STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED FEBRUARY 27, 1978

By Senator HAMILTON and WEISS

Referred to Committee on Law, Public Safety and Defense

An Act to amend "An act authorizing municipalities to acquire and retire alcoholic beverage retail consumption licenses in certain cases and to borrow money and increase annual license fees for retail consumption licenses to assist in financing acquisition of such licenses," approved September 4, 1968 (P. L. 1968, c. 277).

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. Section 2 of P. L. 1968, c. 277 (C. 40:48-2.41) is amended to 2 read as follows:

2. No such contract shall authorize payment to the licensee for 4 transfer of the license to the municipality of a sum in excess of 5 [\$10,000.00] \$15,000.00 and no such contract shall result in the 6 reduction in the number of retail consumption licenses to fewer 7 than one for each [2,000] 3,000 of the municipality's population, 8 and no license so acquired by the municipality shall be reissued 9 to any applicant.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

Presently, a municipality may reduce the number of alcoholic beverage retail consumption licenses in its municipality when the number of such licenses exceeds one for each 3,000 of its population.

This bill increases from \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00 the amount a municipality may pay an alcoholic beverage license for transfer of his license to the municipality.

This bill increases from \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00, the amount a municipality may pay the holder of an alcoholic beverage license for the transfer of the license to the municipality. The bill also allows a municipality to retire more licenses than formerly, raising the ceiling on the number of licenses from 1 per 2,000 residents to 1 per 3,000.

This bill would amend the law authorizing municipalities to acquire and retire alcoholic beverage retail consumption licenses by (1) raising the authorized amount of payment from \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00 and (2) permitting such reduction when the number of such licenses exceeds 1 per 3,000 of a municipality's population. That figure is presently set at 1 per 2,000. The net effect would be to reduce the number of retail licenses.

Covernor Brendan Byrne today signed into law the following bills: <u>S-915</u>, sponsored by Senator William Hamilton (D-Middlesex) which increases the amount a municipality may pay for an alcoholic beverage retail consumption license which it retires from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

The bill also raises the ceiling on the number of licenses allowed in a municipality from one per 2,000 residents to one per 3,000 residents.

<u>A-714</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Daniel Newman (D-Ocean) which exempts a master plumber from having to pay the annual \$50 master plumber's license fee while serving exclusively as a plumbing inspector.

If the plumber elects not to pay the fee during his time of service as an inspector, his master plumbing license would be invalid until his service as an inspector is over.

<u>A-1054</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Buddy Fortunato (D-Essex) which reduces the number of years of inactivity which must elapse before funds deposited in a state or federal savings and loan association, credit union or investment company are presumed to be abandoned and subject to custodial safekeeping by the state.

Under current law, the time period is 20 years; this bill reduces that to 10 years.

The bill also establishes a uniform period of seven years before a money order escheats to the state. Currently, there is a disparate treatment of money orders depending on the nature of the issuing association.

The bill also includes wages as an enumerated class of property.

<u>A-1559</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Robert Eurns (D-Bergen) which prohibits commercial vendors to use any portion of the right of way, including rest areas, of any stare or federal interstate highway.

The bill also prohibits the collectuation of contributions on the foderal or state highway system.
