STATEMENT

Under present law, a member of a volunteer fire company and volunteer first aid or rescue squad is only permitted to display emergency warning lights on a motor vehicle which is registered in his name. This bill would remove that restriction so that, for example, a volunteer could display emergency warning lights on a motor vehicle registered in the name of some other member of his family.

Also, under present law, emergency warning lights must be of the flashing type with a lamp of not more than 21 candlepower and if only one emergency warning light is used, it must be installed in either the center of the roof or on the left windshield column. This bill would permit emergency warning lights of both the flashing type with a lamp of not more than 21 candlepower 21 to 51 and allow for installation on the front of the vehicle if only one emergency light is used.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: MAY 22, 1978

Under present law, a member of a volunteer fire company and volunteer first and or rescue squad is only permitted to display emergency warning lights on a motor vehicle which is registered in his name. This bill would remove that restriction so that, for example, a volunteer could display emergency warning lights on a motor vehicle registered in the name of some other member of his family.

Also, under present law, emergency warning lights must be of the flashing type with a lamp of not more than 21 candlepower and if only one emergency warning light is used, it must be installed in either the center of the roof or on the left windshield column in a position where a spotlight is normally located. This bill would permit emergency warning lights of either the flashing or revolving type with a lamp of not more than 51 candlepower and if only one emergency light is used would permit installation of such light on the front of the vehicle.

Governor Brendan Byrne today signed the following bills into law in a public ceremony in his outer office:

<u>A-574</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Thomas J. Deverin (D-Middlesex), which amends the law permitting emergency warning lights for motor vehicles operated by members of volunteer fire companies and first aid or rescue squads. The bill permits the volunteer member to display such lights on a vehicle registered to any member of his household.

<u>A-1802</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Barbara P. Berman (D-Camden), permits the State Housing Finance Agency to formulate income limits on certain projects.

Under the former statute the Housing Finance Agency was required to utilize the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development income limits on HUD subsidized projects. The HFA wants to finance HUD insured projects, which are targeted for middle income occupancy.

The bill permits the HFA to take advantage of federal insurance on certain projects by permitting the HFA to formulate income limits for such projects in accordance with federal HUD procedures for such non-subsidized HFA insured developments.

<u>A-1905</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman James W. Bornheimer (D-Middlesex), which amends the law governing the terms of insurance agents' contracts. The bill requires an insurer to pay an agent whose contract has been terminated the full commission on the renewal of certain automobile insurance policies for a period of three years provided the former agent has been designated as the broker of record by the insured.
