#### (Without Reference)

AN ACT to amend and supplement "An act providing for the purchase and loan of textbooks to students attending public and nonpublic schools and supplementing chapter 234 of the laws of 1970," approved August 5, 1974 (P. L. 1974, c. 79).

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1, Section 5 of P. L. 1974, c. 79 (C. 18A:58-37.5) is amended to 2 read as follows:

5. The commissioner shall, upon request of the local board and pursuant to the rules and regulations of the State Board of Education distribute to each school district an amount equal to the cost of textbooks purchased and loaned by the school district pursuant to this act, but in no event shall the aid appropriated to the district exceed the following [amounts] amount:

3 6. State aid provided pursuant to the [State School Incentive Equalization Aid Law (N. J. S. 18A:58-1 et seq.) in the school 4 years 1974-75, 1975-76, 1976-77] "Public School Education Act of 5 1975," P. L. 1975, c. 212 (18A:7A-1 et seq.) may be expended for 6 the purchase and loan of textbooks for public school pupils \*\* [on 7 an average of \$15.00]\*\* \*\* in an amount which shall not exceed the 8 State average budgeted textbook expense for the prebudget year\*\* 9 per pupil in resident enrollment \* [and in any subsequent school 10 year such State aid may be expended on an average of \$10.00 per 11 pupil in resident enrollment]\*. Nothing contained herein shall 12prohibit a board of education in any district from purchasing 13 14 textbooks in excess of the amounts provided pursuant to this act. 1 3. (New section) a. Beginning in the school year 1981-82 and in each subsequent year, the amount of State aid per pupil pursuant to  $\mathbf{2}$ this act shall increase by the percentage increase in the State 3 average \*budgeted textbook\* expense per public school pupil. 4

b. Annually, by November 1, the commissioner shall determine
the State average \*budgeted textbook\* expenditures per public
school pupil.

1 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### DATED: MAY 24, 1979

#### Provisions:

The Senate Education Committee favorably reports this bill which will increase the amount which may be expended for the purchase and loan of textbooks for public and nonpublic school pupils. The current amount is \$10.00 per pupil. Under Assembly Bill No. 3295, the fixed dollar amount would be replaced in 1980-81 by a per pupil formula based upon the State average budgeted textbook expense per public school pupil.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:

Using current year figures, this bill would require approximately \$1,000,000.00 in addition to the \$2,130,000.00 currently appropriated for this purpose.

#### BACKGROUND:

When P. L. 1974, c. 79 was enacted the amount of aid was set at \$15.00 per pupil for the first 3 years and \$10.00 per pupil thereafter. Since that time, the cost of textbooks has risen considerably. Assembly Bill No. 3295 is intended to reflect those costs and to provide for future adjustment as costs for textbooks fluctuate.

#### COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The Senate Education Committee amendments are technical in nature. They provide for the statutory authorization of the expenditure of funds pursuant to P. L. 1974, c. 79 in fiscal 1980; and, they ensure the maintenance of equity by providing for State aid for textbooks for public school pupils in the same amount as provided for nonpublic school pupils.

Governor Brendan Byrne today signed four bills in a public ceremony in his office.

A-3295, sponsored by Assembly Speaker Christopher J. Jackman (D-Hudson), which provides for an equal state expenditure for textbooks provided to students in public and non-public schools.

The bill amends a 1974 law, which provided state aid for textbooks to children in non-public schools not to exceed \$15 per pupil for the school years 1974-75, 1975-76 and 1976-77 and \$10 per pupil in subsequent years.

Under A-3295, the \$10 limitation will be continued for the 1979-80 school year, but the formula will be revised for the 1980-81 school year and subsequent years to be equal to the state average budgeted textbook expense per public school pupil for the pre-budgeted year.

This amount is currently \$15 per pupil and, according to Department of Education estimates, will probably remain constant for the 1980-81 school year, since declining enrollments will offset inflationary cost increases.

"This bill recognizes the effects of inflation on the costs of textbooks and permits state aid for textbooks to non-public school students to increase at the same rate as the aid for public school students," Byrne said.

There are approximately 210,000 non-public school students in New Jersey, and the estimated cost for the implementation of the bill is one million dollars.

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
