- b. Parkinson's disease causes diverse symptoms, including rigidity, slowness of movement, poor balance, and tremors, which lead to an impaired ability to walk, speak, swallow, and even breathe, so that the end result can be a clear mind trapped inside a body that has lost its ability to function;
  - c. The visible symptoms of Parkinson's disease are often mistaken to be a normal part of the aging process;
  - d. In addition, many people with the disease encounter precarious legal and personal situations in which they are erroneously thought to be under the influence of illegal or prescription drugs or alcohol due to their movement and gait patterns;
- e. Parkinson's disease takes an enormous emotional, psychological, and physical toll on caregivers and families, potentially overwhelming their lives;
- f. It has been estimated that 1.5 million Americans have been diagnosed with Parkinson's disease, 50,000 more are diagnosed nationally each year, and another 1.5 million persons have the disease but have never seen a neurologist;

- 4. The Commissioner of Health <sup>1</sup> [and Senior Services], subject to available appropriations, <sup>1</sup> shall establish a Parkinson's disease public awareness and education program.

The department shall publicize and make available the booklet to the maximum extent possible, and shall make available electronically on its Internet website in English and Spanish the information contained in the booklet. The Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee reports favorably and with amendments Assembly Bill No. 2576.

In addition, the amended bill directs DOH, in consultation with the New Jersey Chapter of the American Parkinson Disease Association and the Movement Disorders Center at the Robert Wood Johnson University Medical Group, Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, to prepare, and make available on the department's Internet website, in English and Spanish, and in a manner that is easily understandable to patients and other laypeople, information about the symptoms and treatment of Parkinson's disease, and any other information the commissioner deems to be necessary.

#### **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS**

The committee amendments:

- (1) provide that the establishment of the public awareness program is subject to available appropriations;
- (2) correct references to the Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and the Department of Health to make them consistent with current law;
- (3) require the information described under section 5 of the bill to be provided only on the department's Internet website, rather than in hard copy booklet form, and eliminate provisions related to the creation and supply of hard copy booklets; and
- (4) authorize, rather than require, the Commissioner of Health to adopt rules and regulations to effectuate the act.

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 2576 (1R).

This bill designated as the "Parkinson's Disease Public Awareness and Education Act," requires the Commissioner of Health to establish a Parkinson's disease public awareness and education program, subject to available appropriations.

The program is to include the development of a public education and outreach campaign to promote Parkinson's disease awareness and education, including, but not limited to: (1) the cause and nature of the disease; (2) diagnostic procedures and appropriate indications for their use; (3) lifestyle issues relating to how a person copes with Parkinson's disease; (4) environmental safety and injury prevention; and (5) availability of Parkinson's disease diagnostic and treatment services in the community.

The program is also to include the development of: educational materials to be made available to consumers through local boards of health, physicians, hospitals, and clinics; professional education programs for health care providers to assist them in understanding research findings and the subjects set forth in the bill; and educational programs for other personnel, including judicial staff, police officers, fire fighters, and social services and emergency medical service providers, to assist them in recognizing the symptoms of Parkinson's disease and understanding how to respond to the needs of persons with the disease in the course of performing their duties, including dissemination of the information prepared pursuant to the bill.

The program is also to include the development and maintenance of a list of current providers of specialized services for the diagnosis and treatment of Parkinson's disease. Dissemination of the list is to be accompanied by a description of diagnostic procedures, appropriate indications for their use, and a cautionary statement about the current status of Parkinson's disease research and treatment. The statement must indicate that DOH does not endorse specific Parkinson's disease programs or centers in this State.

The bill directs DOH, in consultation with the New Jersey Chapter of the American Parkinson Disease Association and the Movement Disorders Center at the Robert Wood Johnson University Medical Group, Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, to prepare, and make available on the department's Internet website, in English and Spanish, and in a manner that is easily understandable to patients and other laypeople, information about the symptoms and treatment of Parkinson's disease, and other information the commissioner deems to be necessary.

The bill permits the commissioner to adopt rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of the bill.

The bill takes effect on the 180th day following enactment, but authorizes the commissioner to take anticipatory administrative actions in advance of the bill's effective date.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**:

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) expects DOH may incur certain additional State costs as a result of the bill. These costs are related to provisions requiring DOH to develop: a public education and outreach campaign to promote Parkinson's disease awareness and education, educational materials for consumers, professional education programs for health care providers and other personnel, and a list of current providers of specialized services, as well as provisions requiring DOH to prepare and make available online information about the symptoms and treatment of Parkinson's disease.

However, the amount of these additional costs cannot be quantified based on available information. In part, the additional costs are dependent on how the program is implemented and administered by DOH following enactment, and the existing resources DOH may rely upon to carry out the provisions of the bill.

In addition, the costs that may be incurred by DOH may be offset, in whole or in part, by gifts or grants made available for purposes of the program. The bill authorizes DOH to accept any special grant of monies, services, or property from the federal government or from any foundation, organization, or medical school.

The OLS also notes that the additional State costs to implement and administer the program will only be incurred by DOH if funding is available through new or surplus appropriations, as the bill explicitly provides that the establishment of the program is subject to available appropriation.

- preparation and publication, in English and Spanish, of information on the DOH website about the symptoms and treatment of Parkinson's disease.

Because the bill does not precisely specify the scope and intensity of these activities, the bill effectively provides the DOH with discretion over their implementation, and State costs may vary widely according to the manner in which the department chooses to implement the bill. For example, costs associated with a public outreach and education campaign may vary widely, depending on the specific media, components, and target audiences involved. Such activities may be as simple as preparing and distributing literature or posters regarding the causes, diagnosis, and treatment of Parkinson's disease. At the other extreme, such activities may involve a costly utilization of extensive outdoor advertising campaigns or broadcast media. Similarly, the potential State costs associated with the development of educational materials and professional education programs may vary according to: the complexity of the materials and programs; the need for additional staffing or consultants to develop such materials and programs; the method of disseminating the professional education programs (i.e., print, video, or in-person "train the trainer"); and other factors.

Additionally, any State costs incurred by the DOH may be offset, in whole or in part, by gifts or grants made available for purposes of the program. The bill authorizes the DOH to accept any special grant of monies, services, or property from the federal government or from any foundation, organization, or medical school. However, the OLS has insufficient information with which to assess the likelihood of such offsetting federal or private funds being received.

Finally, the OLS notes that the additional State costs related to implementing and administering the program will only be incurred by the DOH if funding is available through new or surplus appropriations, as the bill explicitly provides that the establishment of the program is subject to "available appropriations." Under a scenario where the department delays establishing the program because no funds are specifically appropriated for the program or because the department determines that sufficient funds are not otherwise available from surplus appropriations, it is possible that the bill would have no State fiscal impact during that period.
