements or costs.

BILL DESCRIPTION

Assembly Bill No.3152 (1R) of 2014 requires each school district to ensure that a student with a disability has an equal opportunity to participate in a physical education program, classroom activities that involve physical activity, and athletics programs. This includes the provision of reasonable modifications, aids, or services that would provide a student with a disability an equal opportunity to participate. An exception would be made to this requirement if the student's participation presents a health or safety risk to the student or others, or if it would fundamentally alter the nature of the physical education or athletic program. In the event that



such an exception is made, then the school district would be required to make reasonable efforts to provide a student with a disability with the opportunity to participate in existing adapted or unified sports programs facilitated by a community organization.

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

The OLS notes that the requirements of Assembly Bill No.3152 (1R) are similar to requirements under current federal law. As noted in a guidance document published by the Office of Civil Rights in the federal Department of Education, "[s]tates and schools are required to provide equal opportunity in physical education and extracurricular athletics by children and youth with and without disabilities." Specifically, under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. s.794, schools are required to ensure that children and youth with a disability have an equal opportunity to participate in the program or activity of the school, including extracurricular activities. To the extent that the provisions of the bill mirror the federal requirement, the OLS anticipates that school districts would not incur any additional costs.

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Governor Christie Signs Legislation Ensuring Equal Opportunities In Team Sports For Students With Disabilities

Trenton, NJ – Governor Chris Christie today signed into law bipartisan legislation that ensures students with disabilities are not prevented from participating in athletics and are provided with reasonable accommodation or modification based on individual needs of the student. This legislation builds on federal law guidance that was issued by the U.S. Department of Education in January 2013. New Jersey will comply with the federal law as well as promote greater inclusion of student athletes with disabilities.

School districts are now required to ensure that a student with a disability has an equal opportunity to participate in physical activity programs, existing classroom activities that involve physical activity and athletic programs in an integrated manner to the maximum extent appropriate to the needs of the student. The legislation also allows for the provision of reasonable modifications or aids or services necessary to provide a student with a disability an equal opportunity to participate in any of the aforementioned physical activities.

"As the Special Olympics are being celebrated in New Jersey this week, we are reminded of the difference that team sports can make in the lives of children with disabilities by promoting acceptance and inclusion," said Governor Chris Christie. "Involvement in sports instills strong work ethic and an understanding of the importance of teamwork in our students as they participate in their sport of choice. This legislation will afford all New Jersey students, regardless of their disability, the opportunity to grow as athletes and members of a community."

"The Special Olympics are showing us that those with different abilities can lead just as complete and fulfilling lives as anyone," said Senate President Steve Sweeney, who entered public service after his daughter was born with Down syndrome. "Every child deserves an equal opportunity to participate in team sports. It can go a long way towards building character, learning the importance of working together and, perhaps most importantly, creating friendships."

The bill provides for certain exceptions to the inclusion of a student with a disability in physical education programs but notes that in the event of these exceptions, the school district must make a reasonable effort to provide the student with an alternative opportunity in a existing adapted or unified sports program, such as the Special Olympics New Jersey. A school district may develop these programs on a school, district, regional, or county basis.

Under the provisions of the bill, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association, in consultation with Special Olympics New Jersey and other adapted sports organizations, may establish interscholastic athletic programs for students participating in unified sports programs developed by the school districts. Additionally, the association may require a coach of a unified sports program of athletics to receive training specific to that program.

Governor Christie: Growing up playing sports, whether it was Little League baseball or basketball or Varsity baseball in high school, it was a key part of me growing up.
