- AN ACT to amend "An act concerning pensions payable to certain retired county detectives and supplementing article 2 of chapter 10 of Title 43 of the Revised Statutes," approved August 19, 1971 (P. L. 1971, c. 285).
- 1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
- 2 of New Jersey:

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1 1. Section 1 of P. L. 1971, c. 285 (C. 43:10-29.4) is amended to 2 read as follows:

Any county of the second class [having a population of not less than 225,000 nor more than 265,000 according to the 1960 4 census] which is paying pensions to retirants pursuant to the pro-5visions of article 2 of chapter 10 of Title 43 of the Revised Statutes, 6 7 may, from time to time, by resolution of its board of chosen free-8 holders] or ordinance*, as appropriate,* of the governing body of the county, make adjustments in the amounts of the pension benefits 9 10payable to said retirants so as to reflect increases or decreases in living costs and maintain the purchasing power of their pension 11 11A benefits in a reasonably uniform state.

12 Any such adjustment may be made notwithstanding that the 13 amount of pension benefits thereby payable will exceed the amount 14 prescribed by R. S. 43:10-20 and R. S. 43:10-21, but no such adjust-

- 15 ment shall be made that will reduce pension benefits below the
- 16 amount so prescribed.
- 1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Assembly Bill No. 299 would amend P. L. 1971, c. 285 to provide that any second class county which pays pensions to certain retired county detectives may make cost of living adjustments in such pensions. Currently, the provisions of the statute are limited to second-class counties having a population of between 225,000 and 265,000 according to the 1960 census (Morris county).

The committee amendments would clarify that any county governing body adopting the provisions of the act shall do so by the form of legislative action (ordinance or resolution) appropriate to its form of government.

Governor Brendan Symme has signed the following bills into law:

<u>A-299</u>, sponsored by Assemblymen Ernest F. Schuck and Walter Rand (both D-Canden), which provides that all counties of the second class may, either by resolution or ordinance of the governing body of the county, make adjustments in the amounts of pension benefits payable to retired county detectives to reflect increases or decreases in living costs and maintain the purchasing power of their pension benefits.

The bill applies to Middlesex, Union, Passaic, Camden, Burlington and Marcer Counties. Morris County already has the authority under prior provisions of the lar.

<u>A-1631</u>, sponsored by Assembly Speaker Christopher J. Jackman (D-Hudson) which permits the Commissioner of Banking to waive for up to one year the statutory requirement that banks have blanket fidelity bonds.

In order to grant such a waiver, the Commissioner must be satisfied that the bank is adequately capitalized and that a waiver will not otherwise endanger the financial condition of the bank. He may also require the bank to take other protective measures he deems necessary.

Banks occasionally experience difficulty in obtaining fidelity bond coverage, and under prior law the Department of Banking had to begin disciplinary actions, Reading up to eventual takeover, if a bank did not have a bond. This bill gives the Commissioner of Banking the needed flexibility to waive the requirement while the bank seeks coverage.

<u>A-1815</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Richard Van Wagner (D-Monmouth) which provides that when a tax sale certificate is held by a municipality or any other purchaser, the land will be assessed in the name of the property owner.

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
